Lubber Run Amphitheater 2019 Season: Celebrating a Half Century of Fun and Entertainment

Every night is special on this year's Lubber Run Amphitheater schedule of free family entertainment, but some are more special than others...and June 14th goes beyond that. That Friday date marks the 50th anniversary of Arlington's unique outdoor entertainment venue and the opening night of another exciting season of music under the stars right here in Arlington Forest.

Grammy-nominated performer Raul Midon (*see his profile at the end of this article) kicks off the 2019 summer season at 8 pm, but the 50th anniversary celebration begins at 7 pm when the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation

and Doodle Hoppers 4 Kids Toy Store in Falls Church provide free ice cream from a vintage 1969 Good Humor truck (while supplies last so get there early) along with 1969 tunes for listening and dancing. It's picnic time!

And there's more! Kids (and adults) can join in a sidewalk chalk drawing extravaganza and Foundation volunteers will interview young and old about their memories of Lubber Run Amphitheater. In event of rain, the celebration will begin at 7 pm on June 29 in conjunction with the scheduled 8 pm performance by Signature Theater.

This year's Lubber Run Amphitheater summer concert series runs through September 15. The schedule includes 30 programs covering the gamut of the lively arts: theater and dance, rock, hip hop, classical music, country and folk, world music, jazz/R&B and children's entertainment. The full schedule is printed on pages 8 and 9 of this newsletter -- suitable for pulling out to post on your refrigerator or otherwise keeping handy for reference throughout the season. As an Arlington County facility, Lubber Run Amphitheater concerts may be canceled due to inclement weather on relatively short notice.

Your generous donations to the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation (a 501(c)3 non-profit) at the amphitheater wishing well or to the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation, 107 N. Park Drive, Arlington VA 22203, fund children shows, other selected Amphitheater performances and special activities and events. This year, the Foundation will present three 11 am Sunday children shows:

- -- August 25 Wildlife Ambassadors: Immediately following this show at noon, the Foundation, in partnership with Lee Arts Center artists, will sponsor Wild Life, Wild Art in the Lubber Run Park pavilion, rain or shine. Kids will craft clay creations, and the Foundation will provide free pizza and drinks.
- -- September 8 Mad Science of DC (Rain date: September 22): Designed to spark imaginative learning and scientific literacy for children in preschool through grade 6.
- -- September 15 The Great Zucchini: The Great Zucchini was voted Washington Family Magazine's "Favorite Children's Entertainer" of 2017 and 2018.

Entertainer Profile:

Lubber Run Amphitheater 50th anniversary kickoff entertainer Raul Midon's impassioned acoustic guitar playing -- a mix of rock, classical, and flamenco - complements his smooth, relaxed voice. Blind since birth, Midon began playing drums early in his childhood before switching to guitar. He relocated to Miami for college in the '90s where he moonlighted as a background vocalist for Latin pop recordings. Word quickly spread of his talent as a singer and guitarist, inspired by singer/songwriters such as Hermeto Pascoal, Joni Mitchell, James Taylor, and Bill Withers.

Community Yard Sale - May 18



The map on the back cover of this newsletter depicts the participants who signed up for Arlington Forest Community Yard Sale before this issue's editing deadline. Sellers are encouraged to make photocopies of the map (also downloadable from the online Arlington Forester

at www.arlingtonforestva.org under the Newsletter tab) and display them alongside their merchandise so that, once shoppers find one sale site, they can pick up a map leading them to other sites.

In past years, additional sellers have participated without submitting their address to be marked on the map. So, as you walk around your neighborhood on yard sale morning, you may find additional sellers.

Suggestions on how to run a successful sale include: display items in shopper-friendly ways, sort clothes by size and toys by user age, have grocery sacks on hand, price items reasonably, accept only cash, be ready to make change, and watch your money. To snag buyers who make yard sales their business, start setting up at 7 am. In late morning, people come out looking for close-out prices. If left with large items that you simply want to get rid of, leave them at the curb with a "free" sign and they will probably be gone by Sunday afternoon.

Sale participants living near Arlington Blvd, Carlin Springs Rd., George Mason Dr. and Henderson Dr. are encouraged to post signs pointing into the neighborhood and to their sales (please remove signs at day's end). AFCA will also post signs at strategic points.

In addition, AFCA has placed classified ads in the Washington Post and the Sun Gazette and online ads on Craigslist, the Arlington Patch, and YardSaleSearch.com. The ads mention the May 19 rain date.

