Springtime in Arlington Forest

Spring has finally arrived. The Arlington Forest Citizens Association welcomes spring with a neighborhood-wide cleanup on April 27 (see page 3 for details) and the annual community yard sale on May 18 (see page 7).

The next AFCA meeting is this Wednesday, April 17, at 7 PM in the Barrett School library. The guest speaker is Marta Layseca, the founder and principal of EnviroHomeDesign -- an award-winning architectural design and build firm in Arlington Forest specialized in renovations, additions and custom homes that save materials and waste during construction and energy and water during operation. Marta Layseca was the 2011 Regional Winner of the My Marvin Architect's challenge with a house renovation on N. 1st St in

Arlington Forest.

Her talk on the "Greening of 1st St" will describe that renovation and addition project as an example of the application of green goals to one of our Arlington Forest homes. Selected green strategies include the energy efficiency of the envelope that requires a very good interior air quality; the interior air can be controlled by natural and mechanical ventilation strategies. This house renovation with cutting-edge design is saving 50% on water and energy.

Lubber Run Amphitheater

Summer Season begins June 14 by Chris Scheer

The 2013 Lubber Run Amphitheater's free show season opens Friday, June 14 with the popular Mary Ann Redmond. Her songs and music cover a wide range from down-home country to urban soul. Last year, she premiered the Amphitheater's first full schedule of summer programming since its renovation. She is set for another full house in Lubber Run Park on June 14.

This year's schedule of Friday and Saturday evening shows (with a few Sunday, Monday and Wednesday specials thrown in) runs from June 14 through August 3. Among the 22 performances are many of last year's favorites such as Margot MacDonald, The Grandsons and Hexagon, along with a variety of performers new to Arlington's only full-production outdoor stage.

Arlington Forest's own Colleen Shanley and Grand Junction (Casey and company) will play at Lubber Run July 5. Their show last summer was cut short by rain almost as soon as it started.

Weather was a factor in canceling a number of amphitheater programs last summer. The freak "derecho" toppled a tree that caused minor damage to the amphitheater but that's been repaired and county staff will have the amphitheater in top shape for opening night on June 14.

"The county has kept its promise to bring the Lubber Run Amphitheater up to top safety, access and production standards over the past two years," said Esther Bowring, co-chair of the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation. The Foundation was created by citizens a few years agocontinued page 4

School Capacity Update By John Naland

At this time last year, there was a flurry of talk about Lubber Run Recreation Center possibly being replaced by a dual-use elementary school and community center. Below is an update on school capacity issues as they have developed over the past year.

Elementary Schools: Voters last year approved a \$42.6 million bond issue to fund the construction of a new neighborhood elementary school on the Williamsburg Middle School site. Voters next year will be asked to approve an \$81 million bond issue to fund the construction of an additional elementary school next door to Kenmore Middle School plus additions at two existing North Arlington schools. Those projects would add 1,875 seats at the elementary level. That is still 948 seats short of the projected enrollment increase between now and 2023. So, at least one additional elementary school will be needed. The site will likely be designated in time for the \$103 million bond referendum in 2016. In terms of school boundaries, the School Board will soon finalize new elementary boundaries for most of North Arlington. A review of all other elementary school boundaries will likely take place in fall 2014.

Middle Schools: This past January, Arlington Public Schools (APS) released projections showing middle school enrollment rising by 2,108 students between now and 2023. That is about 1,500 students over current capacity. Thus, APS projects the need for an additional middle school. No site has been identified, although one option is to demolish the aging APS headquarters building (the Education Center next door to Washington-Lee High School) and then build a new middle school on its site (APS staff would relocate to commercial office space). Middle school boundaries will likely be reviewed in 2015 to rebalance the currently under-capacity schools (especially Kenmore) with the over-capacity schools (especially Swanson).

High Schools: APS projections show high school enrollment rising by 3,233 students between now and 2023. Factoring in existing buildings plus relocatable classrooms (aka trailers), that is about 2,350 students over capacity. High school boundaries will likely be reviewed starting as early as later this year to rebalance the currently under-capacity Wakefield High School with over-capacity Washington-Lee and Yorktown. APS planning documents do not discuss building an additional high school. If another high school is not built, then a large number of additional trailers would need to be placed at existing high schools.

