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Opinion: EHO—How's It Going?

Expanded Housing Opportunity (EHO) amendments to the Arlington County Zoning Ordinance have been in effect since July 1, 2023. The amendments allow developers in neighborhoods like ours to convert single-family homes into multifamily housing with up to six units. So how's it going? Groups such as Arlingtonians for Our Sustainable Future (asf-virginia.org) and Arlingtonians for Upzoning Transparency (afut.org), drawing on information obtained partly through the Freedom of Information Act, have analyzed the data.

Flawed premise: Based on a prediction of 19-21 lots per year redeveloped for multifamily housing, the county decided to forgo impact studies on schools, parks, transportation, and more. By December 2023-within just 6 months-we had 50 applications for redevelopment despite multiple lawsuits, with 26 approved. Rising home prices: EHO is bidding up land values and putting single-family starter homes out of reach. For example, a modest \$550,000 home in Douglas Park went for \$115,000 over the asking price, out of reach for families of limited means. In nearby Ashton Heights,



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a four-bedroom home built in 1904 on a 13,000-ft² lot recently sold for nearly \$1.35 million over the assessed value in a private sale-presumably for a future EHO building. Unequal distribution: The county said that new multifamily homes would be evenly dispersed. Last year, all approved applications were in zones with small lots (R-5 and R-6), and none were approved north of Langston Blvd., where advocates claimed that multifamily housing would bring diversity. Crowded lots: The county said that sixplexes would likely be limited to large lots, but they have been approved on lots as small as 6,000 ft². Failure to blend in: EHO development was supposed to align with the design/size of existing homes, but approved sixplexes in some neighborhoods are nearly double the above-ground size of new homes nearby.

The historic Broyhill Mansion in Donaldson Run is an EHO nightmare in the making. After the mansion was leveled, the property was marketed for up to six sixplexes on a lot of about 65,000 ft². That could mean 36 new units, 100+ new residents, and scores of new cars with only one parking spot per unit-so dozens of additional cars parked on the street, plus scores of waste cannisters on garbage day, all in a relatively small space. Moreover, EHO development was supposed to allow seniors, minorities, and working families to continue living in Arlington. So far, the smallest approved EHO unit is a one-bedroom, 560-ft² unit with a projected sales price of over \$400,000-beyond the means of the average teacher or senior and bevond the median household incomes of Arlington's Black and Hispanic families. Arlington already has plenty of small, expensive one-bedroom condos; what's needed are affordable three- and four-bedroom homes.

In short, the first 6 months of EHO reflected broken county promises, including the promise that EHO "won't be a County wide rezoning"-which it is for neighborhoods like ours. Those with concerns have two recourses. First, we can vote for a county board candidate who opposes EHO in the June 18 Democratic primary. Second, we can support the lawsuit challenging the legality of the EHO process (see Neighbors for Neighborhoods at https://tinyurl.com/kmfp2329). By paying up to \$750/hr per attorney to defend EHO, the county has spent more than \$50,000 in the short time its attorneys have been under retainer-and the trial is still several months out. Is a lavish defense of a rushed and objectively "failedin-its-purpose" zoning change the best use of taxpayer funds?

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250th Anniversary Celebration

In 2026, Virginia will celebrate the 250th anniversary of American independence. Traffic Signal Installation to Begin

Since completion of the new Lubber Run Community Center in 2020, the intersection of N. George Mason Dr. with N. Park Dr. in Arlington Forest has seen an uptick in crashes. Arlington County plans to begin construction of a new four-way traffic light at the intersection this summer, with plans to be finalized this spring and completion scheduled by the end of the year. The intersection will also get curb extensions on all corners, increased street lighting, and marked crosswalks.

Northern Alexandria Native Plant Sale

Northern Alexandria's annual spring native plant sale will be held on Saturday, April 27, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. At least 10 vendors from across our area will be hosted. The location is the Church of Saint Clement at 1701 N. Quaker Ln. in Alexandria.

Raised Bumps for Pedestrian Safety

This spring, Arlington County will install small raised bumps called hardened centerlines at five intersections, including Fairfax Dr. at N. Randolph St. in Ballston. Hardened centerlines encourage drivers to make wider left turns at slower speeds, protecting pedestrians in crosswalks. The five intersections were chosen through crash hotspot reviews.

Proposed Price Hike for Mulch Delivery

Arlington County is proposing to raise delivery fees for both wood and leaf mulch starting on July 1. Fees for a half load (enough for most Arlington Forest yards) would rise by 50%, from \$50 to \$75; for a full load, you would pay \$93 instead of \$75. Mulch will still be free for pickup while supplies last.

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Parks Update

Stormwater Management in Lubber Run



Flash flooding in July 2019 hit Lubber Run Park hard, but damage to homes was concentrated in neighborhoods upstream. After completion of Ballston Pond restoration last year, Arlington County's watershed strategy for Lubber Run includes pipe upgrades, storm drain improvements, and in-

stallation of an underground stormwater capture vault in Woodlawn Park. Such measures will reduce the risk of stormwater backups and street flooding during major storms. Find out more online at Lubber Run Stormwater Improvements.

Dog Leash Law

By law, Arlington requires dog owners to keep their pets on leashes while out in public. Even a "good dog" let off leash in a park can be injured by cars, wild animals, or other dogs, and unleashed dogs can frighten passersby. Arlington's 10 dog parks are for letting dogs run free, including the Glencarlyn Dog Park in Glencarlyn Park (with access through Glencarlyn to a park road at S. Harrison and 4th St.); anywhere else, the owners of dogs off leash can be fined. Find out more online at Dog Leash Laws Arlington VA.

Reporting Stream Pollution

With spring here, cleanup activities can lead to dangerous chemical spills into our local streams. If you notice illegal discharges discoloring streams in our neighborhood parks, you can report it at www.arlingtonva.us/ Government/Topics/Report-Problem. They will not be able to respond outside of business hours, but they will investigate and get back to you. You can find out more online at Report Stream Pollution Arlington.

Bridge Replacement This Year

Replacement of one of the two washed-out pedestrian bridges over Lubber Run has begun, with completion expected in the third quarter of this year. Find out more online at Lubber Run Park Bridge Replacement Project.

Fish Kill in Four Mile Run

On March 13, dead fish were reported in the Four Mile Run estuary below the wastewater treatment plant on the Four Mile Run estuary. A county investigation found that the plant, due a manual operation error, released unusually high levels of sodium hypochlorite into the waterway. A correction was made in less than 90 minutes, and the threat to Four Mile Run is over.
