Whither the Lubber Run Recreation Center?

The future of the Lubber Run Recreation Center will be discussed at the Arlington Forest Citizens Association meeting this Wednesday, January 15, at 7 PM in the Barrett School library.

Arlington County's current Capital Improvement Plan (adopted in 2012) calls for rebuilding the Rec Center at the end of this this decade with funding from the 2016 and 2018 bond issues. However, last month a group called VOICE (Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement) petitioned the County Board to consider building a high-density housing development for low-income tenants on the site. Soon thereafter, the County Board instructed its staff to identify three to five County-owned sites that could be redeveloped as government-subsidized housing. That list is due to be presented to the County Board soon with final approval likely to come this spring.

Both VOICE and the County Board point to the recently-completed Arlington Mill Community Center (located near

the intersection of Columbia Pike and Four Mile Run) as a model. That facility combines a 64,000 square feet, four-story Community Center building with a four-story housing development containing 122 apartment units that are available only to low-income applicants. Promotional material says that underground parking is provided for 156 cars at the Community Center and 122 cars at the housing development (278 cars total).

AFCA invited the Director of Arlington's Department of Parks and Recreation (which runs the Lubber Run Rec Center) to attend this week's meeting, but she was unavailable. However, Arlington Forest residents who have been gathering information on the proposal will be on hand to discuss the issue. In addition, the County Manager's office has committed to sending representatives to the February 19 AFCA meeting to discuss the Rec Center's future.

Also on the agenda of this week's meeting will be planning for celebrating Arlington Forest 75th anniversary.

Happy 75th Anniversary Arlington Forest!

The arrival of 2014 marks the beginning of AFCA's celebration of the 75th anniversary of the founding of Arlington Forest. While the majority of our homes were built between 1940 and 1946, the first construction permit was issued 75 years ago on July 13, 1939. AFCA is organizing a series of activities this year to celebrate that anniversary and to carry out projects to improve our public spaces.

Celebrations will include an Arlington Forest Shopping Center appreciation and family fun day (this coming September), the triennial neighborhood home and garden tour in May (see page 2), and updating and reprinting the Arlington Forest history book (see page 5). Community improvement projects will include the already-initiated survey of sidewalk/curb repair needs (see page 5) and the fourth annual neigh-

borhood-wide spring cleanup of public spaces in April.

Hundreds of Arlington Forest residents joined in commemorations marking the 50th, 60th, and 70th anniversaries. We hope for similar wide-scale participation this time. See upcoming newsletters for details on each event.



Make Bird Feeding Healthy and Safe for Birds

By Cliff Fairweather Park Naturalist, Long Branch Nature Center Many of us feed the birds in the winter. You can actually feed birds all year round but this is the most popular time of year to put out feeders.

We should keep in mind, though, that we feed birds because we enjoy seeing birds around our homes - they rarely depend on feeders for survival.

Since we feed birds for our enjoyment, I believe we are ethically bound to make our bird feeding as healthy and safe for the birds as possible. By offering food in feeders, we cause birds to concentrate unnaturally, exposing them to possible disease and predation. There are steps we can take, however, to reduce the risks to birds visiting our feeders and bird baths.

One of the most important things we can do to keep birds healthy is to regularly clean bird feeders and bird baths. The National Audubon Society recommends cleaning feeders at least twice a year and more often if you offer food during the summer. You should inspect feeders when refilling seed to make sure no damp seed is clumping in them. Damp, clumping seed can become moldy and should be discarded right away.

Use a hose sprayer, dish detergent, and a brush to

scrub feeders, followed by soaking them in a 10% solution of non-chlorine bleach. Rinse them well and allow them to dry thoroughly before refilling. Also, be sure to clean under

your feeders occasionally by raking up spilled seed and seed hulls. These can become moldy and sicken birds that eat them.

Keep your bird bath clean as well. Bird baths should be emptied and refilled every day or two and any algae scrubbed off the bottom. Frequent water changes provide healthier water for birds and get rid of mosquito larvae, which is good for both birds and us!

Where you place feeders and birdbaths is an important safety consideration. Windows are a collision hazard for birds, so feeders should be either within three feet of, or more than thirty feet away from, windows.

In addition, feeders should be placed near shrubs, small trees or other cover so that birds have a chance to escape from hawks and other predators. However, feeders should not be so close to cover that a predator can use it to ambush birds.

Feeding birds and letting your cat outdoors is likely to end badly for the birds. If you have an outdoor cat, keep it inside until after breakfast and get it back in before dinner so that it is not outside during twilight hours when birds are most vulnerable.

Around the Forest

Sidewalk Survey: The comprehensive survey of our neighborhood's 75 year-old sidewalks is underway. Responding to the call for volunteers in the November Arlington Forester, residents stepped forward in the Northside and Greenbrier sections. Those teams are in the process of identifying Northside and Greenbrier section sidewalks, curbs, and gutters that present serious tripping hazards or are severely spalled (i.e., the concrete surface has crumbled). That list along with illustrative photos will be sent to the Department of Environmental Services so they can schedule replacement over the next few years. AFCA Dues Drive: The results are in from our fall dues drive that requested \$10 form each household to support AFCA's activities. A total of 317 of the 853 households in Arlington Forest paid their 2013-2014 dues. That is up slightly from last year. Participation rates are Greenbrier Section-39%, Southside-39%, and Northside-33%. If you meant to pay your dues but never got around to it, you will need to wait until next September for the 2014-2015 dues drive.

