Lubber Run Amphitheater 2018 Season By Chris Scheer

As an Arlington Forest sun-dappled summer afternoon gives way to a starry evening, gather family and friends and bring a picnic to enjoy the arts at the free Lubber Run Amphitheater summer concert series (located in the heart of Arlington Forest at North Columbus and 2nd Street North). The series runs June 15th through September 16th, Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sundays at 6 p.m. Four children/family programs are scheduled for select Sundays at 11 a.m. (see schedule on pages 8 and 9).

The Lubber Run Amphitheater is a summertime concert venue owned and operated by Arlington County Cultural Affairs, a Division of Arlington Economic Development.

Amphitheater programs bring people together and allow residents of all ages and interests to enjoy entertainers representing varied forms of music and the arts. This year's schedule includes 31 programs covering the gamut of the lively arts: theater and dance, rock, hip hop, classical music, country and folk, world music, jazz/R&B and children's entertainment.

Four special programs aimed at kids and families are funded by the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation and include Rocnocerous Sunday July 8th, Reptiles Alive Sunday August 26th, ZigZag Sunday September 9th, and Mystic Drumz, Sunday September 16th.continued on page 2

Community Yard Sale - May 19th



The map on the back cover of this newsletter depicts the 30 participants who signed up for Arlington Forest Community Yard Sale before this issue's editing deadline. Sellers are encouraged to make photocopies of the map (also downloadable from the online *Arlington*

Forester at www.arlingtonforestva.org under the Newsletter tab) and display them alongside their merchandise so that, once shoppers find one sale site, they can pick up a map leading them to other sites.

In past years, additional sellers have participated without submitting their address to be marked on the map. So, as you walk around your neighborhood on yard sale morning, you may find additional sellers.

Suggestions on how to run a successful sale include: display items in shopper-friendly ways, sort clothes by size and toys by user age, have grocery sacks on hand, price items reasonably, accept only cash, be ready to make change, and watch your money. To snag buyers who make yard sales their business, start setting up at 7 am. In late morning, people come out looking for close-out prices.

If left with large items that you simply want to get rid of, leave them at the curb with a "free" sign and they will probably be gone by Sunday afternoon.

Sale participants living near Arlington Blvd, Carlin Springs Rd., George Mason Dr. and Henderson Dr. are encouraged to post signs pointing into the neighborhood and to their sales (please remove signs at day's end). AFCA will also post signs at strategic points.

In addition, AFCA has placed classified ads in the Washington Post and the Sun Gazette and online ads on Craigslist, the Arlington Patch, and YardSaleSearch.com. The ads mention the May $20^{\rm th}$ rain date.

For many people, yard sale success is not measured by profit, but by how much unwanted stuff is moved out instead of left cluttering rooms, basement or attic. The sale is also a great community event. Families can say hello to neighbors down the block and strike their own bargains. Kids can set up a lemonade stand.

So, whether you are a seller, buyer or both, please come out on Saturday morning, May 19th. The yard sale will proceed if there is drizzle or passing light showers. But if substantial rain is forecast, AFCA will send a message on its listsery to shift to rain date May 20th.

Escalation Addendums – are commonly used today when sellers set an offer deadline after the first full weekend on the market, with the presumption that all offers will be the best and final and the seller will decide soon after the deadline. This allows a buyer to make an offer at a starting price while agreeing to increase their offer to a higher price to compete with one or more offers higher than a buyer's initial offer. It includes a ceiling price value and an escalation factor, the amount your offer will increase by, over the next highest offer. Sellers like a compelling reason to choose the best offer (\$5,000 over the highest offer is more attractive than \$1,000). Coming up with a ceiling price is tricky since buyers don't want to overpay. The key component in an escalation addendum is whether the buyer will waive the appraisal contingency or retain it. In my experience with handling hundreds of multiple offer scenarios, most sellers will choose a buyer who waives the appraisal contingency, even if their price is lower than other higher offers that retain the appraisal. Appraisals are the lynch pin of any transaction with new financing.

