## Busy Agenda for April AFCA Meeting

Join us for the April AFCA meeting on Wednesday, April 18, at 7 PM in the Barrett School library. Scheduled guest speakers are our district's Senator Barbara Favola and Delegate Patrick Hope. They will update us on developments in Richmond impacting us (unless they are called away to actually be in Richmond that night to participate in the special session to finalize the Commonwealth budget).

We will also continue discussion of the Lubber Run Center site issue. As detailed on page 6 of this newsletter, the Arlington County School Board may announce on April 25 if they will ask the County Board to join them in building a dual-use educational and community center on the site of the current

Lubber Run Community Center.

At last month's AFCA meeting, participants approved a resolution opposing the construction of a 600-student elementary school on that site. Instead, the resolution called for a lower-impact option such as a neighborhood community center combined with an Arlington County teacher daycare facility and associated administrative offices.

A key issue that will hopefully be clarified at the April AFCA meeting is whether or not the County is likely to proceed with plans to replace the aging Lubber Run Community Center in 2015 if the School Board decides not to join with the County in building a dual-use facility on the site.

## Lubber Run Amphitheater's Full Season and Fresh Face By Chris Scheer

The Lubber Run Amphitheater opens its first full season of free summer entertainment in three years on Friday, June 15 with the first of 23 shows scheduled to run through August 4.

In addition to traditional Friday and Saturday night performances, the schedule will include special weekdaynight programs featuring community groups such as The Metropolitan Chorus and the Arlingtones. The Amphitheater, itself, will present a fresh face. New retaining walls and renovated dressing rooms will be ready for the June 15 premier performance. (See photos on page 2.)

Esther Bowring, co-president of the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation, updated County Board members on the amphitheater and thanked them for their support at last month's public hearing on the county's proposed annual budget.

Today, we are planning for a wonderful second season of live music and theater – and we are here to say thank you," she told Board members. "Although we had a shortened season last year of only nine performances, there was an outpouring of support, with more than 2,400 people who attended performances contributing about \$2,400 to the amphitheater wishing well."

Bowring noted that the renovated dressing rooms will enable schedulers to broaden the scope of programs at the

amphitheater. "We'll be hosting more dance and drama groups in the future," she said.

This summer's official schedule will be released in May, but those tentatively scheduled include Mary Ann Redmond (who opened last year's season), The Army Blues, Margot MacDonald, Cartoon Johnny, Robyn's Place and the Hexagon Theatre Company.

"The support of the Arlington Forest Citizens Association was instrumental in saving this neighborhood landmark," Bowring said. "And the patronage of Arlington Foresters made last year's short season a huge success. We hope to pay everyone back with interest this year with an outstanding season of free live entertainment in Arlington Forest's own backyard."




Dear Arlington Foresters that attended the March 21st AFCA meeting,



## Spring Cleaning by John Naland

Spring has sprung. As grass-cutting season resumes, this month's "Arlington Forest 101" column offers suggestions for other tasks to take care of around the yard.

The County requires residents to cut back trees, hedges, shrubs, and any other vegetation that encroach on sidewalks or streets and thus impair pedestrian or vehicular traffic. Now, as the growing season is getting started, is a good time to cut back vegetation that is already partially obstructing the sidewalk. It is also a good time to cut invasive vines off of trees and fences and to collect fallen limbs around the yard.

The County's spring yard waste collection runs through April 27. Yard waste (excluding grass clippings) placed in mulchable paper lawn bags (not plastic garbage sacks) is collected one day after the regular trash day. Paper lawn bags may be purchased at most hardware stores and are available for free at locations including the Thomas Jefferson Community Center.

What about those half-empty paint cans from recent painting projects or used lawn mower motor oil? If you missed the April 7 E-CARE event to drop off cans of paint, automotive fluids and other special items at Thomas Jefferson Middle School, those items can be dropped off six days a week at a collection point near S. Glebe and Route 1. Search "recycle" on the County website for details.

Has your County-provided trash bin seen better days? Bins with detached lids, broken wheels or large holes will be repaired or replaced by the County. It only takes a few seconds to request repair at http://egov.arlingtonva.us/SolidWasteRequests/ or by calling 703-228-6570.

What about the street lights near your house? If one is burnt out, it just takes a few moments to report it. You only need know the address of the closest house to request repair on the website of the County's Department of Environmental Services or by calling 703-228-6570.

What about your sidewalk and street? To report a sidewalk that poses a tripping hazard or a street pothole, call 703-228-6570 or file a report on the Department of Environmental Services website.

Finally, now is the time to clean out closets, drawers and basements to gather old clothes, toys and other unneeded household goods to be donated to charity or to be sold at Arlington Forest's annual Community Yard Sale on May 19.

