Replacing the Lubber Run Community Center

The Lubber Run Community Center (LRCC) is the focus of the January 18 AFCA meeting at 7 PM in the Barrett School Library. The guest speaker will be Laura Lazour from the Arlington County Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR). Her presentation is part of the County's community engagement process to work through the design of the new \$47.5 million LRCC and its outdoor amenities.

Last month, the County Board awarded a \$3.9 million contract to VMDO, Inc. (the firm that designed the recently-opened Discovery Elementary School) to design the new LRCC. The County will require a minimum of LEED Silver Certification for the project. Construction is expected to start in late 2018.

The new center will be up to four stories high with an

underground parking structure. It will include a gymnasium, playground areas, and green space. It will accommodate relocation of the senior program from Culpepper Garden, as well as continue the DPR preschool program. DPR's Sports and Recreation Division staff which is currently split between LRCC and an office elsewhere will be consolidated at the new community center.

The January AFCA meeting will be an excellent opportunity to learn more about the project and provide your input. Ms. Lazour will also be available to answer questions about other issues involving Arlington parks.

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

10 tips to whip your home into shape and wow potential buyers by HGTV

Improve your landscaping. Curb appeal is crucial to a good first impression, so make sure your home's lawn is immaculate. Ancient Rocks Along Our Creeks By Hutch Brown

In strolling down by our creeks, you might have noticed eroded banks with rounded rocks of various sizes packed into the soil. You can often find these densely packed stream banks just above the bedrock along the creeks. If you're like me, you probably thought nothing of it. The dirt beneath the trees has rocks in it -- so what?

Here's what: Those dense deposits of stone and dirt just above the bedrock are more than 100 million years old. Directly overlying the bedrock in our area is something called the Potomac Formation on geologic maps. I expected it to be rock, but it turned out to be erosion scars of packed soil and rocks. So where did it come from?

The Potomac River we know is only a few million years old. Over the past 200 million years or so, forerunners of the Potomac have crisscrossed our geographic area, depositing all kinds of sediments. Some of them hardened into rock. From about 140 million years ago to about 100 million years ago, forerunners of the Potomac River deposited sediments in our area -- a mixture ranging from rocks, to pebbles, to sand and silt. The sediments are so densely packed that you have trouble picking them apart, even with a shovel. But they are not solid rock.

Due to development, erosion along our creeks has exposed the sediments. You can tell that the exposed stones are river rocks, because they are rounded by abrasion after tumbling for many miles downstream from points west. You can even find Blue Ridge rocks such as quartzite. Some show traces of fossils from creatures living in the sands of ancient seas.

So the gravels along our creeks have rocks of all kinds. If you look carefully, who knows what you might find?

Arlington County Sales Update.

2016 was a year of stability and light growth for Arlington real estate with 2,933 total transactions and \$1.87 billion in total sales volume. The average net sold price for all housing was \$636,839, and the median average price for a single-family home averaged \$912,000 in the last 12 months. Arlington saw a price increase of .15%, while maintaining its 2015 market pace of an average of 49 days on market per sale.

Arlington Forest Sales Update. 42 properties closed in Arlington Forest in 2016 per MRIS data. The average list price was \$711,812 and average sold price was \$715,571, with an average of 24 days on the market. In 2015 there were 30 listings sold with an average sold price of \$703,225.

Mortgage Financing Update. Since the election rates are up about .5%. Current 30 yr. fixed rates are at 4% for conforming loans (\$424,100 or less),

\$4.125% for both super conforming (up to \$636,150) and Jumbo loans as well. FHA/VA rates are 3.5% (conforming loans) and 3.625% for higher amounts. One of my preferred lenders is now offering down payment protection for the full amount of the homebuyer's down payment, in the event of a loss when you sell in a down market. Predictions for 2017. There will be more first-time buyers entering the market, but they will face new challenges. When inventory (supply) is thin and demand is unchanged, prices typically rise. It is expected that inventory supply will not increase, and affordability will still be a challenge in major markets. Mortgage rates are likely to increase throughout 2017. In places where affordability is already an issue, seeing these small bumps will have a slight dampening effect, primarily for first-time homebuyers or lower income folks

