November AFCA Meeting Agenda by John Naland

Local crime trends top the agenda of this month's Arlington Forest Citizens Association meeting on Wednesday, November 14, at 7 PM in the Barrett School library. Officer O'Daniel of the Arlington County Police Department will give an overview of recent trends, discuss crime prevention strategies, and then answer questions from meeting participants. See a related story on page 5.

Also on the agenda is a vote on the next project to propose for funding by the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee. Our previous NCAC project was the \$485,000 improvement to the playground in Glencarlyn Park near the end of S. Park (construction will take place next year). Now is the time to propose our next project.

In response to calls for input publicized in this newsletter

and on the AFCA listserv in recent months, seven people suggested improving/upgrading the N. Edison St. playground to make it more attractive to older children, two people suggested constructing a dog park in Lubber Run Park on the site where the swings used to be, and one person suggested replacing all of the street lights in Arlington Forest.

Residents with additional input should send it to Tim O'Leary, Arlington Forest's Neighborhood Conservation Representative, at tfoleary310@gmail.com by November 11. Please attend the November 14 AFCA meeting to vote for your preferred project.

Finally, AFCA meeting participants will also likely discuss the extended power outages that followed Hurricane Sandy.

Last Call for Dues

The annual AFCA dues drive that began in September ends this month. Last year, 324 of the 853 households in Arlington Forest (38%) paid dues. So far this fiscal year, just 252 households (30%) have responded. Participation rates by section are Northside-31%, Southside-31%, and Greenbrier-28%.

Your dues support AFCA's activities which enhance the quality of life in our neighborhood. Examples include the annual Holiday Party (see page 4 for details), the Tree Grant program (see page 11 for details) and the printing and distribution costs of this newsletter that are not covered by advertising revenue. This year's dues will also help to fund the spring 2013 Arlington Forest Home Tour and initial planning for Arlington Forest's 75th anniversary celebration in 2014.

Neighborhood Notes By John Naland

My family and I are getting better about preparing for multi-day power outages. After being caught short on vital supplies during winter storms several years ago and after the derecho storm this past June, we made sure to start preparing days before Hurricane Sandy hit. We stocked up on non-perishable food, topped off the car's gas tank, recharged our cell phones, and made plenty of ice for use in an ice chest.

Until after dark on the day the hurricane hit, it looked like our preparations might be unneeded. But, at about the same time that Reagan National Airport measured its highest gust of the storm (60 mph), the power went out on our block. Until our lights came back on 25 hours later, my family made good use of our emergency supplies.

While Sandy did not snap as many trees and branches in Arlington Forest as did the 70 mph derecho, parts of the Southside did lose power for three long cold days. With the power out, you could hear the hum of generators from a few houses. Other houses were quiet as people left to stay with relatives or in a hotel.

But most residents stayed put, dressed in layers, and added another blanket to their beds as nighttime temperatures dipped to the low 40s. Those with fireplaces put them to good use. Impromptu gatherings of neighbors took place as residents emerged from their powerless houses to walk around the neighborhood.

County government responded well to the emergency. Before sunrise on the day after the storm hit, I saw a police car driving through our neighborhood -- presumably checking for blocked roads or other hazardous conditions. The parks department was out quickly to clear obstructions from bike trails and parks.

More questionable was the responsiveness of Dominion Virginia Power which did not give estimates of when specific neighborhoods would see power restored -- thus leaving residents in the dark about how long they would be in the dark. Also, postings on the AF Moms listserv reported that some residents had to telephone Dominion customer service representatives several times before they inputted the outage report into their database.

Thankfully, hurricane and thunderstorm season is over for the year. But, with snow and ice season ahead, I guess it is time to buy more flashlight batteries.

Crime Prevention By John Naland

Below are suggestions gathered from various law enforcement agency websites on steps that we can take to prevent crime.

-- At home: Good locks, simple precautions, neighborhood awareness and common sense can help prevent most property crimes. Do not leave bicycles or other easily-stolen items outside. You may want to leave porch lights on at night or install motion-activated lights that come on when someone approaches the house at night.

-- Help your neighbors: Be alert to any suspicious activity outside your neighbors' houses since half of all home burglaries in the U.S. occur during the day when alert neighbors could potentially spot and report the thieves.

-- Do not leave valuables in your vehicle: If you must leave packages, GPS devices or other valuables in your car, put them in the trunk.

-- Maintain the neighborhood: Dark streets, litter and rundown areas attract criminals. Report streetlights that are out (see page 9 for details). Participate in neighborhood cleanups.

-- Take precautions in public: Stay alert and trust your instincts. If you feel uncomfortable in a situation, leave. Carry your purse close to you, with the opening or flap

towards your body. Never leave a purse unattended in a shopping cart.

-- Whenever possible, park and walk in well-lit areas: Be aware of your surroundings, especially the people around you.

-- Carry a cell phone: If someone makes you suspicious or uncomfortable, call the police.

