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## Update on on Lubber Run Amphitheater

An update on plans for the Summer 2019 season at the Lubber Run Amphitheater tops the agenda of the AFCA monthly meeting on Wednesday, January 16<sup>th</sup>, at 7 pm in the Barrett School Library. Josh Stoltzfus, deputy director for Arlington Cultural Affairs/Arlington Arts, and representatives of the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation will make presentations and answer questions. Looking ahead, County Board Chair Christian Dorsey will speak at the February AFCA meeting and School Board Chair

Reid Goldstein at the March meeting. The April meeting will include a Farmers Market update and May is the picnic and annual membership meeting.

Finally, the results are in from our fall dues drive that requested \$10 from each household to support AFCA's activities. A total of 326 of the 851 households in Arlington Forest (38 percent) paid their 2018-2019 dues. Some 88 residents took advantage of the online payment option which was first offered in fall 2017.

# Culture and Community Under the Stars By Chris Scheer

Arlington's "Hidden Gem", the "Jewel in the Forest" – call it what you will, the Lubber Run Amphitheater has been an integral part of the Arlington Forest neighborhood since opening day on July 19, 1969 and continues to be a focal point for culture and community.

Judging from last year's robust attendance and Arlington County's continuing support of free summer programming at this unique open-air venue, interest in the amphitheater by both audience and performers is growing. Arlington Foresters will hear about County plans for the amphitheater at AFCA's January 16<sup>th</sup> meeting.

Guest speaker Josh Stoltzfus, deputy director for Arlington Cultural Affairs/Arlington Arts in the Department of Economic Development, will discuss the role of arts and culture in Arlington's economic development and focus on how the Lubber Run Amphitheater fits in.

Stoltzfus in responsible for selecting performers for the amphitheater and will discuss the booking process. He has expanded the variety of programming during the past few years and will outline County objectives regarding attendance as well as operational limitations.

Board members of the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foun-

dation will discuss the role of this grass-roots, tax-exempt organization founded by Arlington Foresters a few years ago to promote restoration of the amphitheater to a full schedule of free summer performances. The foundation advocates for County and resident support for the amphitheater, funds performances aimed at families and children and provides information about the amphitheater to the public.

#### **County Projects Update**

**Lubber Run Community Center:** The final walls of the 1956 Lubber Run Community Center were taken down on December 1<sup>st</sup> (see photo). The next steps are excavation for the foundation and the pouring of concrete. Construction of the \$48 million new community center will continue through 2019 and conclude in 2020. Edison Park: The County Board in November approved proceeding with the \$1.08 million Edison Park Project funded by Arlington Forest's Neighborhood Conservation Program. Existing play areas will be renovated: a play area for children ages two-to-five, another for ages five-to-twelve, and an area with swings. New furnishings, fencing, and a gate separating the playgrounds from the street will be installed, along with ramps, railings, and walls to improve accessibility from the street and to the park trail. Native plants will be added, and storm-water management improved.

The next step is the Edison Park Design Working Group Meeting on Wednesday, February 13<sup>th</sup>, at 7:00 pm in the Barrett Elementary School Library. Residents are invited to attend to review the County's concept plans and provide input. The final concept design is scheduled to be voted on by Arlington Forest residents at the AFCA monthly meeting on April 24<sup>th</sup>. The original tot-lot playground was built in the late 1970s after years of advocacy by neighbor Mary Alice Glover. Previously, the site was a parking lot.

**Carlin Springs Bridge:** Construction continues on the \$7 million new bridge and its approaches. The project is expected to conclude this spring. For more info, search "Carlin Springs Bridge" on the County website.

# **Around the Forest**

A Small Victory: There are storm drains on either side of the trailhead at the foot of N. Greenbrier Street. One drain never clogs with leaves while the other is perpetually clogged, causing stormwater to flow over the curb and eroding the hillside and trail shoulder. The design of the two drains is identical except that the clogged drain had three vertical iron bars across its opening. It was around those bars that the leaves got stuck. Nearby neighbors do twice yearly park cleanups in the area that includes digging out the clogged entrance. But last month, a neighbor who was tired of digging out the drain contacted the Department of Environmental Services asking them to cut out the vertical bars. The County promptly complied, and that storm drain has not clogged since.



Yard Sale: Cold winter days are perfect for cleaning out closets, the basement, and attic in preparation for Arlington Forest's long-running annual Community Yard Sale. This year's event will

be on May 18<sup>th</sup>. With around 40 Arlington Forest households participating each year, the event attracts many bargain hunters drawn to the convenience of cruising though one area to visit many sales.

Snow Watch: If you will be away anytime this winter on work or vacation travel, please make contingency plans now to keep your sidewalk clear of snow and ice. A low-cost option is to utilize "Kids for Hire" on page 10 to find an energetic neighborhood student to assist. The safety of your neighbors depends on adhering to the County code which requires clearing snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours after snowfall ceases (within 36 hours if snowfall exceeds 36 inches). Despite the 24-hour rule, the County urges shoveling "as soon as possible" since snow and ice left for any length of time could cause a pedestrian to fall and be injured.

Recycling Tips: Do not place your recyclables in plastic bags. Items enclosed in plastic bags are discarded at the sorting facility which does not have time to open plastic bags to determine if they contain recyclables or trash. Also, never include loose plastic bags such as grocery sacks in the recycle cart as they can jam the sorting machinery. Place cans, bottles and other recyclables loose in the blue cart. Finally, packing peanuts, bubble wrap, and plastic air pillows are not recyclable. Go online to see: https://recycling.arlingtonva.us/residentialbrochure (pages 9-11).

#### The Empty Nest By John K. Naland

When our family moved to Arlington Forest 20 years ago, we were a young couple with two preschoolers. Today, our daughters are far away at college, leaving my wife and me as empty nesters. That changed last April 14<sup>th</sup> when I looked in our back yard and saw two barred owls perched in our holly tree.

Day after day, those two large owls sat there during the daytime. They flew off in the evening, presumably to hunt for food. Although it was nesting season, they sat side-by-side on the tree branch all day long; with neither of them departing to visit or sit on a nest.

I was perplexed by this behavior until a neighbor said that an early-April wind storm had knocked down a large tree containing an owl nest near the Glencarlyn Dog Park. I presume that our owls were a mating couple occupying that nest, along with their eggs or hatchlings which did not survive the tree's fall. The two owls then sought refuge in our holly tree which, unlike many other trees in early spring, has spikey evergreen leaves that offer protection from blue jays and other birds that do not welcome the arrival of large predator birds.

For over a week, the two owls sat side-by-side inches apart. Then, having perhaps come to terms with the fact that they had no hatchlings to care for, they sat apart on

different branches. They were quite difficult to see through the leafy branches, but I became adept at spotting their football-shaped and sized silhouettes.

Finally, about a month after they arrived, our two owls did not return one morning after their night out. While



the squirrels and chipmunks that quickly returned to our back yard after a month's absence were likely happy that the owls had moved on, my wife and I missed seeing them each day. Now again, like those owls, we were empty nesters.




