Dominion Power briefs AFCA

Seventy years ago backyard power poles were considered cutting edge in the field of residential development and planning. Today it's causing power problems in Arlington Forest according to Dominion Power company representative Rob McIntyre who addressed residents at the October AFCA meeting.

One of the hallmarks of the Arlington Forest neighborhood layout was the location of utility line poles in back yards instead of on the streets, as was the usual practice. That kept the development's wide, winding streets free of poles and lines and aesthetically pleasing to this day.

But 70 years later, the location of those poles carrying electrical, phone and cable lines is causing problems. Trees planted when Arlington Forest was young have matured and now crowd those lines, and power pole access is hampered by backyard locations. Ninety percent of power outages in

Arlington Forest are tree related, according to McIntyre.

Dominion Power maintains the poles and lines that bring electrical power to Arlington Forest. McIntyre and a Dominion Power team including a local operations manager and arborist were at the October AFCA meeting to explain the challenges and operations that affect Arlington Forest.

McIntyre explained that Dominion Power manages 35,000 miles of tree trimming along its power lines and inspects residential circuits every three years, recently completing inspection of Arlington Forest. He noted that homeowners often voice concerns about the trimming done along power lines, but said that the trimming is essential to maintain "sustainable and reliable" power.

The team arborist said that notice of future trimming is listed on the power bills sent to residents – though it is not available to those paying on line –Continued on page 2

In comparison, membership was 525 (62% participation) in 1945 soon after AFCA was formed. The record high was 655 (77%) in 1972. As Arlington Forest approaches our 75th anniversary in 2014, we want to increase AFCA membership along with the community spirit that it represents.

and that homeowners can contact the Dominion Power Forestry line at 571-203-5026 to discuss their tree concerns in advance.

The team apologized for the outages that have seemed to plague the neighborhood recently, particularly the prolonged outages along South Aberdeen Street in September, but said that the challenges of trees and pole accessibility added to the problem.

When asked about the possibility of running lines underground, operations manager Tony Savage said it is considered in some extreme cases but it would involve considerable expense (as much as \$10,000 per home), land acquisition and disruption and thus tends to be impractical in most residential areas.

Why do some lights go out in Arlington Forest while others stay on? McIntyre explained that each of Arlington Forest's three sections – Southside, Northside and Greenbrier – is served by a different substation; the main ones being on Carlin Springs Road near Four Mile Run and further down Four Mile Run in Alexandria.

Savage said the substations feeding Arlington Forest provide plenty of power, but that the transformers stepping the voltage down for home use are gradually being replaced to keep up with growing home power demands – modern appliances, TVs, computers and power tools.

Dominion Power is pilot testing "smart meters" that can be read remotely with cell phone technology and will eventually make them standard. Arlington meters are currently read using "drive by" technology.

How Maintain Reliability

How can Arlington Foresters help maintain the reliability of their electrical power service?

- --Always call Dominion Power (1-866-DOM-HELP) to report power outages. The more calls Dominion gets the better able it can analyze and pinpoint the problem.
- --Plant the "right tree in the right place". Think ahead and plant trees that will not be potential power interrupters.
- --Stay safe. Most fatalities involving electrical power lines are people working around their homes. The Virginia Safety Act law prohibits private parties from working within 10 feet of power lines. Dominion Power has sole operational authority within that easement.
- --Stay in touch. Use Dominion Power's call-in lines and check out its website at www.dom.com.

AFCA Approved Playground Plan by Chris Scheer

At its October meeting, AFCA unanimously approved a design concept developed by Arlington County Parks and Recreation that will use County Neighborhood Conservation Program funds to transform the current Glencarlyn Park kiddie playground just below the W&OD Trail access point from Arlington Forest's south side.

The park is located within the Arlington Forest neighborhood boundary and the project was proposed by AFCA for funding by the Neighborhood Conservation program. County playground designer Valery Moseley attended the September AFCA meeting and solicited feedback from Arlington Foresters on what the park should offer and look like. Based upon that information, she presented a general design concept for approval at last month's meeting.

That approval enables the County to offer the project to the Neighborhood Conservation Committee for voting into the next funding schedule in December. If approved by the committee, the project plan will be finalized in detail and construction could begin late next year.

Moseley reported that feedback indicated that Foresters wanted to see climbing, swinging, sand play and seating incorporated within a natural setting consistent with the playground's location next to Four Mile Run. Her design concept includes a sand area featuring a boulder obstacle course and a small hand-pump water source. There will be swings and a unique web-like climbing structure, as well as a low tier wall that will provide seating.

She noted that the site is within a designated resource protection area and will feature landscaping with native plants to provide a distinct border.

Amphitheater Update

Here are brief notes on preparations for the 2012 season at the Lubber Run Amphitheater:

- -- Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation board members attended an Oct 18 Arlington County Board meeting to thank the County Board and Arlington County Manager Barbara Donellan and her staff for their successful efforts over the past year to bring the amphitheater back to life. - Last May, the County Board committed to a recurring budget allocation for programming at Lubber Run Amphitheater of \$20,000 per season (a fact inadvertently not mentioned in this newsletter's update last month). The Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation will be meeting with County staff in November to discuss what was spent on programming for the partial season that ran from July 29 through Sept 3. This discussion will help the Foundation better understand the funding needs anticipated for a full season of programming in 2012. Additional capital needs for the amphitheater will also be discussed.
- The Foundation is seeking suggestions and ideas for programming at the amphitheater next summer. Kids Halloween Parade







Leaf Collection Reminder - Ready. Rake. Recycle.

