
Help Prevent Larcenies from Autos By Captain Patrick Donahue Arlington County Police Department

The Police Department's First District has seen a significant increase in the number of larcenies from vehicles since February 1st. Please take some simple steps to help us curb these cases:

1) Take all valuables out of your vehicle. This includes keys, key fobs, purses, cash, and electronics. Don't forget the valet key that comes with some vehicles.

2) Lock your doors and pull on the door handle to verify it's locked. If a thief can get into a vehicle, they can have access to a garage door opener if you have one and can thus gain access to your home.

3) Call police if you see people looking into your cars or your neighbor's cars. The telltale sign that this has occurred in your neighborhood are open doors with the interior dome lights on. If you see a suspect in your vehicle, do not approach them and call 911 immediately. If you don't see the perpetrator(s) but suspect some cars have been entered, then call the non-emergency number at 703-558-2222. Thank you.



Nature News

Spring Wildflower Tour in Arlington Forest: April 15th, noon to 4 PM. Free. No registration required. Sponsored by the Virginia Native Plant Society, Potowmack Chapter, this tour welcomes Foresters to two neighborhood wildflower gardens which are quite different from each other: -- 233 N. Galveston St. Susan and Jim Graham's yard is tidy, compact, and was created as a collection of native plant

species. In the past few years, they have created a wellmanicured native plant garden in their front and back yards -a modest space- but they have planted more than 100 native species of wildflowers.

-- 210 N. Evergreen St. Paul Kovenock's hillside wildflower garden overlooks Lubber Run Park. It shows how many years committed to removing English ivy and other nonnative invasive species has provided a location for a garden that serves as the foundation for the diverse wildlife that thrives there. In 2009, a 40-minute DVD, "Habitat at Home," was produced by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries. Paul's garden was featured as one of four gardens selected state-wide as instructional examples.

Spring Cleanup: Mark your calendar for the morning of Saturday, April 22nd for AFCA's sixth annual Arlington Forest Spring Cleanup. We will pick up trash, remove invasive plants, and otherwise beautify our public spaces. Cleanup

sites will be the Lubber Run streambed, the Arlington Blvd southside buffer strip, and the Four Mile Run streambed at the foot of N. Greenbrier Street. Please join your neighbors at one of those sites. More details will appear in next month's newsletter.

Arlington Forest Park: Why is there three-foot high grass in some sections of the park across from Arlington Forest Shopping Center? Because our one-acre Arlington Forest Park has been on a reduced mowing cycle since 2012 when it was designated a Natural Resource Conservation Area by the County due to its once commonplace, but now rare, plant community called "dry gravel cap – poverty oat grass glade." But the park is still great for throwing balls, practicing golf chips, and eating pizza on the benches in nice weather.

Recycling Tips: Reminder - place cans, bottles and other recyclables loose in the blue cart. If they are enclosed in plastic bags, the sorting facility will discard that bag of items as trash. And never include plastic bags (such as grocery sacks) in the recycle cart because torn plastic bags can jam and damage sorting machinery.

Tips to prepare your home for viewing

- Open all curtains and blinds. This makes rooms look bigger and brighter, even at night.

Around the Forest

E-CARE: Do you have half-empty paint cans gathering dust in your basement? What about unneeded car fluids, household cleaners or garden chemicals? Or maybe an obsolete computer monitor or television? Arlington's semiannual E-CARE event allows residents to safely get rid of hazardous household materials and electronics which cannot be discarded in regular trash. The next E-CARE takes place between 8:30 AM and 3 PM on Saturday, April 15th (rain or shine) at Thomas Jefferson Middle School in the West Parking Lot. Just load up your car with the unwanted items and then drive through the various stations -- dropping off paint cans at one station, TVs at another station, and so on. There is a \$15 recycling fee for computers and \$20 fee for televisions. The non-profit group Bikes for the World will collect serviceable bikes to be sent to countries where they are needed for basic transportation. For more info, search "E-CARE" on the County website.

Organic Yard Waste Carts: Now that every house has a green organic waste cart, the County says that it will no longer collect yard waste in plastic bags. So use your organic cart or paper yard waste bags.

