Neighborhood Conservation on AFCA Agenda

Neighborhood Conservation Planner Katie Brown-Henry will lead a discussion of Arlington County's Neighborhood Conservation Program at our AFCA monthly meeting on Wednesday, February 21st, at 7 pm in the Barrett School library. The meeting will also include updates on the farmers market planned at the Barrett School parking lot (see article below) and the Edison Street playground improvements (see article on page 2).

A County Urban Planner since 1985, Katie Brown-Henry has specialized in working with residents on neighborhood improvements, first as Program Manager of the Comprehensive Community Improvement Program, then with Arlington's Community Development Block Grant Program and currently with the Neighborhood Conservation Program.

The Neighborhood Conservation Program, established in 1964, informs County decisions affecting participating neigh-

borhoods and provides modest funding for citizen-initiated improvements, from infrastructure to parks to neighborhood art and landscaping.

The Arlington Forest plan, approved by the County in 1991, has helped fund traffic-calming, invasive species control, and Glencarlyn Playground upgrades. It encourages the County to protect our forest and water resources, limit commercial development in our neighborhood, and increase pedestrian and cyclist safety on streets and trails. Lubber Run Farmers Market is coming to town! by Allison Kennett

A small group of local volunteers are busy with the initial steps involved with setting up the proposed new "Lubber Run Farmers Market" set to open this summer on Saturdays at the Barrett Elementary School parking lot. The name was chosen to leverage the nearby Lubber Run Community Center and park and to avoid some of the negatives of other suggested names.

The Lubber Run Farmers Market will be an exciting addition to the neighborhood community bringing together residents from Arlington Forest and neighboring areas to enjoy shopping for fresh fruits, vegetables, dairy, bread and so on. The farmers market is planned to last from June to November and take place from 8 AM to 12 PM on Saturdays.

Please come to the Arlington Forest Citizens Association on Wednesday, February 21st starting at 7 PM at the Barrett Elementary library to hear volunteer speakers discuss the farmers market and answer questions. In addition, the attendees will be voting on a proposed letter of support that was sent out over the AFCA listserv.

and time would be successful. Now it's time to plan and execute. The location was chosen due to its distance from other farmers markets, local density, and co-location with other features such as the Barrett playground, parking situation, topography, and so on.

There are several other farmers markets in Arlington including at Courthouse, Columbia Pike, Marymount University, and Fairlington. Each market has its own unique vendor selection, layout, and general feel and culture. This is a result of the different groups of volunteers who support each farmers market and can decide for themselves what best suits their neighborhood. We have a chance to create a unique and attractive experience at the Lubber Run Farmers Market, we just have to figure out what appeals to us.

Field to Table is facilitating the initial setup by supplying the permit, a list of vendors to choose from, financial management, and plenty of good advice. However, standing up a farmers market truly takes a small village of volunteers to help with initial planning, vendor selection, advertising, venue setup and so on. Acoustic musical guests may also be scheduled.

Once established, the Lubber Run Farmers Market will require ongoing support to a lesser degree to ensure a consistent high-quality farmers market experience. We could really use more volunteers (at varying levels of commitment, and in different areas). Edison Street Playground

This month's AFCA meeting on February 21st will include an update on the Edison Park improvement project. AFCA approved the list of desired park improvements at our April 2017 meeting. However, shortfalls in the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Council (NCAC) funding required cancellation of both funding rounds in 2017.

Once funding for the Edison Park project is confirmed (hopefully in June 2018), the community engagement process will continue, but with a new County landscape architect. Architect Shannon Early, who led our community input in 2017, has taken a position elsewhere. Arlington Street Names by Tom Smialowicz

Have you ever wondered why the streets in Arlington are named the way they are? Ever get confused on why a street suddenly stops and then a couple blocks later just re-emerges? Well, there actually is an official Arlington County street-naming system.

Prior to 1930, Arlington was an even worse hodgepodge of duplicate street names (there were 10 Arlington Streets and 11 Washington Streets, for example). The current street naming system was adopted by the County in 1934 to alleviate firefighters getting dispatched to the wrong address; deliveries getting lost; and to convince the US Postal Service to allow "Arlington" as the mailing address for the entire county.