The Arlington County 2011 Leaf Collection and Recycling began on Oct. 31 for bag collection and Nov. 14th for vacuum truck collection. The leaf collection program is an important County service with nearly 100 people dedicated to the program and over 30 pieces of equipment collecting over 45,000 cubic yards of leaves for processing into leaf mulch. Arlington County's program has 3 easy ways to recycle leaves into mulch:

- Rake leaves to the curb for vacuum truck collection. Crews will make two passes through Arlington Forest between Nov & Dec.
- Place leaves in biodegradable bags. Bags will be collected one business day after your regular trash day. Free leave bags can picked up at eight locations throughout the county.
- Compost leaves and yard waste. Take advantage of nature's recycling to turn the leaves into a valuable organic soil supplement.

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

AF101: Snow Watch

Our neighborhood sidewalks were safer following last winter's snowstorms because more residents than in past years promptly cleared their sidewalks of snow and ice. Some credit likely goes to the County's new ordinance requiring residents to clear their sidewalks or face penalties. Credit may also go to the then-new "Kids for Hire" feature in this newsletter which gives residents who are unable or unwilling to shovel due to ill health, travel, or other reasons a lowcost way to comply with the law.

As another winter nears, now is a good time to remember that residents, businesses and churches are required to remove snow and ice within 24 hours after snowfall ceases (within 36 hours if snowfall exceeds 36 inches). Noncompliance can result in a \$50 or more fine, plus being billed for removal fees if the County does the shoveling.

Despite the 24-hour rule, the County urges shoveling "as soon as possible" since snow and ice left for any length of time could cause a pedestrian to fall and be injured. Likewise, while the ordinance allows handicapped residents to appeal their

fines, it nevertheless encourages them to make arrangements to have others clear their sidewalks.

Residents and businesses that fail to clear their sidewalks in a timely manner put their neighbors' safety at risk: children going to the school bus stop, commuters walking to mass transit, neighbors walking their dogs, senior citizens out for a health stroll, parents pushing baby carriages, etc.

Last winter the County focused on educating residents and businesses about the new ordinance. This winter the County will presumably begin issuing fines to persistent scofflaws.

If you see a hazardous sidewalk that has not been cleared after a snowfall, you can report it to the County via an online form so they can investigate. You can also report streets that have not been plowed in a timely manner. Search "snow" on the County website to find the form and full details about the snow removal ordinance.

Bottom line: now, before the first winter weather warning is issued, is the time to make plans to clear your sidewalks of snow.



EARLY SNOWFALL: The first snow of the season arrived unusually early on the Saturday before Halloween. A classic nor'easter dumped snow along the East coast. The last time measureable snow fell in October was 1979.

Are You Ready for Winter?

Old Man Winter paid an early visit to Arlington in late October with snow and cold temperatures. Were you surprised? Were you ready? Here is some advice from the Virginia Department of Emergency Management:


During winter months, there could be power outages, icy roads, closed schools and businesses, and health problems associated with wind, cold and snow. If you and your family aren't ready for winter, then take a few simple steps now to prepare.

- -- Make a plan. Decide on a meeting place outside of your neighborhood if your family is separated and cannot return home because of closed roads. Choose an out-oftown relative or friend to be your family's point of contact for emergency communications. With your family, write down your emergency plan get a free worksheet at www. ReadyVirginia.gov. Click on Make a Plan for more details.
- -- Get a kit. Start with these basic supplies for winter weather: three days food; three days water (a gallon per person per day); a battery-powered or hand-crank radio with extra batteries; and your written family emergency plan. After you have these essential supplies, add a first aid kit, medications if needed, blankets and warm clothing, supplies for special member of your household, and pet items.
- -- Stay informed. Before, during and after a winter storm, you should listen to local media for instructions from emergency officials. There may be times when you are advised to stay in place until it is safe to travel. Stay informed about winter storm watches and warnings and road conditions. You can get major road condition information 24/7 by calling 511 or checking www.511Virginia.org.

Go to www.ReadyVirginia.gov and print out an emergency supply checklist and a family emergency plan. Get ready now.

Fabulous Flying Squirrels


Some of our more unusual and fun-loving nocturnal park residents are the Southern Flying Squirrels (Glaucomys volans). The derivation of their scientific name comes from both Greek and Latin for "flying gray mouse". The Greek word "alaukos" meaning "gray", and "mys" meaning "mouse", taken in combination with the Latin word "volans" which means "flying". They reside across many forested areas in Virginia, except for the western most tip of the state. They usually dwell in tree cavities high up in the canopy in well-timbered deciduous forests, close to a natural water source. Their home-range is generally very small covering from about 5-6 acres. Carnivores, they eat a diet mainly of assorted nuts (hickory, acorn, walnut, etc) in the winter and fall. We have found that our local flying squirrels also seem to have a special preference for the seed pod of the tulip poplar (Liriodendron tulipifera) as a supplemental part of their fall diet. The rest of the year, their diet consists of various fruits, berries, flowers, insects, fungi, and even some lichens.

They are furry and small in size, ranging in length when full-grown from about 7.5 to 10 inches, including their tail. Their fur is generally grayish-brown on the back with an off-white to light brown underbelly. They have large black



eyes with a slight black ring around them which standout in comparison to the size of their head. Most notable is the fold of fur-covered skin called a "patagium" that stretches from the wrists of their forelimbs to their ankles. They use this patagium to glide, not actually fly, from tree to tree through the forest. Contrary to popular belief, the Flying Squirrel is in the rodent family and not at all related to the Australian Sugar Glider which is a marsupial.

Families, ages 5 and up. Flying Squirrels are found throughout the wooded neighborhoods of Arlington, but are seldom seen. Join us to learn more about the ever present, but secretive flying squirrel and some of the lore that has surrounded these engaging nocturnal acrobats. After an indoor presentation, we'll tiptoe outside to see these little pixies glide in for an evening meal. These creatures are truly one of the natural wonders of Arlington!