#### AFCA Resolution Concerning Lubber Run Recreation Center Site

Note: This message was e-mailed to members of the Arlington County Board and the Arlington Public School Board on March 22, 2012:

The Arlington Forest Citizens Association (AFCA) held its monthly membership meeting on March 21st with a larger-than-usual attendance with the sole purpose of discussing the APS proposed Concept on the Lubber Run Recreation Center land.

After an hour and a half of discussion and input from all areas of our neighborhood, we constructed a carefully-worded motion that passed almost unanimously. Out of the 47 in attendance, only 3 were opposed and none abstained.

Please find the final motion (at right), which will stand, on record, as the AFCA position on the APS proposed Concept.

AFCA is deeply concerned about this proposed Concept and has asked repeatedly to be involved in the discussions and development of the proposal. There are many ideas and inputs from the neighbors that are worthy of consideration and we hope to be included in the process moving forward.

## Update on the Lubber Run School Proposal

One of the options being considered by the School Board to address school overcrowding is a new 600-student school combined with a recreation center, preschool and teacher daycare on the site of the Lubber Run Recreation Center. This new school could be part of an overall solution to provide capacity for an anticipated 7,000 additional students at all grade levels over the next 10 years. By June, the School Board will be making their budget recommendations about additions and new schools needed to accommodate the increasing enrollment.

On March 21, school staff held a work session for School Board members to present their recommendations to create new elementary school capacity in the next five years. School Board members directed staff to proceed with planning for "Option Set D" that would build a 16-classroom addition at Arlington Traditional, 12-class-

**AFCA Resolution March 2012** 

The Arlington Forest Citizens Association (AFCA) is strongly opposed to the building of a six hundred-student school at the Lubber Run Recreation Center site because it will overwhelm the site and create significant issues with child safety, traffic, parking, pollution and the elimination of community green space. Moreover, the building of a six hundred-student school next to the existing Barrett Elementary School will result in dangerous traffic safety issues for existing students, new students and community residents.

The AFCA strongly urges Arlington County to limit development of the site to a lower-impact option designed and scaled consistent with the size of the site, such as a neighborhood community center, an Arlington County teacher daycare facility and associated administrative uses.

room additions at Ashlawn and McKinley, and two new elementary schools – a neighborhood school on the Williamsburg Middle School site and a choice school on the Carlin Springs Elementary/Kenmore Middle School site. This option would add 1,950 seats at a cost of \$125.2 million. The Board also directed staff to further investigate renovating Madison Recreation Center to add eight classrooms.

So what does this mean for the Lubber Run School proposal? We don't know yet. According to staff, the planning, design and construction of the Lubber Run School would take at least four years, so it was never a viable option as a short-term solution. They have estimated the maximum cost of the school portion of the project to be \$43.1 million, with \$3 million allocated to "structured parking."

Staff deferred consideration of what will be done to further increase capacity in years 2018 through 2022 until an April 25 work session. At that meeting, staff will recommend how they intend to add another 1,200 elementary school seats, 2,500 middle school seats and 1,500 high school seats.

What can you do? Please keep writing letters and emails to School Board staff, the School Board and County Board members to let them know what you think of the Lubber Run School proposal. And, if you can, come to the April 25 work session at Kenmore at 7:30 p.m. to hear whether Lubber Run School will be selected as one of the future options.

## Community Yard Sale on May 19

Arlington Forest's long-running annual Community Yard Sale takes place the morning of Saturday, May 19. With over 50 Arlington Forest households participating each year, the event attracts many bargain hunters drawn to the convenience of cruising though one concentrated area to visit many sales in a short time.

AFCA publicizes the event by placing classified ads in local newspapers. Sellers who live near Arlington Blvd, Carlin Springs Rd., George Mason Dr. and Henderson Dr. are encouraged to post signs along those thoroughfares pointing into the neighborhood and to their sales (please remove the signs at day's end).

Next month's newsletter will publish a map showing the sale sites. To get on the map, e-mail your address to nalandfamily@yahoo.com by May 3. Arlington Forest residents can use the map to locate nearby sales. Sellers are encouraged to make photocopies (or download copies from the online Arlington Forester at www.arlingtonforestva.org) to hand out so that once shoppers find one site they can pick up a map leading them to other sites.

There are no rules governing this community-wide event, but past experience suggests strategies for success:

--Prepare in advance. Sort clothes by size and toys by user age. Group similar items together. Find shopper-friendly ways to display your merchandise (tables, clothes rack). Have grocery sacks on hand. Accumulate dollar bills and coins to make change. If selling electronics, set up an extension cord to demonstrate that the item works.