I learned of the street naming system from a pamphlet my Mom found. The pamphlet, intended for tourists and those new to the area, was published in 1984, but is since out of print. Below are excerpts which I thought were insightful, maybe even for some of the seasoned residents who ruefully admit they *still* get lost on the county's streets. Some of the following are obvious, but others may lead to a *"oh, now I get it"* moment. Remember, there are always exceptions... -- Arlington Boulevard Divides the North and South Sections of the County. Except for a few streets between Fort Myer and Arlington Boulevard, which are designated North even though they are actually south of Arlington Boulevard.

-- North and South Designations Precede Named Streets and Follow Numbered Streets. Examples: North Edison Street; South Aberdeen Street, 1st Street South, 2nd Street North. This official naming system is often disregarded. -- Named Streets Generally Run North-South and are Alphabetized by Syllables, Starting at the Potomac River. As you go away from the Potomac there are four "alphabets": first is one-syllable names (Ball Street to Wayne Street), then two-syllable names (Adams to Woodrow), followed by three-syllable names (Abington to Yucatan), and lastly foursyllable names (Arizona is the only street in this alphabet). -- Numbered Streets Generally Run East-West, Parallel to Arlington Boulevard. When numbers are repeated, the designation sequence is: Street, Road, Place. South numbered streets range from 1st to 36th Street South and North numbered streets range from 1st to 44th Street

Stories of Mental Illness by Stephen Goldman

This is My Brave March 18, 7 pm Someone you know has a mental illness. Actually, you know many people with mental illnesses. They include

people among your family, your friends, your co-workers, persons you encounter while shopping and your neighbors. Like me. And maybe like you.

Thirteen other people and I will be sharing our stories of living with mental illness at a show called *This is My Brave* on March 18, 2018 at 7 PM. Through song, poetry or essay, each of us will present our personal experiences with mental illness and what we have done to move through the illness (or, as is often the case, illnesses). The show's casting reflects that mental illness is not limited to any particular demographic. It includes women and men, people from their 20s to their 50s and people of different races and religious beliefs. According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness, in any given year nearly one in five adults in the United States will have a mental illness. Nearly half of adults will have a mental illness at some point in their lives.

Despite this, mental illness is still stigmatized. The purpose of the show is to reduce that stigma by sharing stories of people who live well with mental illness. The program helps people understand the reality of mental illness, an experience that is difficult to understand by those who have never had one. Perhaps more importantly, it helps people who have a mental illness, but who have not sought treatment, understand that they are not alone and there is hope. As someone who has seen a previous edition of This is My Brave in Arlington, I can tell you that the stories are, at once, both moving and optimistic. They are stories that should be heard.

As a long-time Arlington Forest resident, I encourage all Foresters to attend.

It's Dark Out There: Is there a streetlight out on your block? It takes only a few minutes to report it. Please do not assume that someone else will. Just go to the County's Report-A-Problem page at https://topics.arlingtonva.us/reportproblem/. The County will send a repair team or relay the message to Dominion Power if they own the malfunctioning light.

Low housing inventory has been a chronic problem in the DC Metro area, and especially in Arlington. 5+ months of inventory is a balanced market and Arlington has a about 1 months' supply due to the rate of absorption. From 1/1/18 to date there have been 279 properties with ratified contracts in Arlington, 94 of them were single family homes. With rising interest rates some buyers are acting sooner than later, while others are waiting for more housing inventory to arrive. *Historically the 1st quarter to the mid-* 2^{nd} quarter of the year are prime times to be a home seller. Rates are expected to continue their steady climb, which could erode buyers' purchasing power. In recent multiple contract situations, some buyers are reluctant to offer much over list price, or even less than list price. The demand is high, yet most buyers appear hesitant unless they

perceive they are getting a great deal, hard to accomplish in a seller's market. Market Values versus Assessed Values. Arlington County's assessed value of residential property (condos, town houses and single-family homes) is now \$640,900, up 3.8% from \$617,200 last year. It's hard to apply a 3.9% to all homes since an Arlington home has an average market value 10% higher than its tax assessment, which varies in sectors and zip codes. One point to realize is just because your tax assessment might not have increased, doesn't mean the market value of your home did not increase (and vice versa). Every year homeowners can appeal their assessment, and in a few cases, it might work out. Check out the county website for information since Arlington provides an informative website. If you're considering appealing your tax assessment, feel free to contact me with questions and for market data. Around the Forest

LRCC Update: Arlington County will present the final building and park designs for the new Lubber Run Community Center on Wednesday, February 28th, in the Barrett Elementary School Cafeteria from 7 to 9 p.m. At the meeting, County staff will provide a timeline for closure of the existing building and programs. They will discuss planned traffic improvements, status of the running track, the building's low net energy usage, and color schemes for the interior. The project's architects and representatives of the construction firm will also be on hand. Construction is planned to start this fall.

