Virtual AFCA Meeting: Deer Overpopulation

With large in-person gatherings not possible, AFCA will hold a virtual meeting via Zoom web conferencing on Wednesday, May 20, at 7 PM.

The meeting with begin with AFCA President Esther Bowring providing a short update on issues of neighborhoodwide interest, including the County's plans to delay the opening of the new Lubber Run Community Center (see article below).

The focus of the meeting will be a presentation about the growing deer population by the Arlington Regional Master Naturalists (ARMN). Virginia's White-Tailed Deer were almost driven to extinction a century ago, but their numbers are so high today that they are destroying habitat for other wildlife and undermining the valuable ecosystem services provided to us by our forests.

In this presentation, we will learn how this population

cycle has occurred, and what it means for our parks, forests, and neighborhood. We will also hear about how some of our neighboring jurisdictions have chosen to approach the problem. In this virtual presentation, ARMN will show a PowerPoint slide show and will welcome questions.

Lubber Run Community Center Opening Delayed for at Least a Year By Esther Bowring

Arlington, like other cities and states, is facing plummeting tax revenues due to the COVID-19 virus crisis. Arlington now estimates that revenues will drop by \$56 million. The County is therefore revising its Fiscal Year 2021 budget (which begins July 1, 2020) to make up this shortfall.

Unfortunately, the savings plan includes delaying the opening of the Lubber Run Community Center, which was scheduled for this fall. The delay of at least a year will realize a savings in operational costs of more than \$1 million. Construction of the building and outdoor space will be completed as originally planned, but the building will remain closed.

A bit of good news is that the outdoor park and playground will open to the public as soon as the project is completed. Over the coming months, AFCA will monitor the County's budget situation. Should the revenue situation improve considerably, there may be an opportunity to request an opening of the Center during FY 2021. AFCA will keep you informed.

Neighborhood Conservation Survey

A big THANK YOU to the 197 households who completed the survey that was announced in the March newsletter and in several AFCA listserv messages. Your responses and comments will guide drafters of the plan's chapters and recommendations.

Here are the next steps in updating our Neighborhood Conservation Plan:

1. Volunteer drafters update Plan chapters, using survey data and comments.

2. Reviewers with knowledge or interest in a chapter's topic (e.g. infrastructure, transportation, housing) comment on updated chapters.

3. The draft Plan is posted on the AFCA website for residents to review.

4. In the fall, we will discuss as a community the Plan update and recommendations, and then vote on whether to revise or submit the Plan to the County Board for approval.

Note: Since our April 1 AFCA meeting with County Board member Christian Dorsey to discuss the Missing Middle Study was pre-empted by COVID-19, our neighborhood did not have the chance to discuss the study's search for ways to expand the supply of Arlington housing affordable for middle-income residents. Therefore, the Neighborhood Conservation Plan survey did not include questions related to the study.

Edison Park Project

Construction begins this month on Arlington Forest's Edison Park Neighborhood Conservation Project. Many thanks to the County Neighborhood Conservation Program and Department of Parks and Recreation teams for their hard work and creativity, and to the dozens of Arlington Foresters who helped build consensus on project scope and design features over the past two years.

The final plan reflects the Forest's collective wishes for separate play areas for ages 2-5 and 6-12, a swing, tables and amenities, native plantings, upgraded accessibility and safety features, and stormwater improvements. New shade trees on the Resource Protection Area abutting the streambed will help limit erosion, improve water quality downstream, and provide welcome cool shade.

Street parking will be restricted during construction which is scheduled to be completed late this year. The current playground was originally a small parking lot and was converted to a playground in the late 1970s after years of advocacy by local resident Mary Alice Glover.

Support Arlington Forest Shopping Center Businesses By Natalie Roisman

The Virginia COVID-19 executive orders have significantly impacted the Arlington Forest Shopping Center. Here is how you can support the businesses we are fortunate to call neighbors:

Brooke Rental Center, 703-243-2122. Business has been light, but Brooke is open Monday-Saturday, 7:30 am-5:30 pm. While rentals of catering supplies are down, Brooke encourages customers to use this time for household jobs. Available equipment includes carpet cleaners, lawn aerators, and power washers.

Outback Steakhouse, 703-527-0063. Outback may re-open with limited seating when the executive order expires. For now, from 11 am-9 pm (10 pm on Saturday), Outback is open for curbside pick-up and delivery only.