For many people, yard sale success is not measured by profit, but by how much unwanted stuff is moved out instead of left cluttering rooms, basement or attic. The sale is also a great community event. Families can say hello to neighbors down the block and strike their own bargains. Kids can set up a lemonade stand.

So, whether you are a seller, buyer or both, please come out on Saturday morning, May 18. The yard sale will proceed if there is drizzle or passing light showers. But if substantial rain is forecast, AFCA will send a message on its listsery to shift to rain date May 19.

There has been a lot written on millennials and their impact on the housing market. Some claim this generation is becoming the largest share of first-time home buyers, while others claim millennials don't want to own a home, blaming them for the dip in homeownership rate. While it's true that millennials are buying homes later in life than their parents did, they are not solely to blame for today's housing market trends. Freddie Mac's Insight Report explored the impact of the Silent and Baby Boomer Generations on the housing market. Why are millennials unable to find a home to buy at a young age like their predecessors? The answer: Seniors born after 1931 are staying in their homes longer than prior generations, instead choosing to "age in place." This trend accounts for about 1.6 million houses held back from the market through 2018, representing one year's typical supply of new construction, or more than half of the current shortfall of 2.5 million housing units estimated in December's Insight.

Older Americans prefer to age in place because they are satisfied with their communities, their homes, and their quality of life. According to the National Association of Realtors, inventory of homes for sale is currently at a 3.5-month supply, which means that nationally we are in a seller's market. Locally we have about a one month supply. A 'normal' housing market requires 6-7 months inventory, a level we have not achieved since August 2012. The most important fundamental in today's housing market is the lack of houses for sale. This shortage has been identified as an important barrier to young adults buying their first homes. If you are one of the many seniors who desires to retire in the same area you've always lived, you're not alone.

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Around the Forest

Edison Park Playground: On April 24, AFCA voted 17-0 to approve the Final Design for the Edison Park renovations. The design includes separate play areas for age groups 2-5 and 5-12 and multigenerational swings, with improved circulation for accessibility and park use; new site furnishings – benches, picnic tables, bike racks, trash and recycle cans; reforestation (required) and additional plantings for shade, beautification and pollinators; maintenance and improvement of trail through the use of grass-pave or a similar engineered product for trails; and stormwater management to reduce erosion. This \$760,00 Neighborhood Conservation Project now moves into the engineering and contracting phase. Construction is expected to begin in March or April of next year with the removal of existing playground equipment. The new park is scheduled to open in fall of 2020. Save the Date: Community Yard Sale on Saturday, May 18th Spring Cleanup: We had a good turnout for the ninth annual Arlington Forest Spring Cleanup on Saturday morning, April 27. Groups of neighbors removed trash from the streambed in Lubber Run Park and cleaned up the buffer strip on the southside of Arlington Blvd. At the foot of N. Granada St. (see photo), neighbors scoured the Four Mile Run flood plain between N. Carlin Springs Dr. and Arlington Blvd filling five bags with trash and pulled numerous oversize objects out of the steam for the County to haul away. AFCA thanks the volunteers for their efforts to preserve our green spaces and remove trash that otherwise would have been washed down to the Potomac River and eventually into Chesapeake Bay.





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Nature News

Major Recycling Change: The County Board voted unanimously on April 25 to ask residents to stop placing glass in their blue recycling carts. Instead, the County now asks residents to discard their glass containers in their black trash carts. The County will be notifying customers by mail and via informational hangers on their waste collection carts.

A significant drop in the market value of glass recyclables means it is no longer economically or environmentally sustainable for the County to collect them via single-stream recycling. With markets as they are, recycling centers that receive materials from Arlington and other localities are frequently depositing glass in landfills rather than forwarding them on to recycling facilities. Also, broken glass can contaminate other recyclables rendering them unrecyclable.

Last year, glass accounted for almost a quarter of the contents by weight inside blue recycling carts in Arlington. The County will save money in processing costs for each ton of glass left out of single-stream residential recycling since it costs less to process. The County expects to pass the savings along to customers through a decrease in the Household Solid Waste Rate.

Glass placed in black trash carts is collected for incin-

tion to produce electricity at the Covanta Waste-to-Energy facility in Alexandria. The plant can process 975 tons of waste each day, producing 21 megawatts of energy, enough to power some 20,000 homes. The melted glass is currently discharged as ash and sent to the Fairfax County Ash Monofil, but Covanta is evaluating whether the ash, including glass residue, can be used in paving and other projects.