--Price items reasonably. Savvy shoppers will buy elsewhere if prices are too high. Be prepared to negotiate down from the displayed price, but feel free to say "no" if you would rather return the item to storage or donate it to charity instead of feeling taken advantage of by a hard negotiator.

--If you want to snag professional buyers who make yard sales their business, start setting up at 7 AM. At the other end of the day, people looking for close-out prices and even freebies come out in the late morning and early after-

noon. If you are left with furniture or other large items that you simply want to get rid of, leave them at the curb with a "free" sign and they will probably be gone by Sunday.

--Keep your cash in a pocket, purse or fanny pack. If you do use a cash box, have someone assist you so it is not left unattended while you are distracted with a shopper. Decline personal checks. If you go indoors, have someone watch your merchandise.

For many people, yard sale success is not measured by profit, but by how much unwanted stuff is moved out instead of left cluttering rooms, basement or attic. The sale is also a great community event. Families can check out merchandise down the block, say hello to neighbors and strike their own bargains. Kids can set up a lemonade stand.

So, whether you are a seller, a buyer or both, please join us on May 19.



Pretty but Deadly: To the passing eye, English ivy seems like a lovely little green plant. But, it is actually a serious threat to the beautiful trees that give yards and neighborhoods shade and character. Ivy strangles trees. It can accelerate tree rot by holding moisture close to the tree bark, while also stealing the trees' nutrients and water. This aggressive little green plant can actually cause mature trees to fall down during storms by adding massive weight to overburdened branches. Ivy is a threat to our trees, but it is a beatable one. You can protect your trees by cutting ivy away from trees using these simple steps:

- 1. Use garden clippers to cut all ivy vines at the bottom around the entire tree trunk.
- 2. Create a cleared "life-saver ring" around the tree by pulling all ivy vines from the ground for at least two feet around the tree.
- 3. Leave the cut ivy vines on the tree. Pulling them off could harm the tree. The cut ivy will die back and blow away over the next year.

Water New Trees: Please water your young trees. Moisture is becoming a scarcity. We have only seen about 65% of normal rainfall since the beginning of the year. Moreover, there has been no snowmelt to boost soil moisture this spring in most of the area and unseasonably high evaporation rates resulting from plants putting on new foliage and the drawdown in the limited soil moisture reserves. So, if it has not rained at least one inch in any given week, get out the hose and let it run for a several minutes around the young trees -- or purchase a gator bag or ooze tube and remember to fill it weekly. Young trees need one inch of rain a week for the first three years of life. What counts is not letting the soil around the roots turn into cement.

## Remembering Jeff Lund

I would like to add to the testimonial in last month's newsletter to the enormous positive impact that the late Jeff Lund had on our neighborhood. While he actually lived a mile away in Alcova Heights, chances are Jeff Lund knew the ins and outs of Lubber Run Park better than any Forester. His love of scouting and the outdoors were reflected in each of Troop 648's tree plantings, every retaining wall the troop put up, and all the trails the troop refurbished.

Long past when his son Jesse attained Eagle in 2000, Jeff remained active in Troop 648. After serving as scout master (1998–2002), he was Eagle coordinator, troop committee chairman, merit badge counselor, and unofficial troop historian. From the time Jeff first became involved with Troop 648 until his death in late February, the troop never had a bigger supporter or more devoted adult leader.

Over 20 years, Jeff helped guide over 30 Troop 648 scouts along the trail to Eagle. The number grows even larger if you add the many scouts from other Arlington troops who also turned to Jeff for support with their park projects. And he was the perfect mentor - an environmental geologist who was also an Arlington Tree Steward.

Jeff himself became an Eagle in the early 1960s in East Tennessee. For his project, he led a team that planted

saplings along the Tennessee River south of Knoxville. Years later he organized a Troop 648 camping trip to his boyhood home. In between swimming, tubing and hiking adventures, he took the boys through a chestnut research farm and a large sawmill where they worked on the Forestry merit badge.

Jeff was passionate about protecting the environment, and he encouraged scouts to plan projects that promoted native and reusable materials. For the Lubber Run projects, that meant using locally reclaimed timber, nuts, leaves, and shredded mulches.

Although Jeff will be sorely missed, Arlington Foresters will continue to benefit from his contributions for years to come both in the outstanding young men and adults he mentored in scouting and in the many acres of Lubber Run Park that he was so instrumental in preserving and enhancing.

DC-Area Housing Market Ranks
Among Nation's Strongest; Housing
Affordability At All-Time High
Metropolitan Regional Information
Systems (MRIS) data shows the DCarea housing market improved over last

- \*Inventory is down more than 25% (currently representing a three-month supply—the lowest in seven years)
- \*Purchase contracts are up 4.6%
- \*Foreclosures are down 67.2%