Crystal Thai, 703-522-1311. Crystal Thai is open Monday-Thursday 11:30 am-9:45 pm, Friday 11:30 am-10 pm, Saturday 12 pm-10 pm, and Sunday 12 pm- 9:45 pm, with no dine-in seating. When business is very slow, they may close around 8:30 pm. For pick-up, Crystal Thai has placed marks on the floor to encourage customers to stand six feet apart. In addition, the restaurant does a full cleaning every evening.

Full Motion Life and Sport, 703-536-5900. Full Motion Life and Sport is seeing chiropractic patients regularly, in-

cluding some new patients whose chiropractors are closed. Patients may wait in their cars instead of the waiting area. Healthcare professionals are masked.

New Forest Valet, 703-525-4354. Business for the dry cleaner is down to 15% of their usual level. They urge Arlington Foresters to clean out your closets, pull out anything that needs cleaning -- blankets, table linens, etc.-and bring it in. If you do not want to enter the shop, they will meet you outside. Everyone on staff wears gloves and masks.

Brick's Pizza, 703-243-6600. The pizza shop, which is primarily take-out, has remained open. They have not had the same challenges as other restaurants and stores in the shopping center but would still welcome your business!

Sense of Place Café, 319-0414. With the removal of in-store seating and fewer customers visiting for take-out beverages and baked goods, COVID-19 has been challenging for Sense of Place. Beer and wine hours are canceled until further notice, and the shop is operating a reduced schedule 9 am-1 pm each day (except Monday).

Fashion Nails and Crystal Salon and Spa are closed. Keep an eye out for information about their re-opening once permitted.

Northern Virginia saw a total of 1,815 homes sold in March 2020, a 14.58% increase above March 2019 home sales of 1,584. The average home sale price rose by 8.89% compared with last March, to \$649,118. The March 2019 average sale price was \$596,142. Arlington's average sales price was \$755,323, up \$12.6%. April sales data is not yet available as of this writing.

In a time where conducting business has become virtually impossible, Northern Virginia real estate transactions were virtually possible during the month of March and April. Advances in technology, combined with initiative and creativity, have enabled those who must buy or sell a home during the COVID-19 crisis to do so – while maintaining compliance with mandated safe business practices. Historical analysis shows that pandemics are usually V-shaped (sharp recessions that recover quickly enough to provide little damage to home prices), and recent research shows the current slowdown is playing out similarly thus far. With businesses starting to slowly open back up again in many parts of the country, it's important to understand

how housing can have a major impact on the recovery of the U.S. economy. *Real estate is a driving financial force in this process*. Between residential investment and consumption spending on housing services, *real estate contributes on average between 15-18% of GDP*. With a strong US real estate market, housing is poised to help lead the way in the economic recovery.

With my local and national real estate connections, all report that showing activity was on the rise in April and prices are holding firm in most parts of the country. Many areas of the nation are seeing strong buying activity, DC area included. We are still experiencing multiple offers in Arlington with strategic marketing and pricing.

Cancellations: The County has cancelled the Lubber Run Amphitheater's 2020 performances. AFCA's neighborhood-wide yard sale is cancelled for this year. Also cancelled is AFCA's annual park cleanup, but you are encouraged to do mini cleanups on your own (see page 7). AFCA's Home and Garden Tour is postponed to next spring.

Keep Informed: Over the past two months, AFCA sent out several messages on its listserv updating residents on impacts of the virus crisis on our neighborhood. World Class Run: Arlington Forest's ultra-marathoner Michael Wardian outlasted 2,300 runners from 50 countries in "Backyard Quarantine Ultra" virtual race conducted via Zoom and social media in April. He ran 262.52 miles doing a loop in the Greenbrier Section for 63 hours without stopping to sleep. **Notable Neighbors:** We note the passing of two long-time residents:

-- Timothy F. O'Leary, Jr, passed away in March at age 75 after a long battle with cancer. He served as AFCA president from 1986 to 1988. He also served for over a decade as AFCA's representative to the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee, playing a key role in securing County funding for the 2006-2011 project that eradicated invasive plants from Lubber Run Park.

-- Mayo Cox, of North Greenbrier Street passed away at age 94 in December 2019. He, his wife Muriel, and their three sons moved to Arlington Forest in 1964. He is survived by two sons and numerous grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.