Spring Cleanup on April 27

The third annual Arlington Forest Spring Cleanup is Saturday, April 27, from 9 to 11 AM. Depending on the site, we will pick up trash, remove invasive plants, or otherwise beautify public spaces around our neighborhood. Even if you can only help for an hour, please do so. Many hands make for light work, so the more volunteers who participate, the more progress can be made to improve community spaces for our spring and summer enjoyment.

The accompanying map shows the six meeting points and their associated cleanup areas.

- Lubber Run upstream from the Amphitheater: remove trash
- Arlington Blvd southside buffer strip: remove trash and fallen limbs
- N. 2nd Street traffic circles: weed, mulch and replant
- N. Granada/N. Greenbrier trailhead area: remove trash and invasive plants
- Parkland between Mary Carlin House and WO&D trail: remove invasive plants
- Wooded area near N. Edison Street playground: remove invasive plants



Please assemble at a designated meeting point at 9 AM, rain or shine. If you arrive late, look around for those who are already at work. Please wear old clothes and sturdy shoes and bring drinking water. If you have them, wear garden or work gloves.


Again this year, we will be joined by Cub Scout Pack 548 and members of Boy Scout Troop 648. In addition, the County's invasive plant control specialist Sarah Archer will help us remove invasive plants.

So, please join in this effort if you enjoy walking, jogging or biking in our neighborhood parks; if you have children who you want to learn to care about the environment; if

you want to get out in the fresh spring air to benefit from some light exercise; and/ or if you want to help protect the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

Whether you attend or not on April 27, you can protect our environment today by doing a quick sweeping of the curb in front of your house to pick up plastics and other trash that may have floated down the street or fallen from the trash truck. That will keep the next rain storm from carrying the debris into our streams and rivers.



E-CARE: Environmental Collection and Recycling Event By John Naland

Do you have half-empty paint cans gathering dust in your basement? What about unneeded poisonous car fluids, household cleaners or garden chemicals? Or maybe an obsolete computer monitor or television? Arlington's semi-annual E-CARE event allows residents to safely get rid of hazardous household materials and electronics which cannot be discarded with your regular trash.

The next E-CARE takes place at Thomas Jefferson Middle School in the West Parking Lot (one block east of Glebe Rd. and one block south of Arlington Blvd.) between 8:30 AM and 3 PM on Saturday, April 20 (rain or shine). Just load up your car with the unwanted items, bring your driver's license to prove Arlington residency, and then drive through the various stations -- dropping off paint cans at one station, TVs at another station, and so on.

Acceptable hazardous items include automotive fluids, CFLs, corrosives (acids/caustics), fire extinguishers, flammable solvents, fluorescent tubes, fuels/petroleum products, household cleaners, lawn/garden chemicals, mercury, paint products, photographic chemicals, pesticides, and propane gas cylinders. Not accepted are asbestos, explosives/ammunition, Freon, medical waste, prescriptions, or smoke detectors.

Computers, printers, keyboards, scanners, copiers, cell phones and TVs will be collected. A \$20 fee for TVs and \$15

for computer monitors applies, but LED or LCD monitors and TVs are free. Cash or checks are accepted.

The event also accepts donations of recyclable electronics, bikes, small metal items, shoes, eyeglasses, and durable medical equipment.

Bikes for the World will accept serviceable and repairable bikes to be sent to countries where they are needed for basic transportation. A \$10 donation per bike is requested to offset shipping charges. Portable sewing machines, baseball and soccer equipment, and bike parts and accessories are also collected and shipped overseas with the reconditioned bikes. For more info, call 703-525-0931. Receipts are given for tax purposes.

Art for Humanity will be collecting "gently used" but functional clothing, linens, shoes, microwaves, air conditioners, rugs, mattresses, bed frames, and pots, pans and other kitchen items. Winter clothing is most needed. Linens are needed including sheets, blankets, bed spreads and towels. Receipts are given for tax purposes.

Old eyeglasses and hearing aids will be cleaned, sorted and dispensed at clinics overseas run by volunteers. Donated wheelchairs, crutches, walkers, canes, braces and strollers are shipped to clinics in remote villages.