Scott and Sarah wanted a larger home and didn't want to deal with building an addition. We met to discuss options. Carlin Springs Road Bridge Replacement: At the February 15th AFCA meeting, County officials said that the project to replace the bridge at N. Carlin Springs Rd. and N. George Mason Dr. will start this coming fall with completion expected in winter 2018/19. During the 15 months of construction, vehicular traffic over the bridge will be limited to one lane each way while one and then the other side of the bridge is demolished and rebuilt. During two five-day periods of heavy demolition, the entire intersection will be closed (including N. George Mason Dr.) with traffic diverted accordingly. The County will hold a public meeting in early fall to update the community on construction plans, traffic disruptions, and detour routes. 
Lubber Run Community Center: Nearly 200 people, including County Board Vice Chair Katie Cristol, participated in the first community work session about the new Lubber Run Community Center on February 8th at Barrett Elementary. Participants contributed suggestions to the project's designers regarding the building and grounds features they prefer. Next community meetings will be in the Barrett gym on Wednesday, March 22nd, 6:30 to 9 PM and Saturday, March 25th, 1 to 3:30 PM. You only need attend one session since each will cover the same material. The County Board is expected to select the building construction contractor this summer. Construction is expected to start in late 2018 with completion in early 2021. To learn more, search "Lubber Run Community Center Project" on the County website.

Edison Playground Renewal: The second planning meeting for updating the Edison Park playground took place on March 8th while this newsletter was at the printer. See next month's newsletter for details.

Excess Cable: Are excess loops of cabling obstructing a sidewalk near you? If so, report the problem to the County official responsible for overseeing the cable companies. He is George Parr, Arlington County Cable Administrator, at 703-228-3142 or cable@arlingtonva.us.

Trash Can Etiquette: Long-standing Arlington Forest tradition and an Arlington County ordinance (Section 10-6.B.1.b and c) call for residents to return their trash carts and recycle bins to their normal storage location within 24 hours after trash pickup. That normal storage location may not be in front of a dwelling, unless fencing or landscaping shields the containers from view from the street. Help keep Arlington Forest looking good by promptly pulling back your trash and recycle cans.

Notable Neighbor: Melody Mobley By Kimi & Ryoko Reed

Meet a national treasure, Melody Mobley. Melody is a "forester" two times over, with being a professional forester, and as an Arlington Forester!

She has been an Arlington Forest resident since 1991. Prior to moving to Arlington Forest, she lived in cities and small towns all across the country, starting with Washington state through her work at the US Forest Service. She is the first African American woman forester in the United States. That is pretty historic; so much so that the National Museum of African American History even asked for her forester uniform and equipment to be included in the museum's collections.

But what is a forester, you might ask? Foresters are part of the US Forest Service. They manage the natural resources in our country. However, the US Forest Service is different from the US Park Service. The US Park Service focuses only on preservation. The US Forest Service does a lot more. They don't just take care of forests. They do a lot of other land management, such as fire management, timber sales, stream improvement, management and maintenance of trails and campgrounds, and seed and cone collection. They also do a lot of research in wildlife, water, biochemistry, and environmental assessment; in fact, the US Forest Service is the largest research agency in the world.

Melody grew up in Louisville, Kentucky, where she graduated from high school at age 16. She always liked animals and zoology, her love of them nurtured by her mother. She was studying zoology, and then wildlife biology at University of Louisville when the US Forest Service first offered Melody a job during college. This experience led her to change her college major to forest management at the University of Seattle.

Upon graduation, she was hired as a forester in 1977, making her the first African American woman in the US Forest Service. Melody moved a lot as a forester, moving nine times within 11 years to places such as Seattle, San Diego, Klamath Falls, Orlando, and Washington DC. At each location she learned something new and was able to help in many ways.



Advice she would give to students today is to get good grades and be flexible in your career plans. She said, "If you want to be a computer expert, maybe you want to do that in the park or forest service. It doesn't have to be at a technology company."

Now that she is retired from the Forest Service, she volunteers, writes books, and gives speeches to students about her experience as a forester. She wants to support students in an interest in forestry and STEM, saying, "For everyone who helped me, I want to help 10 more."

Melody likes living in Arlington Forest because of its closeness to Lubber Run; she loves hiking the trials with her dog. So if you see her on a walk through the neighborhood or on the trails in Lubber Run, say hello and shake hands with a national treasure!