Benefit Concert: Residents of the 100 block of N. Granada St. turned out in force on May 2 sitting along the sidewalk in camp chairs ten feet apart to hear a concert by neighbors to raise funds for the Arlington Food Assistance Center (AFAC). Former U.S. Army Band musician Tony Nalker organized the event and played piano. He was joined by neighbors Retta Laumann and Anna Nowalk on vocals. Current U.S. Army Band member Bob McDonald also sang several songs. They raised \$445 for AFAC while everyone enjoyed seeing each other.

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Lubber Run Community Center: Trees Are Coming Back! By Hutch Brown

Reconstruction of the Lubber Run Community Center meant removing trees from most of the site. Now that construction is nearing completion, soils are being prepared for replanting the site with trees, shrubs, flowers, and grasses.

Untouched areas on the site already have crepe myrtles, spectacular cherries, and more, including a signature climbing tree for kids, a mulberry. As an intern in the Arlington Tree Stewards program, I wondered what else might be coming, and the contractor readily gave me the plans. I was happy to see that the trees on the list are almost all native to our area.

About a hundred shade trees are planned. Most replicate the natural mix in Lubber Run Park, including various oaks, pignut hickory, tuliptree (also known as yellow poplar), and tupelo (aka blackgum). Half a dozen other species round out the collection, including sweetgum, hophornbeam, and American baldcypress, all present in our area. A couple of trees not native to our area -- southern magnolia and Kentucky coffeetree -- are also on the list.

No maples are included; red maple is overused as a street tree and therefore prone to infestation and die-off.

That is what happened to the American elm decades ago, yet American elm is on the list. It is a variety resistant to Dutch elm disease, and it's good to see it coming back!

Almost as many smaller trees are planned, including familiar varieties from our local woodlands, such as redbud, American holly, and hornbeam (with those smooth sinuous trunks you can see along Lubber Run). Pawpaw is on the list, along with sweetbay, fringetree, and serviceberry.



The Arlington officials responsible for our natural areas undoubtedly approved the selections. We can thank them for choosing so many native trees!

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Spring Cleanup

Social-distancing rules required the cancellation of AF-CA's ninth-annual Spring Cleanup last month, but individuals and family groups can still do mini cleanups to improve our public spaces for spring and summer enjoyment. If anything, the need is greater than usual since a side effect of the recent increased foot and bicycle traffic is more litter along our sidewalks and park trails.

Removing litter from lawns, sidewalks, streets, and parks keeps it from being washed into storm drains and then into our streams and rivers. Besides being unsightly, litter harms marine ecosystems. For example, many birds, fish, and other marine organisms die each year after ingesting plastics.

The place to start is in front of your house. Check it regularly to pick up plastics and other trash that may been dropped, blown in by the wind, or fallen from a trash truck.

If you walk, jog, or bike in our local parks or on paved multi-use trails, you can take along a trash bag the next time you go. When finished, either leave the tied-up trash sack next to a County trash can or carry it back to your home trash cart.

Barrett School News

Our community has faced unprecedented challenges over the past two months. We have seen great need in our Barrett community. Fortunately, the compassion and generosity of our school community is just as great. As the closure of the school year became permanent, the Barrett PTA and other members of the school community began an earnest effort to solicit and collect donations beginning in early April. Many teachers, friends, and families have stepped up -- through financial donations, grocery gift card donations, and many other creative ways -- to help support our effort.

In total, so far, we have received more than \$25,000 worth of monetary and grocery gift card donations. Through two rounds of distribution so far, we have given away about \$20,000 worth of grocery gift cards -- to 167 Barrett families in the first round, and 222 families in the second round. In addition, through funding provided by the PTA, we were able to provide 274 school supply kits to Barrett students. Many others have reached out to us to help with our effort. Managers from CVS and Macy's have provided many packages of candy as part of our distribution, while former Barrett PTA President, Jennifer Sauter-Price, provided books from her R.E.A.D organization.

A heartfelt thank you goes out to the Arlington Forest community -- many of you have donated and supported

our efforts in many ways. Without your support, we would not have been able to do what we've done -- the Barrett community will forever be grateful.

The spirit of our school continues to be strong throughout this pandemic. At our first-ever virtual PTA meeting in late April, almost 50 members joined in on the meeting to hear from two Barrett parents talk about the struggles of many families in our community.

Finally, after seeing a video (https://youtu.be/ mhIuXW_2IDw) put together by Barrett staff and teachers, dancing and singing to the tune of "I'm Still Standing", Sir Elton John retweeted the video, commenting, "The staff at @BarrettAPS recorded their own music video to @TaronEgerton's version of "I'm Still Standing" and it's so much fun!"