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Community Yard Sale on May 18

Arlington Forest's long-running annual Community Yard Sale takes place Saturday morning, May 18 (rain date May 19). With over 50 Arlington Forest households participating each year, the event attracts many bargain hunters drawn to the convenience of cruising though one concentrated area to visit many sales in a short time.

AFCA publicizes the event by placing classified ads in local newspapers. Sellers who live near Arlington Blvd, Carlin Springs Rd., George Mason Dr. and Henderson Dr. are encouraged to post signs along those thoroughfares pointing into the neighborhood and to their sales (please remove the signs at day's end).

Next month's newsletter will publish a map showing the sale sites. To get on the map, e-mail your address to nalandfamily@yahoo.com by May 2. Arlington Forest residents can use the map to locate nearby sales. Sellers are encouraged to make photocopies (or download copies from the online Arlington Forester at www.arlingtonforestva.org) so shoppers can pick up a map leading them to other sites.

There are no rules governing this event, but past experience suggests strategies for success:

--Prepare in advance. Sort clothes by size and toys by user age. Group similar items together. Find shopperfriendly ways to display your merchandise (tables, clothes rack). Have grocery sacks on hand. Accumulate dollar bills and coins to make change. If selling electronics, set up an extension cord to show the item works.

--Price items reasonably. Savvy shoppers will buy elsewhere if prices are too high. Be prepared to negotiate down from the displayed price.

--If you want to snag professional buyers who make yard sales their business, start setting up at 7 AM. At the other end of the day, people looking for close-out prices and even freebies come out in the late morning. If you are left with furniture or other large items that you simply want to get rid of, leave them at the curb with a "free" sign and they will probably be gone by Sunday.

--Keep your cash in a pocket, purse or fanny pack. If you do use a cash box, have someone assist you so it is not left unattended while you are with a shopper. Decline personal checks. If you go indoors, have someone watch your merchandise.

For many people, yard sale success is not measured by profit, but by how

much unwanted stuff is moved out instead of left cluttering rooms, basement or attic. The sale is also a great community event. Families can say hello to neighbors down the block and strike their own bargains. Kids can set up a lemonade stand.

So, whether you are a seller, a buyer or both, please join us on May 18.



Around the Forest

Paul Kovenock Honored: Forester Paul Kovenock was recognized at the "Arlington Conservationist of the Year" by the Northern Virginia Conservation Trust during a March 12 award ceremony. The award recognized Kovenock's work over nearly two decades to improve County parks with a focus on removing invasive plants. Kovenock was lauded for his efforts to improve parks, while leading efforts along the way to remove invasive species. He was a founding member of the Alexandria-Arlington Tree Stewards and has been active in Arlingtonians for a Clean Environment.



Tree Grant Program: AFCA's tree grant program offers matching grants to Arlington Forest residents interested in planting a shade tree on their property. Grants of up to \$125 will cover one-half of the cost of buying and planting a tree.

So far this year, three grants have been approved and two more are in process. Funding is available for eight more grants this year, so act soon if you are interested in applying. There is a limit of two grants per property and the tree species must be on AFCA's list of approved shade trees. In addition, the application must be approved in advance before the purchase of the tree. Safeway Redevelopment: At an April 3 community meeting at Arlington Traditional School, Safeway and its developer presented plans for redeveloping its site on Wilson Boulevard near George Mason Drive. The preliminary plans include a new Safeway, two levels of underground parking and three to four levels of apartment buildings (160 units)

above the Safeway. The height of the proposed building is 65 feet, significantly above the 35 foot limit under its current zoning status. Thus, Safeway will seek a change in zoning and perhaps a change to the County's General Land Use Plan. Local residents and the Blumont Civic Association are following developments closely. Letter to the Editor,

We love AF for many reasons, including great neighbors. However, one aspect of being a great neighbor is pet-iquette. We have and love pets (cats and dogs), but we don't love it when our



neighbors leave their dogs outside barking for extended periods, including at night and early in the morning. We certainly don't allow our dog to do this.

Perhaps these neighbors don't realize the noise level and are unaware their dogs are disrupting the peace. According to a NY Times survey, barking dogs top the list of complaints in suburban neighborhoods.

