Replacing the Carlin Springs Road Bridge

The upcoming demolition and replacement of the N. Carlin Springs Road bridge over N. George Mason Drive is the focus of AFCA monthly meeting on February 15 at 7 pm in the Barrett School Library. Our guest speakers from the Arlington County Department of Environmental Services will be project manager Richard Viola and bridge engineer Ravinder Singh.

The replacement bridge will: widen sidewalks on the bridge, add bike lanes along Carlin Springs Rd., maintain four vehicular travel lanes, and enhance lighting on and under the bridge. The traffic divider down the center of the bridge will

be removed. Accompanying the project will be a sewer main upgrade in the adjacent area.

The project is expected to begin in June with the partial demolition of the existing bridge. The new bridge is expected to be completed in late 2018.

This meeting will be an excellent opportunity to learn more about the construction plans and the traffic disruptions that will occur during the project. For more info on the project, search for "Carlin Springs Road Bridge" on the County website.

Edison Park Renewal

About 30 Arlington Forest residents and park users met with representatives of the Department of Parks and Recreation on January 25 to provide suggestions for updating the N. Edison Street playground (as detailed below, the next meeting is on March 8). The meeting generated many ideas, but did not reach consensus on an overall vision appropriate for this quarter-acre park. Suggestions fell into three categories:

-- Tot lot: Replace the old play structures with modern versions while adding few new features. This would maintain the focus on pre-school children and preserve existing open green space.

-- Multi-Age Playground: Significantly expand the footprint of the play structures with new equipment to serve both preschool and school-age children. This would reduce some open green space.

-- Multi-Purpose Playground: Add a wider variety of playground equipment, including a basketball half-court. This would reduce much of the open green space.

Other suggestions included: re-positioning the play structures to make a larger contiguous open green space, addressing erosion problems on the forest end of the park and the associated trail, and assuring that any changes preserve the playground's natural setting.

Neighbors exchanged varied views about the suggestion of adding a basketball half-court for older children. Some families felt that the basketball court at the Lubber Run Community Center is too far for their children to walk and prefer a ball court nearer to home. Others neighbors raised concerns about the adverse impact of large impermeable surfaces on erosion downhill from the park and felt that bouncing basketballs could potentially endanger toddlers near the court and the property of adjacent neighbors' homes.



Golden Anniversary

Arlington Forest Shopping Center's New Forest Valet is celebrating its 50th year in operation this April. That is a remarkable milestone for a small, family-owned business. Chris Macintosh – whose father and grandfather founded the business – is currently coordinating with our neighborhood's John Naland to organize a celebration at the shopping center on Saturday, April 29.

Initial plans are to hold a "Family Fun Day" event like was held in September 2014 and drew over 500 people to the shopping center to eat food, listen to music, play in Moon Bounces, and patronize stores. All shopping center merchants are being invited to participate as they did in 2014 – for example, by handing out promotional gifts. As plans for the celebration are confirmed, they will be reported in the March and April editions of this newsletter.

For over 75 years, AFCA has encouraged residents to "shop local" by patronizing our neighborhood shopping center. In past decades, there were periods when many store fronts were empty. Today, the former Subway sandwiches space is still vacant after closing due to low sales. So please think first of our conveniently-located Arlington Forest Shopping Center when you need goods or services.

A second scoping meeting will be held on Wednesday, March 8, 7:00 to 8:00 pm at the Lubber Run Community Center. County staff will bring visual aids to help neighbors visualize the footprints on the park for the various options mentioned above. Since this small park cannot fit in all the new features that have been suggested, the visual aids will help residents understand the trade-offs inherent in any design. Other limiting factors include restrictions on construction above the stormwater drainage pipe that lies under a section of the park and restrictions on construction on the park's rear section which is in a Resource Protection Area (RPA).

With this information, participants on March 8 will seek agreement on a plan concept that will serve broad community interests now and into the future. After that meeting, the County architect will prepare a preliminary plan and cost estimate. AFCA has tentatively scheduled its April 19 monthly meeting for taking a vote on the final design concept which will then be presented to the County's Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee (NCAC) to request funding. If the NCAC and County Board approve the project, construction would likely begin sometime next year and be completed in 2019.

Should I remodel my house before selling it?

This is where a good real estate agent comes in handy. It'll take some research to find one, but a good one will know what makes a house sell at the price you want for the neighborhood you're in.

My experience is that there are several ways of looking at it. The nicer the house, the higher the selling price. But a good clean up - washing the outside and touching up paint inside and out - may be enough. I usually advise against any major reworking because what suits your fancy may not suit the buyers.

Remove as much furniture as you can and store it off site, or sell it, because the least amount of furniture you can get by with makes the house look roomier. Paint the interior with an off white as your taste in color isn't going to match the buyers and white is easier to paint over. Plus it adds to the sense of roominess.

