Katie Cristol to Address AFCA Meeting

County Board Chair Katie Cristol is the guest speaker at the AFCA monthly meeting on Wednesday, January 17, at 7 pm in the Barrett School library. She will discuss issues facing Arlington and answer questions. This is your opportunity to hear from, and provide input to, the County Board's Chair.

Ms. Cristol was elected in November 2015 as the first member of the Millennial generation on the Board. As Board Chair for 2018, she announced her top priorities are affordable housing and Metro funding. She serves on the Joint Subcommittee on Facilities of the Arlington School and County Boards. Her role on that subcommittee makes her especially knowledgeable of issues concerning the impact on school enrolment of Arlington's population growth. At the meeting, we will also get a short update on the proposal to hold a Saturday-morning Farmer's Market in the Barrett School parking lot. A meeting was held on January 10 at Barrett School that sought to attract residents willing to serve as a local market committee to help launch and sustain the market.

Finally, the results are in from our fall dues drive that requested \$10 from each household to support AFCA's activities. A total of 338 of the 851 households in Arlington Forest paid their 2017-2018 dues. That is 27 fewer than last year despite the new option to pay online. Participation rates are Greenbrier Section-43%, Northside-39%, and Southside-33%.

County Projects Update

Carlin Springs Bridge: Work began on December 8 with the demolition and removal of the southern span (northbound lanes). Upon completion of the new southern half, demolition and replacement of the northern half will take place. The bridge will remain single-lane in each direction until its replacement opens in late 2019. Electronic message boards will alert drivers to temporary detours when appropriate.

Arlington Boulevard and Park Drive: Work continues on the intersection safety improvements (including storm drain upgrades). The project is scheduled to be completed by summer.

Lubber Run Community Center: County staff continue working with architects and the construction manager to finalize the design. The County will hold a community briefing in the news few months to update interested residents.

Edison Street Playground: An update on the proposed playground replacement will be provided at the February AFCA meeting.

Traffic Circle: This spring, the County plans to plant a Scarlet Oak tree and remove the vines in the shopping center traffic circle where the American Holly tree stood for 76 years until its removal last July. AFCA will install a plaque honoring Joe Cockrell who tended the Holly tree for decades.

Make your Yard a Wildlife Sanctuary: Want to turn your yard into a welcoming space for birds, butterflies and other native wildlife? The Audubon at Home Wildlife Sanctuary certification program can help you make your yard more wildlife friendly by providing information on sustainable gardening practices. These practices include using native plants, removing invasive species, reducing use of pesticides and fertilizers, and creating space for native flora and fauna. Audubon at Home ambassadors will visit your yard to consult with you on suitable native plants, landscaping, water retention, or other best practices. To learn more, visit audubonva.org.

Family Skate Night: Bring the whole family to Thomas Jefferson Community Center for Family Skate Night Saturday evenings 6:30-9 p.m. through March. Personal Emergency Preparedness By John Naland

Arlington Forest has experienced multi-day power outages a half-dozen times in the last 20 years due to wind storms, hurricanes, and snow storms. It is inevitable that such events will reoccur. Thus, even in our urban environment, we must be prepared to fend for ourselves for a few days. Below are suggestions on how to take charge of our own personal preparedness for natural or other emergencies.

-- Always maintain a five-day supply of non-perishable food, water, pet supplies, and medications.

-- Prepare an emergency kit of essential items: first aid supplies, battery-powered or hand-crank radio, flashlights, extra batteries, and cash (merchants cannot process credit cards when telephone lines are down).

-- Fill your car gas tank if a storm is approaching.

-- Recharge mobile phones and other portable devices.

-- If a power outage is likely, turn off and unplug any nonessential electrical equipment to protect them from possible power spikes.

-- During a power outage, refrigerator food is safe as long as power is out no more than 4 hours. Keep the door closed as much as possible.

-- A freezer section that is half full will hold food safely for 24 hours without power. A full freezer will hold food safely for 48 hours. Do not open the freezer door.

-- Discard any perishable food (such as meat, poultry, fish, eggs, and leftovers) from either the refrigerator or freezer that has been above 40°F for over 2 hours.

-- Stay clear of all downed lines. Do not attempt to guess which ones are deadly power lines and which are potentially non-threatening telephone lines.

-- Show all family members how to turn off the water, gas and electricity at the main switches in the event of structural damage to your home.