Around the Forest

High School Boundaries: On December 1, the School Board voted 5-0 to adopt a high school boundary revision plan that did not change Arlington Forest's high school designations. The vote was preceded by a motion by School Board member Reid Goldstein to include Arlington Forest in the boundary revision plan. His motion failed 4-1. Shortly thereafter, APS announced that discussions will begin in February to determine where 1,300 additional high school seats will be built by 2022 and what the instructional focus of those seats will be. It is likely that the new seats will be next door to Washington-Lee on the site of the Education Center. A key issue to be determined is whether the seats will be a new County-wide high school program or a 9th grade annex for W-L. That decision will impact the extent to which additional high school boundary changes are needed in 2022.

Edison Park Planning Meeting: If you have suggestions for updating the N. Edison St. playground then mark your calendars for Wednesday, January 25, 7 to 8 pm at Lubber Run Community Center, Room 204. Please join Arlington County Landscape Architect Shannon Early and fellow park users in envisioning a renewed Edison Park. AFCA has identified this park's renewal as a priority for funding through the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee (NCAC). At this first Scoping Meeting, community members will help to identify which park improvements are desired and appropriate for the space. County staff will then develop a concept plan and cost estimate that must be approved by AFCA before it can be presented to the NCAC to request funding. Oh Deer: Deer are increasingly venturing into our neighborhood streets at night from parkland around Four Mile Run and Lubber Run. For example, they are a common sight in the front yards of the first block of N. Granada St during hours of darkness. For your own safety and the safety of our furry neighbors, please drive slowly and cautiously between dusk and dawn. If one deer darts in front of your car, there may be two or three others close behind. According to the Animal Welfare League of Arlington, more than 25 deer are killed each year in Arlington in vehicular collisions. That count apparently excludes the federally-controlled George Washington Parkway were car-deer collisions are frequent.

AFCA Dues Drive: The results are in from our fall dues drive that requested \$10 from each household to support AFCA's activities. A total of 365 of the 851 households in Arlington Forest paid their 2016-2017 dues. Participation rates are Southside-47%, Greenbrier Section-44%, and Northside-39%. That is up 70 members from last year — prompted in part by the 40+ residents who paid dues at the October AFCA meeting to be eligible to vote on the resolution regarding high school boundaries.

Snow Watch: Now is the time to check your shoveling supplies and make plans to clear your sidewalks of snow and ice. The safety of your neighbors requires that all residents adhere to the County code which requires clearing snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours after snowfall ceases (within 36 hours if snowfall exceeds 36 inches). Despite the 24-hour rule, the County urges shoveling "as soon as possible" since snow and ice left for any length of time could cause a pedestrian to fall and be injured. Moreover, freshly fallen snow is much easier to remove than snow that has been compacted into ice by neighbors walking by. Any resident who is unable to shovel due to ill health, travel, or other reasons should coordinate for someone else to do the work. A low-cost option is to utilize "Kids for Hire" on page 10 of this newsletter for a list of energetic neighborhood students who stand ready to assist. That list has now expanded to 41 youths offering reasonably-priced help with babysitting, yard work, pet sitting, and other tasks.

Decision 2016: In the November 8 election, the Arlington Forest precinct recorded 995 votes for Hillary Clinton (72.4%), 293 votes for Donald Trump (21.3%), and 85 votes for other candidates. An additional 10 voters did not cast a ballot for president, but voted for other offices. Not voting at all were 1,003 of the precinct's 2,386 registered voters.

Best of Arlington: In Arlington Magazine's annual readers' survey, the Ballston restaurant SER (www.ser-restaurant. com) serving Spanish food, owned by Greenbrier Section residents Christiana Campos-Candon and Javier Candon, was named "Best Ambiance" and was one of the top votegetters for "Best Restaurant."





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
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