Buyers aren't too fond of this practice although it allows them to offer as much as they're willing to pay for a home, without committing to pay a maximum price if nobody else in the market values the home as much. All it takes is two competing offers, and occasionally, only one offer materializes after the contract deadline passes, which benefits the buyer. Some buyers fear that they are revealing the highest price they will pay a seller and if there aren't other offers that justify automatically escalating there, the seller may attempt to negotiate the offer up close to the escalation ceiling. This is where having an experienced, savvy realtor on your side can be benefit your interests as a buyer or seller of the transaction.

Around the Forest

Traffic Circle: In late April, Arlington County planted a scarlet oak tree in the large traffic circle by the Arlington Forest Shopping Center (see photo). Since 1941, an American holly tree occupied that space until it finally succumbed to disease last summer. Last September, a survey was sent out to the Arlington Forest neighborhood requesting input on which type of tree was preferred to replace the old holly tree. The neighbors voted overwhelmingly for the scarlet oak.

Park Drive at Arlington Blvd: The County has completed the \$1.5 million project funded by VDOT to improve access and crossings for pedestrians, bus users, bikers, and motor vehicles utilizing the intersection of Arlington Blvd with Park Drive. The narrower vehicle lanes on the south side of the traffic circle are designed to stop drivers from exceeding the speed limit when entering our neighborhood streets at that location.

New at Shopping Center: Chiropractor "Full Motion Life and Sport" opened in the Arlington Forest Shopping Center last month in the space formerly occupied by Fiesta Oriental. For more info, go to www.fullmotionlifeandsport.com.

Bikeshare: A Capital Bikeshare Station location is likely to be installed along 1st Street North in front of the Arlington Forest Shopping Center early next year. In a recent survey of Arlington Forest residents, 85% responded in favor of the installation.




Honoring Joe

Successful Neighborhood Cleanup By John Naland

We had a good turnout for the eighth annual Arlington Forest Spring Cleanup on Saturday morning, April 21st.

Groups of neighbors removed trash from the streambed in Lubber Run Park and cleaned up the buffer strip on the southside of Arlington Blvd.

"Thank you very much for all your hard work, helping us maintain the environment" At the foot of N. Granada St. where I spent the morning, 25 neighbors scoured the Four Mile Run flood plain between N. Carlin Springs Dr. and Arlington Blvd filling ten large bags with trash. We also pulled numerous oversize rusty metal objects (rebar, fence posts, appliance parts) out of the forest for the County to haul away. Our

group also does a fall cleanup of this area every year. We have done these cleanups since 2008 – making this year our $10^{\rm th}$ year.

AFCA thanks the volunteers for their efforts to preserve our green spaces and remove trash that otherwise would have been washed down to the Potomac River and eventually into Chesapeake Bay. After the event, the Arlington County park maintenance supervisor e-mailed me saying

"Thank you very much for all your hard work, helping us maintain the environment of our beautiful County free of trash and contamination."

If you missed this year's cleanup, please join us next year -- especially if you frequently walk, jog, or bike in our local parks. Please note that you can protect our shared environment any day by picking up trash that you see along your street or in our neighborhood parks. Each week when you go to roll in your empty trash and recycle bins, please check the curb in front of your house for small items that may have fallen out. That will keep the next rainstorm from carrying the debris into our streams and rivers.

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Carlin Springs Road Pedestrian Safety Update

The weather is warming and many neighbors are taking advantage of one of the benefits of living in Arlington Forest -- the ability to walk to many local points of interest. Pedestrian safety is a concern for many Arlington Forest residents, especially for those who cross Carlin Springs Road (CSR).