-- Talk with neighbors about cooperating after a storm: A neighbor with an emergency generator could recharge cell phones. A neighbor with a chainsaw could clear downed branches. Younger residents could clear older neighbor's sidewalks of snow and ice.

-- If power goes out or you see a street blocked by trees or downed lines, report it to the power company or County by cell phone. Emergency response can be delayed if everyone assumes someone else reported it.

-- Avoid non-essential travel when road conditions or weather is poor.

-- Designate an out-of-town relative or friend as a telephone point of contact should your family members lose contact with each other.

Nature News

English Ivy is Destructive: Winter is a great time to identify and remove evergreen English Ivy. While many people find its 3-pointed, dark green glossy leaves to make pretty groundcover, if left unattended this invasive plant can weigh down large trees to the point of collapse. If allowed to cover fences, ivy can invade adjacent lawns and public parkland. But you can easily remove ivy by cutting all vines at the ground level. Cut them again several feet up the trunk and then carefully peel away the cut section of ivy. The remaining ivy will eventually dry out and die. Pull ground ivy back a few feet from the base of the tree to slow regrowth up the trunk.

Native Plants for Your Yard: Maybe you know a little about native plants and how they are important for the ecological functioning of our landscapes, including assisting our sagging populations of butterflies and other pollinators. Or maybe you just want some new ideas for beautifying your landscaping. Whatever your goal and knowledge level, the Plant NOVA Natives website at www.plantnovanatives.org includes easy-to-follow info to help you choose native species suited to your property. On the website, you will find a colorful guide to local native species, a list of local businesses that supply natives, and links to organizations that will come to your property to offer customized landscaping recommendations.

How will the new tax law impact the real estate market? Here are a few points to consider.

Mortgage Interest - Homeowners can still deduct interest payments on mortgage indebtedness for their primary residence and up to one other residence not to exceed \$750,000. Interest paid on any mortgage acquired on or prior to 12/15/17 will remain deductible under the former \$1,000,000 limitation (\$500,000 if single or married filing separately).

Starting in 2018 taxpayers will no longer to be allowed to deduct interest payments on home equity loans.

State and Local Taxes (SALT) – In 2018, itemized deductions for property taxes and local income taxes of individuals are limited to a combined total of \$10,000. Retirees in high tax states might feel some affect.

Overall, a small portion of homeowners may be affected with decreased tax write-offs, mostly those in the upper brackets above a \$900K price point, and the impact should be minimal.

About 70% of the population in the US don't itemize their taxes, and now the standard deduction has been increased.

Everyone must look at their overall tax situation and consult a CPA.


Snow Watch: Reminder - the safety of your neighbors depends on all residents adhering to the County code which requires clearing snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours after snowfall ceases (within 36 hours if snowfall exceeds 36 inches). Despite the 24-hour rule, the County urges shoveling "as soon as possible" since snow and ice left for any length of time could cause a pedestrian to fall and be injured. Moreover, freshly fallen snow is much easier to remove than snow that has been compacted into ice by neighbors walking by. Any resident who is unable to shovel due to ill health, travel, or other reasons should coordinate for someone else to do the work. A low-cost option is to utilize "Kids for Hire" on page 10 to find an energetic neighborhood student to assist. Make a contingency reservation now and then do not worry about it the rest of the winter.

Trash/Recycling Cart Repair: Is the lid broken off your County trash, recycling, or yard waste cart? Is there a big hole in the side? Is a wheel broken? To get it fixed, use the County's online "Report a Problem" application at https:// topics.arlingtonva.us/reportproblem. Click on "Residential Curbside Collections" and then on "Carts." Place the cart in front of your house and a repair truck will come to repair or replace it.

Yard Sale: Cold winter days are perfect for cleaning out closets and the basement in preparation for Arlington Forest's long-running annual Community Yard Sale. This year's event will be on May 19. With around 40 Arlington Forest households participating each year, the event attracts many bargain hunters drawn to the convenience of cruising though one area to visit many sales.

Recycling Tips: The County asks you not to enclose recyclables in a plastic bag or the sorting facility will discard the bag as trash. Instead, place cans, bottles and other recyclables loose in the blue cart. Also, never include loose plastic bags such as grocery sacks in the recycle cart as they can jam the sorting machinery. Finally, packing peanuts, bubble wrap, and plastic air pillows are not recyclable. For details, see https://recycling.arlingtonva.us/residentialbrochure/.




