Barrett Runners



Barrett Runners is a student and teacher running club at K.W. Barrett Elementary. Mr. John Stewart started Barrett Runners in 2010 when boys and girls began asking for a running club. The club started with 25 students and 5 teacher volunteers. Over the years, the club has grown to almost 100 student runners in 3rd, 4th and 5th grade and 35 volunteer teachers. There are also 4 parent volunteers this year including the world-famous runner, Mr. Michael Wardian.

The program takes place in the Spring and the Fall. Every Friday, the Barrett Runners meet after school and run from 3:15pm to 4:05pm. Runs take place in the Arlington Forest neighborhood. If it rains, they run in the hallways at school.

Students, teachers and parents run or walk approximately 3 miles each week. The goal of the club is to stay fit and have fun. Kids learn pacing so they have energy to finish the run. At the end of each year, Barrett Runners complete a 5k race.

High School Boundaries By John Naland

The School Board will vote on December 1 on revised high school boundaries to be phased in starting next school year. The current boundaries – last adjusted in 1995 – place Southside Arlington Forest in the Wakefield attendance zone and the Northside and Greenbrier sections in the Washington-Lee district. Options before the School Board on December 1 include changing Northside and Greenbrier from W-L to Wakefield.

As detailed in the April 2016 Arlington Forester (posted on the AFCA website at www.arlingtonforesva.org under "Newsletters"), W-L faces severe overcrowding in the next few years. The article reported that a March 2016 letter to the School Board signed by the PTAs of W-L, Jefferson Middle School, and Swanson Middle School (the Kenmore PTA was invited to sign but did not) endorsed redrawing high school boundaries and opposed alternatives such as adding many more relocatables or instituting double shifting at W-L. Given looming capacity pressures, the letter asked for the new boundaries to take effect starting in Fall 2017.

At an August 30 School Board work session, the School Board instructed APS staff to initiate a public process to revise high school boundaries effective in Fall 2017. As APS

did so, more residents began to focus on the issue.

AFCA put this neighborhood issue on the agenda of its October 19 monthly meeting. Two resolutions proposed by residents were circulated on the AFCA listserv before the meeting. After a long discussion, meeting participants voted 73 to 14 to send a letter to the School Board urging it to keep the Northside and Greenbrier sections in the W-L attendance zone.

AFCA then organized an October 25 meeting at which three APS staff members answered questions and heard input from 45 Arlington Forest residents. Finally, AFCA moderated a November 5 meeting at which School Board Member Reid Goldstein spent two hours answering questions and hearing input from 40 Arlington Forest residents.

In the past month, numerous Arlington Forest residents have provided a variety of input to School Board members and APS staff via e-mails, letters, and meetings. Residents wishing to provide further input prior to the December 1 School Board vote have numerous options to do so including by speaking at the School Board's November 15 public hearing. Not only can you get your daily errands done with ease in this neighborhood, you can easily get out into the beautiful green spaces, especially at Lubber Run Park, the premier space for outdoor concerts and events. 2015 market stats list median home prices at \$529,000, with an average of 43 days on the market." Here's a fall project you might try: Task: Locate and seal cracks and spaces that let heat out and cold air in—along baseboards, wall/ceiling junctures, windows and doors, lighting fixtures, switches, and electrical outlets. Energy savings from reducing drafts range from 5% to 30% per year, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. **Shortcut:** Try these tricks to spot energy leaks. At night, ask a partner to walk outside while you turn off all lights and shine a flashlight along doors and windows. The light will illuminate large cracks. Small ones won't likely show up. For those, light a candle or incense stick and pass it along potential leak areas. If the flame or smoke wavers, you've got a leak. Call in the pros: A home audit that finds all the nooks and crannies where energy escapes costs \$500 on average. Painters and/or Handymen (\$50 to \$100 an hour) can seal gaps with caulk and install weather-stripping.

Around the Forest

Lubber Run Community Center Replacement: The County plans to kick off a community engagement process before the end of this year to work through the design of the new \$44.8 million community center and its outdoor amenities. To receive project updates via e-mail, sign up on the County website (search "Lubber Run Community Center Project"). There you can also find the project status page containing current and past documentation.

Edison Street Playground Renewal: Edison Park, known to some Arlington Forest neighbors as the "Tot Lot," offers tots exercise, fun with friends, and enough space to really build up some momentum, on foot, slide, swings, or voice. For adults, caregivers, and siblings, the park hosts family time and exchange of news and views. Even pets find a guest book of scents along the fence line. The Arlington Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Council (NCAC) will consider funding for Edison Park's renewal in the coming year or two. An Arlington County landscape architect will help us understand what's possible, listen to our ideas, and prepare a proposal for our association to discuss. Once we reach consensus on the project's scope and design, the proposal may be presented to the NCAC as early as the spring of 2017 for funding consideration. How might our quarter-acre Edison Park be even more fun and inviting than it already is? What should we keep exactly as it is now? Take a peek at other neighborhood playgrounds, in person or online. Recently updated Rocky Run or Tyrol Hill playgrounds may spur thoughts. Holiday Wreath Workshop: Come create delightfully decorative winter wreaths you can use to spruce up your home or give as gifts, on Sunday, December 4, 1 to 4 p.m. at Long Branch Nature Center. LBNC will provide music, refreshments, basic instruction and materials. Bring hand pruners or wire cutters (if you have them) and any extra materials or special decorations you may wish to add. Leaf Season: Do not put leaves in plastic garbage bags or trash carts (putting them in a green organics cart is fine). Vacuum leaf collection in Arlington Forest is tentatively scheduled for November 16 to 22. Look for notices on telephone poles for possible schedule adjustments. The second and final vacuum collection will not occur until mid-December, so now is a great time to get your fallen leaves out to the curb. If your street is on a steep slope, pile the leaves in the street one foot from the curb otherwise a heavy rain will wash them down the block. Pile up only leaves (no sticks, rocks, trash). An alternative is biodegradable bag collection which occurs year-round on your regular trash pickup day. Free paper bags are available until January 6 at several locations including Lubber Run Community Center. See the County website for details.