Many families walk from their homes and cross at North Harrison Street to play tennis and swim at the Arlington Forest Club and access the bike trail. Neighbors cross at North Edison Street for many reasons: accessing public transit, enjoying pizza at Pupatella, or buying snacks at 7-Eleven. For many years, dating back more than a decade, neighbors have been working to improve pedestrian safety on CSR.

In 2016, a group of concerned Arlington Forest neighbors began increasing awareness of CSR safety issues through advocacy with elected officials. An impromptu meeting with Arlington County Board Member John Vihstadt and Delegate Patrick Hope took place in July 2016. One year later AFCA President Allison Kennett presented a letter and spoke at the July 2017 Arlington County Board meeting.

In response to the concerns, the County appointed the deputy county manager, as the liaison with the Arlington Forest Citizens Association on the CSR pedestrian safety issue. A group of neighbors met with the deputy county manager to discuss CSR crossing concerns. She outlined improvements at the North Harrison Street crossing and discussed possible improvements at additional points along the road, such as the North Edison Street crossing. Neighbors and the County representatives have discussed future safety improvements including a new flashing yellow beacon signs at both North Harrison and North Edison Street crossings.

Certain safety improvements focused on the North Harrison Street crossing have been made, such as the installation of a radar speed indicator sign (see photo) and bollards (stakes with reflectors), which create a safer place for people to wait in the median and increases visibility of pedestrians.

The County transportation office also conducted pedestrian data counts and released the information to community members. Some individuals in the neighborhood have analyzed the data and believe the volume of pedestrians warrant a pedestrian-activated red-light signal (a HAWK signal). After working with neighbors to ensure accurate pedestrian data, the County has called for new counts. With the pool season starting, neighbors have been advocating for implementation of additional pedestrian safety improvements at the North Harrison Street crossing.

Additional improvements are at various stages of development. For example, plans to redesign the North Edison



Street crossing are in the planning process: a wider median, flashing beacon and signs are being considered. We are continuing to work with the County to make pedestrian safety improvements. We encourage you to ask questions, get involved, and be careful when crossing Carlin Springs Road! Please email strine.lora@gmail. com to get involved.



Not Our Ancestral Creeks By Hutch Brown

As a boy, I fished my neighborhood creeks in Alexandria and Fairfax County with a simple hook and line. I caught sunfish and large minnows called fallfish, some up to a foot in size. So, when my son was old enough, I took him down to our neighborhood creeks. But not a fish in sight was big enough to take even our tiniest hooks. The reason is simple: urban development has degraded the creeks, turning them into conduits for stormwater runoff.

Our neighborhood creeks originally had native brook trout. The water table was higher then, with streams flowing over gravel beds that covered most of the bedrock. Forests cooled the waters and fallen trees blocked the flows, forming bends and pools up to 8 feet deep -- ideal habitat for trout.

In the 1800s, as railroad engineers straightened Four Mile Run and Civil War soldiers cleared away forests for firewood, the trout disappeared. Any survivors vanished by the 1920s as developers paved over the watershed. Today, 42 percent of Arlington County is covered by impervious surfaces. Anything more than 10 percent is fatal to trout.

In unpaved watersheds, stormwater runoff soaks into spongy forest soils and percolates into the ground wa-

ter, where it slowly releases into streams. On impervious surfaces, runoff drains directly into streams, which become raging brown torrents. The hot summer asphalt raises creek water temperatures far above tolerance levels for cold-water species like trout. The floodwaters scour away the gravels that aquatic species need for feeding and breeding, and the remaining gravel gaps are smothered in silt. Moreover, pollutants wash from the streets along with nutrients from lawns, degrading creek water quality and killing aquatic life.

Biodiversity disappears. Only a few species of small fish remain in our creeks, along with the larvae of midges and other tolerant aquatic insects. After more than a century of degradation, the creek beds are starting to stabilize, but they have been scoured down to the bedrock, widely exposed in our neighborhood streams.

These are not our ancestral creeks. Devoid of their original biodiversity, they are little more than open storm drains -- artifacts of urban living.