Stream Cleanup: Join Arlington County Park Rangers in cleaning up Four Mile Run in the area near the playground at the foot of S. Park St on Saturday, March 10th, from 10 am to 1 pm. Get outdoors and help Arlington restore its natural spaces. Individuals, families, scouts, and school groups are welcome. Volunteers should wear waterproof boots and bring gloves. Bags will be provided. An adult must accompany volunteers under age 18. Meet in front of the restrooms located upriver (towards Arlington Blvd.) from the playground.


Oh Deer: A neighbor waiting at the N. Edison St. traffic light around 5 pm earlier this month saw a deer sprint out of Lubber Run Park onto Arlington Blvd where it was struck by a car. The car's windshield was smashed, and the deer was killed. A few days later at mid-morning, another neighbor saw a herd of eight deer in the disc golf (Frisbee) course in Bluemont Park near N. Carlin Springs Rd. and Arlington Blvd. So please be on the lookout when driving. Dog walkers should obey the County ordinance by keeping dogs on-leash to avoid scaring deer onto busy streets.

The Arlington Parks Challenge By Michael Resnick

At the end of 2015, Arlington Foresters Deb Siegel and Greg Thome, Michael Resnick and Mike Farley were enjoying some Holiday Cheer when Mike came up with a great idea: Let's get the New Year started right by getting out and seeing all 151 Arlington's parks. (Yes, there really are 151 official parks in Arlington! Check out the latest list at https://parks.arlingtonva.us/find-a-park)

Since we spend a lot of our free time in the few of the parks close to home, we wanted to see what's going on in the rest of the county. In no time flat, we developed some simple ground rules:

1) Walk, run, bike, or take public transportation to all 151 Arlington County parks during the calendar year (if you have to drive to a far-away section of the county, you must walk/bike/run at least one mile to the first park of your journey).

2) Take a selfie in front of the park sign, or take the picture with a distinguishing characteristic in the back-ground such as a building or street sign.

3) Earn extra credit for photographing historic markers on your journey.

4) Record your journey on a shared spreadsheet.

We started the competition on January 1, 2016, naturally with photos in front of Lubber Run Park. But despite putting forth valiant efforts, neither couple was able to complete the challenge during the year. So, we enjoyed



some more Holiday Cheer last December (you get the picture, right?), and reissued the challenge for 2017.

And on Christmas Eve 2017, the Four Foresters finished the challenge together with a photo at the Upper Pimmit Run Park (East). All 151 parks within the year! And because we tied in the "competition", we all treated ourselves to a wonderful dinner at a local restaurant.

What's really great about this challenge is that we've really seen every neighborhood and the first-rate recreational activities and facilities in our great county, met many great people along the way, and got some great exercise as well. This county knows how to do parks! In all our travels across the United States (and even the world), we believe that Arlington's parks are clearly the best.

-- The Designations Avenue, Circle, Highway, Lane, Parkway, Pike and Terrace are Used Infrequently. Arlington has only one pike – Columbia Pike, which originally was a toll road. There are only three parkways: Spout Run, George Washington Memorial and Custis Memorial (more commonly known as I-66).

-- Boulevards, Drives and Roads Generally are Diagonal and are Major Thoroughfares with Historic Names. Boulevards usually run East-West (ex: Washington and Clarendon) and Drives run North-South (ex: Walter Reed and George Mason).

-- Named Roads Typically Follow Early Winding Roads and are Excluded from the Alphabetized Pattern. Examples are Military Road (built through dense forest in only three days by Civil War federal troops) which wound toward the northern part of Arlington's ring of Civil War forts, and Old Dominion Drive, which follows an early electric railroad route.

-- Numbered and Named Streets are NOT through routes. Only a few very short streets in the northwestern part of the county are unbroken in continuity. The majority of numbered and named streets have some blocks of interruption. Generally, only Boulevards, Drives, Highways and Roads cross the county in unbroken continuity.

-- South and West Sides of the Streets usually have the Even-Numbered House Numbers and North and East Sides of the Streets usually have Odd numbering.

Getting around Arlington can still be...*intriguing*. But maybe understanding not only the letter, but also how many syllables in the street name (*most of ours have 3*) indicating how far it is from the Potomac River, might help.