Alternately, residents can bring their glass containers to one of two County recycling drop-off centers: Quincy Park (N. Quincy St. and Washington Blvd.) or the Trades Center (2700 S. Taylor St. in Shirlington). Glass dropped off there will travel to Fairfax County to be crushed and turned into sand and gravel for use in paving, construction, and land-scaping.

Recycling Reminder: Do not place your recyclables in plastic bags. Items enclosed in plastic bags are discarded at the sorting facility which does not have time to open plastic bags (even see-through bags) to determine if they contain recyclables. Instead, place cans and other recyclables loose in the blue recycling cart. Also, never include plastic bags such as grocery sacks in the recycling cart as they can jam the sorting machinery.

Notable Neighbor

Jennifer Sauter-Price is a woman who has visions. And when she dreams, she dreams in purple. Jennifer is the visionary behind the start-up nonprofit R.E.A.D. (Read Early And Daily). It's an organization dedicated to putting new, quality books in the hands of children and parents of diverse backgrounds who might not have the luxury of owning books. Not only does R.E.A.D. supply free books, the organization offers guidance to parents about sharing the reading experience.

"The importance of reading to children from birth, cannot be over emphasized," said Jennifer, backing up her claim with scholarly statistics. She comes equipped with Master's degrees in child development and clinical social work. "By the age of three, 85 per cent of a child's brain is developed. Verbal interaction is critical, talking, singing and especially reading. "And having books in the home is key.

According to Jennifer, children who come to school without having books and reading are measurably behind their peers. In her initial attempts to promote reading, Jennifer pulled on her pajamas and showed up to chair book fairs at Barrett Elementary school. Being known as "Pajama Mama" delighted the students and created the attention she had hoped to draw to the books. She went on to serve as president of the Barrett PTA.


In the meantime, she worked for the nonprofit the Reading Connection which provided books to low income children. When the Reading Connection was dissolved, she knew she had a new challenge and R.E.A.D. was born. It has developed a two-pronged approach, selling books to provide funding and giving books.

At bookfairs and pop-up stores across the area, Jennifer sells books for young readers. Her stock consists of culturally relevant literature highlighting diversity and inclusiveness. During the first year of operation in 2018, the fledgling organization sold close to 1,000 books at 10 pop up events and one book fair. Because of these sales R.E.A.D. was able to give nearly 500 new books to almost 200 children.

At Clarendon Day, craft fairs, and other venues, Jennifer has set up her book racks and displayed reading materials. Moving books from place to place requires heavy lifting and often family members are pressed into service. Husband Vince has assisted with transporting boxes and book racks. Also helping are daughters Grace, a student at Duke Ellington School for the Arts, and Delaney, who attends Kenmore Middle School.

Jennifer's big dream is purchasing a book bus and paint-....continued on page 10

ing it purple. Purple and orange are the bold logo colors of R.E.A.D. The goal is to fill the bus with reading material and go directly to community centers where books can be given to families.

May 28: Final PTA Meeting of the year at 6:30 PM



This is the last installment of Barrett Elementary news before the Arlington Forester takes its summer break. Here are some of the exciting things happening throughout the Barrett community this spring:

On Spring Garden Workday, Barrett welcomed staff, students, parents, and Arlington Forest neighbors to help pull weeds and spread mulch. We appreciate everyone's contributions to the beauty of Barrett!

The Barrett "On-Target Tigers" 5th grade team competed in a Math Dice competition, and two Barrett students were among the eight runners-up. In Math Dice, players roll two 12-sided target dice and multiply them to get a target number, then they roll three scoring dice and combine these numbers using addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, or even powers to build an equation that is closest, or equal to, the target. Congratulations to Math Dice coach Ms. Tercero (5th grade teacher) and the team!

The 4th grade took a field trip to Gunston Hall, the historic home of George Mason (just 25 miles from Bar-

rett), to learn about the lives of the people, both free and enslaved, who lived there. This is part of the 4th grade Virginia Studies curriculum. Visitors to Gunston Hall can see the kitchen yard, with a reconstructed kitchen, dairy, and laundry; the schoolhouse, including the tutor's quarters; the burying ground; and the garden.

Barrett kindergarteners became junior explorers of Arlington Forest and surrounding homes when they set out on a walk to identify and sketch things that make the Barrett neighborhood unique.

Early May (after submission of this article but before distribution of the newsletter) features Teacher Appreciation Week, which includes catered meals for teachers, cards made by students, and recess coverage. Barrett families welcome this opportunity each year to show the teachers how much they are valued. In addition, Barrett students participate in walk/bike to school day. Walkers/ bikers will get fresh fruit snacks and can participate in an obstacle course on the blacktop.