-- When away, make your home look "lived in": Have a friend or neighbor collect your mail and newspapers or have your service suspended while you are away. Use timers to turn lights off and on.

-- Involve all family members: Following simple rules such as "the last one in locks the door" and "store your bike when you finish riding it" can help to avoid thefts.

-- Protect credit card numbers and other personal information: Carefully dispose of receipts that have a credit card number on them. Never provide credit card information in response to unsolicited calls or emails.

-- Report all incidents: Even if the loss is minor and/or the criminals are long gone, reporting incidents allows the police to look for trends that might help to identify, arrest, and convict crooks responsible for multiple crimes. In Arlington, call 703-558-2222 for non-urgent reports. For emergencies, call 911.



The normal requirement for brush to be less than 18-inches in diameter has been temporarily waived. Any cut wood left at curbside is fair game for free pickup by other neighbors to use as firewood unless otherwise marked with signs.

Better to Light One Candle ...: With the longer nights here, it is a good time to look up and down your block to see if any street lights are out. It takes only a few minutes to report an outage to the County online or by telephone. See the County website for details. While some street lights are serviced Dominion Virginia Power, reporting them to the County is supposed to initiate corrective action regardless of which entity is responsible.

Code Enforcement: Representatives of the Arlington County Code Enforcement Office gave an informative presentation at the October AFCA meeting. They reported handling 45 cases in Arlington Forest over the past year. Some began as complaints from residents regarding a neighbor's non-compliance with care of property regulations. Other cases were initiated by the Code Enforcement Office itself during quarterly block-by-block inspections of all neighborhoods. An owner who fails to correct their violation faces fines and, in extreme cases, being charged with a criminal misdemeanor. With winter coming, the Code Enforcement Office is gearing up to enforce the snow ordinance that requires residents, businesses and churches to remove snow and ice from public sidewalks adjacent to their property within 24 hours after snow stops falling. They are also enforcing a recently-strengthened Code provision that prohibits leaving inoperative motor vehicles outside. Leaf Season: Reminder, between now and mid-January, do not put leaves in plastic garbage bags or trash carts. Vacuum leaf collection in Arlington Forest is tentatively scheduled to take place Nov 12-14. Look for

notices on telephone poles for updated scheduling. The second and final vacuum collection will not occur until mid-December, so now is a great time to get your fallen leaves out to the curb. Please pile up only leaves. Biodegradable bag collection has begun and will continue until Jan 11 on the day after your regular trash pickup. Please do not include dirt, stones, litter, or other debris. See the County website for details.

AFCA Tree Grants: As detailed in last month's newsletter, a matching grant is available to Arlington Forest residents interested in planting a shade tree on their property. Available are grants of up to \$125 to cover one-half of the cost of buying and planting a tree. There is a limit of two grants per property and funding is limited to the first 10 applicants. The tree must be selected from the list of desirable shade trees endorsed by the County's Urban Forester as listed on the Tree Grant Application which is on the AFCA

website (www.arlingtonforestva.org) under the AFCA tab. The application must be approved before the purchase of the tree. For more info, contact AFCA Tree Grant Coordinator Colleen Green at greencolleen@gmail.com.

Tree Stewards: Applications are being accepted for the 2013 Class of Tree Stewards. Tree Stewards are volunteers dedicated to improving the health of our urban trees through educational programs, tree planting, demonstrations and tree maintenance. New volunteer training will be held on Wednesday evenings, starting Feb. 13 through April, with some Saturday mornings. Fun and interactive training on tree care is provided by recognized experts. Christmas Tree Collection: The County's Christmas Tree collection program runs Jan 7-18 on your regular trash pickup day. Trees are ground into wood mulch, so please remove the tree stand, lights and decorations and do not place the tree in a plastic bag.



How's the Market? The biggest factor affecting our local market this year is a higher demand and a much lower inventory of homes for sale. September 2012 activity in the local housing market has cooled slightly (which is a typical seasonal pattern) although remains above September 2011 levels. Closed sales are up 4.7% from last year and the median sales price is up 6.5% from last year (the highest September median price in five years). New contract levels are strong, up 9.6% above last year although down 6.4% from last month. The overall supply of active listings is down 43.5% from this time last year and will likely keep prices stable even as demand slows. Home prices in the \$300,000 to \$500,000 range are still the most sought after for affordability although we are still experiencing multiple offers for many sectors of the market. Arlington remains one of the strongest real estate market in the DC area.

What remodeling project in the Washington DC area provides the highest cost recouped? According to the Remodeling 2011-2012 Cost vs. Value Report (www.costvsvalue.com) an entry door replacement (steel) yields 98.1% of the estimate job cost of \$1,207 at resale. Other popular improvements are a wood deck addition vielding 91.3% (est. cost of \$10,696) and a minor kitchen remodel yielding 85.1% (est. cost of \$19,700).