Bathroom and kitchen additions or remodels can add to the desirability of the house but often don't add enough value to recover the extra costs. For some things, like a new roof, full painting, or a needed remodel/repair, I suggest that the seller ask top dollar and then escrow from the sale proceeds the amount necessary to complete the repair. The buyer gets a good house allowing time for the repair, and the buyer gets a good sale price. But the need for repair/improvement can also cause the price to lower some. It will depend on the buyer and the persuasiveness of the agent/seller.

Help Fight Graffiti: What should you do if you see graffiti? Call the non-emergency police line at 703-558-2222 to report it. ACPD will take your report and come to photograph the graffiti. Does it matter what the graffiti says? No; all graffiti will be documented by ACPD. Who will clean up the graffiti on public property? ACPD will coordinate with the appropriate County agency.

Around the Forest

Carlin Springs Road Pedestrian Safety: In January, the County installed car speed indicators at the Arlington Forest Club crosswalk on both sides of N. Carlin Springs Rd. approaching N. Harrison St. The equipment measures and displays car speeds on large screens to alert drivers who are exceeding the 30-mph speed limit (see accompanying photo). Hopefully, that will cause speeders to slow down.



Arlington Blvd & Park Drive Intersection: The repeatedlydelayed project to create safer access and crossings for pedestrians, bikers, and Metro bus users at Arlington Blvd and Park Dr. has been delayed again. The County is still waiting for federal and state approval to hire the construction contractor. The County now anticipates that construction will start this summer and will take 120 days to finish.

Arlington Blvd Crashes: On January 12, there was a five-car pileup on westbound Arlington Blvd. apparently precipitated by a car slowing or stopping in the fast lane waiting to turn across oncoming traffic onto S. Columbus St. This was the latest in a series of crashes and near-crashes that occurred as cars on Arlington Blvd. have attempted to turn across traffic onto Columbus St. or Edison St. While signage prohibits such turns at Henderson St., they are legal elsewhere. However, they can be risky. Thus, cars westbound on Arlington Blvd. headed for Southside Arlington Forest might consider exiting at N. Park St. and looping around the traffic circle to cross Route 50 at the light. Cars eastbound on Arlington Blvd. headed for N. Columbus might exit at the N. Park St. turning lane. Cars eastbound on Arlington Blvd headed for N. Edison might consider exiting at the Carlin Springs Rd. interchange to get to the Greenbrier Section.

New High School: In September 2022, APS plans to open a new high school building with up to 1,300 seats – most likely next door to Washington-Lee on the current site of APS headquarters. Beginning next month, APS will conduct a community engagement process to determine the instructional focus of that new building. Options are a magnet program drawing students from around the County or a 9th grade annex to W-L drawing students only from W-L's attendance zone. Depending on the option that is selected, major additional high school boundary changes may be needed in 2022. To keep up with developments, search "new high school instructional focus" on the APS website. In addition, the guest speaker at the AFCA monthly meeting on March 15 will be School Board member Barbara Kanninen.

Superman Lives Here: In January, Greenbrier Section resident Michael Wardian won the World Marathon Challenge by running seven marathons on seven continents (including Antarctica) in seven days. He not only completed each 26-mile 385-yard course, but he did so each time in under 2 hours and 55 minutes. Congratulations on an amazing accomplishment!

Power Line Maintenance: Dominion VA Power recently completed its once every three or four-year trimming of trees adjacent to the high-voltage transmission line along Four Mile Run on the southwest border of Arlington Forest. Maintaining a clear area around power lines helps to reduce the risk of power outages. A County urban forester was on hand to monitor trimming. Our local herd of deer watched the noisy work from a safe distance deeper in the forest.

Yard Sale: Cold winter days are perfect for cleaning out closets and the basement in preparation for Arlington Forest's long-running annual Community Yard Sale. This year's event will be on May 20. With around 50 Arlington Forest households participating each year, the event attracts many bargain hunters drawn to the convenience of cruising though one area to visit many sales.

Arlington Forest History Book: This 150-page book -- published to mark the 75th anniversary of our neighborhood in 2015 -- contains essays, photos, and excerpts from the Arlington Forester. Native Plants: Do you want to help the local wildlife but are afraid that would mean planting a hippy garden full of strange-looking plants? Have no fear! You can create habitat using familiar plants in traditional landscaping settings. -- Ornamental trees: What could be more traditional than Virginia's state tree? The flowering dogwood has berries that feed the birds.


-- Shade trees: Planting a shade tree provides an enormous amount of habitat for butterflies and birds in one easy step. The white oak is the hands-down winner in providing food for the caterpillars that songbirds need to feed their babies.

-- Shrubs: Covered with clusters of white and pink flowers in May, mountain laurel will satisfy your need for old-fashioned foundation plantings.

-- Perennials: Everyone looks forward to the profusion of yellow flowers in late summer provided by Black-eyed Susan. Add garden phlox for that English cottage garden look. -- Ground cover: A carpet of blue in the spring gives way to a carpet of green the rest of the year with creeping phlox. All these gorgeous Northern Virginia native plants attract wildlife and add sound and lively movement to the beauty of your yard.
