Tree Grant Program

This is the last call for this year's AFCA's tree grant program which offers matching grants to residents interested in planting a shade tree on their property. Grants of up to \$125 will cover one-half of the cost of buying and planting a tree.



There is a limit of two grants per property and the tree species must be on AFCA's list of approved shade trees. In ad-

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Successful Neighborhood Cleanup By John Naland

Around 80 Arlington Forest residents came out on a beautiful Saturday morning on April 27 to participate in AFCA's third annual Arlington Forest Spring Cleanup. Accompanying this article are photos of some of the volunteers in action. They tackled six sites:

At the foot of N. Granada St., some 20 volunteers filled ten garbage bags with trash and debris from Four Mile Run that otherwise would have floated on to the Potomac River and eventually Chesapeake Bay. These neighbors also do a fall cleanup each year at the site.

At the buffer strip on the southside of Arlington Blvd., around 20 volunteers picked up trash, weeded, pulled vines, raked leaves and beautified the area around the Arlington Forest sign. These neighbors have been doing annual cleanups of this area for years.

In Lubber Run Park, Cub Scout Pack 548 turned out in force with 18 scouts and parents collecting six garbage bags full of trash from the entire length of the stream between N. George Mason Dr. and Arlington Blvd.

Elsewhere in Lubber Run Park, 13 volunteers pulled invasive plants from the trail that leads down from the N. Edison St. playground.

Finally, five neighbors joined the County's invasive plant control coordinator, Sarah Archer, in cutting vines that were smothering trees in the parkland along N. Carlin Springs Rd. below the historic Mary Carlin house. They also removed trash from that area and from two gullies that lead down from Arlington Blvd into Four Mile Run.

AFCA thanks all of those who took the time to help out. If you missed this year's cleanup, you can protect our shared environment on any day by picking up trash that you see along your street or while on walks in our public spaces. You can also keep your calendar free in late-April 2014 to participate in our fourth annual neighborhood cleanup.

Nature News

By Cliff Fairweather Park Naturalist, Long Branch Nature Center Join us to celebrate the insect world's summer light show at the 5th Annual Firefly Festival on at Ft. C.F. Smith Park on June 30. Whether you call them fireflies or lightning

bugs, these bioluminescent (light generated by a living thing) beetles add sparkle to summer evenings. But there's a lot more to fireflies than pretty twinkling.

For fireflies, that twinkling is all about sending a message that's critical to creating the next generation. Those flashes that delight us are signals that help male and female fireflies find each other and mate. Each species has its own unique sequence of flashes, with timing, flight pattern, and non-flashing intervals carrying information about who's who. Some species even send false signals to lure other firefly species to a meal where they are the main course!

Not just the adults light up: firefly eggs, larvae, and pupae light up as well, although they don't flash in patterns. These immature stages glow to warn potential predators of their bad taste, caused by a steroid that is similar to the toxin released by glands in a toad's skin. The fireflies we see this summer started out as eggs and hatched out as larvae last summer. They spent the winter in the larval stage and pupated in late spring to emerge as the adults you may already be seeing.

A firefly manages to shine while generating very little heat. In fact, their light is 98 percent efficient, meaning that only two percent of the energy produced to light up is lost as heat. Compare that performance to an incandescent light bulb, which squanders 97 percent of its energy as heat! Even compact fluorescent bulbs can't match the efficiency of a lightning bug.

Join us to learn more about these unique creatures at our 5th Annual Firefly Festival June 30, from 7:30-9:30 p.m. at Fort C.F. Smith Park, 2411 N. 24th Street. Enjoy activities including bug hunts, games, crafts, walks, contests, talks about fireflies, and much more. Bring along your picnic blanket and dinner to enjoy as we wait for the sun to go down and the lights to come out.

The fee is \$7 per person and all ages are invited; preregister both children and adults online or at 703-228-4747 (program #642953-A) or pay at the event. This program will be cancelled in event of rain.

Market Update - Spring has arrived and the DC Metro housing market continues to pick up steam and is also experiencing price appreciation. The median sale price for March in the Washington DC Metro Region is 8.0% higher than this time last year, and the highest March median price in five years. The low inventory of active listings continues to put upward pressure on prices around the region. Single-family detached homes led all property segments in median price growth, up 12.0% from March 2012, a gain of \$50,000. The median sale price for townhomes is up 10.6% from last March, an increase of \$35,000. The median price for condos rose 3.4%, a gain of \$9,050.

Arlington County's average sold price for all home styles increased 7.13% to \$597,172 in March 2013 compared to \$557,420 last year. Single family home prices jumped 16.3% to \$818,124. Condos were up 7.4% to \$426,606, and the average price of of attached homes (townhouses and rowhouses), declined 2.1% \$445,373.

Low inventory continues across the region. There were 6,289 active listings in the DC Metro Region at the end of March, a drop of over 4,200 listings from 2012.