Neighbors strongly influence the quality of life at home, as Emily Doskow, a lawyer and co-author of "Neighbor Law: Fences, Trees, Boundaries & Noise," wrote. According to Doskow, a bad neighbor situation can be incredibly wearing and turn a domestic sanctuary into a battleground.

Arlington has laws about noise pollution and barking dogs -- aptly referred to as nuisance laws. In Arlington it is unlawful for any animal to create a frequent or continued noise disturbance across a real property boundary. This law does not fall under the animal ordinances, but under the nuisance laws of Arlington County and is legally a matter for the police. Laws aside, we hope that AF residents want to be courteous neighbors. We sure do!

Neighborhood Notes

Hidden Danger

Some neighbors hire companies to mow their lawns, but I still enjoy getting out in the fresh air once a week to mow ours. Having done so innumerable times since we moved to Arlington Forest in 1999, I thought that I knew every square inch of our yard pretty well. That is especially true of our backyard which is fairly nondescript: average size, mostly level, and unobstructed.

So, it sure came as a surprise to me while mowing last summer when I took a step near the center of our backyard and a patch of sod collapsed under the weight of my foot. Still holding onto the mower handle bar, I found myself standing with one foot still on the lawn and my other leg buried nearly up to the knee in a hole.


Completely unharmed, I pulled my leg out of the hole and turned off the mower. Grabbing a flashlight from inside the house, I inspected the hole. It was actually a minicavern about two feet deep by two feet in diameter. It was empty, with no Indiana Jones-like poison stakes, snakes, or buried treasure inside it. At its top, a three inch layer of grass roots and soil comprised the roof. I had unknowingly stepped on the center of that thin roof, causing it to give way.

Checking closely, I found no clue as to how the void had formed. I saw no tunnel from a mole, fox or other animal

leading into it. I saw no evidence of erosion from rainwater. No pipes ran through the area that could have burst in the past. And the sod roof had been undisturbed since at least 1999.

Several days later, a neighbor posited a logical explanation: When Arlington Forest was being built nearly 75 years ago, the developer cut down most of the trees leaving low stumps. Grading the land buried some of those stumps under several inches of dirt. Grass grew in the dirt, thus further hiding the stumps. As the decades passed, natural processes caused the stumps to decay leaving a void.

If that theory is correct, then there could be dozens or hundreds of other hidden voids across Arlington Forest just waiting for a well-placed footfall to strike. Keep that in mind the next time you are enjoying the presumed safety of your own back yard.

2012 was a pivotal year for the real estate market, both nationally and locally. Consumer confidence increased and interest rates eased down from about 4% at the first of the year to 3.5% at years' end.

The real estate market in the DC Metro area continued to strengthen in 2012. Northern Virginia's median prices increased from \$344,750 to \$385,000 while detached homes increased from \$450,000 to \$500,000.

For all residential property types Arlington County saw the median prices drop from \$513,500 to \$475,000 while the median detached home prices increased from \$644,100 to \$703,500.

Arlington Forest saw the average sales price increase from a median of \$605,000 with 26 homes closed in 2011 to \$609,900 with 35 homes closed in 2012. Arlington Forest hasn't seen a high turnover rate of homes with large additions although the highest price in 2011 was \$712,500 and in 2012 the high was \$975,000.

Looking to maximize value for your home? I can help you with advice on smart improvements! Below are a few stats from the 2013 Cost vs. Value report. Nationwide, stabilized home values and decreased construction costs played a role in the improved remodeling market and costs decreased about 1.9% overall. The central Atlantic region did better than the national average.

For mid-range projects one of the most popular is the kitchen remodel in the top 10 category. In the Washington DC area the average minor kitchen remodel had a job cost of \$18,608 with a resale value of \$16,799 at about a 90% cost recouped. (The cost recouped could be greater when other consistent improvements are factored in). The highest cost recouped in Washington DC was a wood deck addition at a job cost of \$9,455 and a resale value of \$10,282 = 108.7%. It is interesting that a composite deck addition yielded only an 87.5% return at an average cost of \$14,697 and a resale value of \$13,103.