Christmas Tree Collection: The County's Christmas Tree collection program runs January 2 to 13 on your regular trash pickup day. Trees are ground into wood mulch, so please remove the tree stand and decorations and do not place the tree in a plastic bag. If your tree is over 8 feet tall, you must schedule a special brush collection (see the County website for details). Remember that it is illegal to dump Christmas Trees (or anything else) in parkland.

Trash/Recycling Cart Repair: Is the lid broken off your County trash or recycling cart? Is there a big hole in the side? Is a wheel broken? To get it fixed, use the County's online "Report a Problem" application at https://topics. arlingtonva.us/reportproblem. A repair truck will come to your house on your next trash day to repair or replace the cart.

Nature News



Tree Stewards Training: Do you want to protect and promote our urban tree canopy? Then become a volunteer Tree Steward. The next Tree Stewards of Arlington and Alexandria volunteer training starts on February 21 at the Fairlington Community Center. Tree Stewards

are volunteers who take the lead within their communities to enhance a sustainable urban forest through volunteer activities and public education programs. Our activities include: planting, pruning, mulching and watering of street, park and school trees; staffing informational booths at farmers' markets and local festivals, in conjunction with Virginia Cooperative Extension; leading neighborhood Tree Walks and speaking at community gatherings; and advocating for trees wherever and whenever needed. AFCA Tree Grant Program Reminder: We still have tree grants available for the 2016-17 year. The grants are up to \$125 for the first tree and \$100 for a second tree. If you are interested, please be sure you are current on your dues and then submit your AFCA Tree Grant Application to Allison Kennett via email Allison.Kennett@gmail.com.

Please note the grants do not apply to trees already planted on your property and you must apply and be approved prior to purchasing and planting the tree. Program details and the application form are on the AFCA website (www. arlingtonforestva.org) under the Neighborhood tab.



Snow Watch: Reminder - the safety of your neighbors requires that all residents adhere to the County code which requires clearing snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours after snowfall ceases (within 36 hours if snowfall exceeds 36 inches). Despite

the 24-hour rule, the County urges shoveling "as soon as possible" since snow and ice left for any length of time could cause a pedestrian to fall and be injured. Moreover, freshly fallen snow is much easier to remove than snow that has been compacted into ice by neighbors walking by. Any resident who is unable to shovel due to ill health, travel, or other reasons should coordinate for someone else to do the work. A low-cost option is to utilize "Kids for Hire" on page 10 of this newsletter for a list of energetic neighborhood students who stand ready to assist. Bottom line: now, before the first winter weather warning is issued, is the time to check your shoveling supplies and make plans to clear your sidewalks of snow and ice.



Barrett is trying something new this year for its big fundraiser. Instead of an auction, the PTA hosted an online Read-a-Thon. Students were able to create their own pages to ask for support from friends and family around the world. Even before contributions closed, the school had earned a whopping: \$14,739.55!

The students also marked Hispanic Heritage Month, learning about the rich contributions of Hispanic-Americans in science, history, the arts and more.

Next up? After a long weekend marking Veterans Day, Barrett will steam toward the holiday season with the start of Barrett Gives. Farmers Market

Robert Swennes, Executive Director at Field to Table (www.field2table.org), recently sent an update to AFCA regarding the possible placement of a farmer's market at the Barrett Elementary School parking lot on weekends. He reports that, as it stands now, the financial status of Field to Table remains too uncertain to move ahead with additional planning for a market at Barrett.

The priority of the nonprofit's directors is to support the group's existing three markets. Due to unexpected delays in securing County approval for the Marymount Farmers Market, that market's launch this spring was more expensive than anticipated. Indeed, the purchase of some equipment for that market has been delayed due to limited funding. Some budgeted expenditures for the Westover and Fairlington markets also had to be deferred this year. So, the directors want to see the organization's balance sheet in better shape before they undertake funding of any new market. Any new market developed from scratch can be expected to cost between \$8,000 and \$10,000 -- an amount the organization can hope to recoup only after several years of market growth.

Field to Table's board will determine its 2017 budget at the end of this year. Several directors have recommended that the annual budget include a line item specifically addressing development of new markets. Even if funds are provided in the 2017 budget for a new market, that market would not start up till the spring of 2018, and funds would need to be allocated in both the 2017 and 2018 budgets to get the market launched.

At present the proposed market at the Barrett school is the only one to be presented to the Field to Table directors. Time will tell whether any competing new market possibility appears.

In addition to their financial concerns about taking on a new market this year, some of the directors wonder whether Arlington has reached the saturation point for new farmer's markets. Mr. Swennes does not think so and he has gathered some statistical evidence to support that view. The directors are not expected to discuss that issue in detail until December.

Until the Field to Table board feels comfortable enough to move forward on this matter, there is little reason for Barrett market supporters to meet again. Mr. Swennes is hopeful that movement will be seen in January.

Kids for Hire