Thank You: AFCA thanks Southside resident Elizabeth Grossman for her work in sending out invoices twice a year to this newsletter's two dozen advertisers. Since ad revenue covers the cost of printing and distributing the newsletter, her efforts allow AFCA to devote 100% of dues to activities and advocacy to enhance the quality of life in our neighborhood.

Playground Project Advances: Construction is expected to begin in March on the \$485,000 project to expand the playground in Glencarlyn Park near the end of S. Park Drive. Construction is expected to be completed by late this year. Park elements will include a "sand stream" with climbing and story rocks, a climbing dome, larger swings, and a picnic area. Many features will be geared towards older children.

Forester Named Rhodes Scholar: Arlington Forest resident Brian McGrail was one of just 32 Americans named Rhodes Scholars last November. McGrail, currently a senior at Williams College, will receive funding to pursue a Master's Degree at Oxford University in the United Kingdom starting next fall.

Scouting News: Arlington Forest and the Boy Scouts of America joined together to support several local food banks through the Scouting For Food event on November 9, 2013. Scouts collected food donations from all over Arlington and McLean. The cooperative effort for the entire area resulted in 73,696 pounds of food overall. This is a 20% increase over last year! A total of 52,928 pounds of food were delivered to the Arlington Food Assistance Center (AFAC), 16,920 pounds were delivered to SHARE of McLean, 3,600 pounds were delivered to Food For Others. A total of 1,253 Scouts assisted with the effort along with 775 adult volunteers from various organizations. A big "Thank You" goes out to Arlington Forest from the Cub Scouts of Pack 548 and the Boy Scouts of Troop 648 for your continuing support of Scouting For Food.

Post No Bills: No notices should be posted on telephone poles except those put up by the County announcing zoning changes or the fall leaf collection schedule. If you do post a notice about a lost cat, a yard sale, or other such topic, please remove it after a reasonable length of time. A tacky commercial "We Buy Your Junk" sign was recently posed on an Arlington Forest telephone pole that had begun to look like a permanent advertising platform after neighbors left up numerous homemade notices for months on end.

Snow Removal: After the January 2 three-inch snowfall, most, but not all, residents quickly cleared their sidewalks as required by the County code. Residents with winter travel plans or who otherwise are unable or unwilling to shovel their sidewalks should make arrangements to have someone else remove any snow and ice. See the Kids for Hire section for a list of neighborhood youths who are available (look under "yard work").

Arlington Forest History Book: AFCA is marking the 75th anniversary of our neighborhood by updating its history of Arlington Forest (last printed for the 60th anniversary) which will be available for purchase. Included will be previously-published remembrances by original home owners documenting daily life in our neighborhood during the 1940s and 1950s. For the updated volume we seek new essays covering more recent years. Potential topics include: a snapshot of neighborhood life in the 1960s or 1970s, last decade's campaign to clear invasive plants from Lubber Run Park, and the recent saving of the Lubber Run Amphitheater. January - A Time for Rest and Reflection

With the arrival of winter all of the season's agricultural work is finished. The days are dark and cold. People are indoors and free of the bulk of their chores. If you make your living as a landscaper like I do then the agricultural ebb and flow of the seasons still largely applies. In reference to the suburban garden, the plants are in dormancy and the ground is frozen, now is a good time to rest, relax and reflect.

While snow will have to be removed from paved surfaces like the driveway, walkways and streets, it can be left alone on planted surfaces. Plants with marginal cold hardiness should have been mulched and protected from frost before the onset of winter. Late winter is the best time of the year for dormant pruning but not until February or March. The year's gardening work is finished. Take some time off.

Many companies have realized that giving their employees time off of work can actually increase productivity and quality of work when their employees return. This is especially true in reference to creativity. Progressive companies like Google are known to give employees an entire month off in an effort to boost creativity. Removing yourself from direct mental and physical engagement with your work allows you to return to your work refreshed and with a new perspective. Simply being able to rest and refresh the mind and body will lead to improved results when one returns. A change of scenery and a break from the ordinary routine can produce new insights.

If you kept records of your garden, now is a good time to look them over and think about the next year. 

Real Estate in 2014

Here are a few predictions about where the market is likely headed this year. **Home sales -** Sales are expected to continue to outperform 2013 levels in markets with hot economies. In the Metro DC market we don't anticipate any slowing whatsoever.

Values - While sales will be more intense in some markets and just as steady or slightly cooler in others, home values will increase all around. This is because demand continues to be really strong and the shortage will create more intense situations for buyers – more competition, more multiple bids. All of this points to increased home values.

Inventory - As already mentioned above, inventory again in 2014 will pose challenges in some markets. The good news is that rising home values have put homeowners in a better place overall last year and pulled a lot more owners out of negative equity. That means more freedom to sell. We do still expect

lower inventory than demand in certain areas – namely those that have had the worst inventory situations in the last few years as they are still trying to catch up with the pent-up demand.

Mortgage rates - Mortgage rates are at incredibly low levels, yet every time there's a slight uptick the market goes crazy. Mortgage rates do impact home sales to a certain degree. And while we expect some little increases here and there this year, the Fed hasn't indicated any major moves in the near future that would impact rates – and therefore home sales - on a serious level.

The economy - Trying to predict the economy is like trying to control an angry teenager. It's a volatile situation that's nearly impossible to predict at times. So far, the news we're hearing is of steady growth. But like many things in housing, the economy's impact on buyers and sellers really is more of a local thing. Where local economies strengthen, their housing markets follow.
