Carlin Springs Road Pedestrian Safety Update By Beverly Johnston and Lora Strine

On September 19th, at the regularly scheduled Arlington Forest Citizens Association meeting, Dr. Hui Wang, Chief of the Arlington County Transportation Engineering and Operations Bureau, presented safety improvement plans for the intersection of North Edison Street and Carlin Springs Road.

Many residents attended the meeting to voice their frustration with the pace of progress on pedestrian improvements at both the North Edison and Harrison Street crossings. Residents reiterated concerns that traffic moves too fast and does not stop at the crossing where yellow rapid flashing beacons already exist. Families and individuals are unsafe when crossing the road. Many residents believe that a red signal is the only way to stop cars along Carlin Springs Road.

Residents also made critical comparisons between traffic and pedestrian safety improvements made on roads in Arlington with the same road conditions and neighborhood designations as Carlin Springs Road. There is a desire to see improvement in our neighborhood roads that we see being made on many other roads across the County.

Dr. Wang discussed the County's objectives. In addition to pedestrian safety, the County places a high priority on traffic flow, traffic studies and following technical information to make their decisions.

We have a commitment from the Department of Transportation to:

-- Assess the effectiveness of the flashing beacon at the Harrison crosswalk

-- Assess the sight lines at the Harrison crosswalk, particularly eastbound traffic

-- Pursue a proposal to the County Board to place signs and increase the fine for speeding on Carlin Springs Road to \$200

To raise the pedestrian safety issue concerning Carlin Springs Road with the Arlington County Board directly, Eric Larsen and Jennifer Messman made verbal comments at the County Board meeting on September 22nd.

Discussions with Arlington County staff will continue. The conversation will focus on meeting both the need to keep traffic flowing and improve pedestrian safety. We believe that if pedestrians are efficiently crossing Carlin Springs Road it will help traffic flow more smoothly and there will be less confusion and wait time for drivers.

Neighborhood Conservation Plan

The Neighborhood Conservation Plan Update Committee met in early October to learn more about the process for creating updates from Arlington County Neighborhood Planner Katie Brown-Henry. The group, comprised of Liz Kauffman, Hutch Brown, Julia Battocchi, Karen Uetrecht Burst, and Esther Bowring, discussed how best to get input from Arlington Foresters to help guide creation of the new plan.

We agreed that the first step will be asking attendees at the next AFCA meeting on October 17th to participate in an interactive exercise to get feedback on the neighborhood's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats. Sheets of paper will be posted around the room and post-it notes and pens will be available. Neighbors can provide their thoughts, either before or after the meeting.

This will be the first of many opportunities for Arlington Forest neighbors to provide their ideas and contribute to the plan updating effort. The Committee is looking at online tools that will help with this process, so stay tuned.

Neighborhood Conservation Plans typically serve a community for about 10 years, but Arlington Forest's plan was last updated in 1991. The plans help neighborhoods outline their goals for the community, as well as concerns.

In 1991, the primary goal outlined in the plan was to "help retain the park-like atmosphere of this rare wooded island in an urban environment."

We hope you will spend a few minutes thinking about your vision for Arlington Forest and begin sharing those ideas with us.

No Scooters on Bike Trails: As the motorized-scooter fad expands, residents should note that the County Code (section 14.2-64.1) prohibits the operation of any motorized vehicle (except wheelchairs) on off-street bicycle paths.

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Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation By Esther Bowring

It was a long, wet summer and while nine of the 56 Arlington County Lubber Run Amphitheater free performances were rained out, attendance was stronger than ever and, according to this critic, the performers were better than ever.

Those performers provided music from around the world -- Africa, South America, New Orleans, and Nashville -- and covered virtually all forms of popular music from rock and country to folk and Broadway.

Season highlights included a night of American songbook favorites sung by Signature Theater professionals that ended with an encore and standing ovation. Four women from Brazil, Colombia, Venezuela and the US known as Ladama got the crowd up and dancing to their unique blend of folk traditions. And Encore Stage celebrated its 50th anniversary since beginning at the amphitheater by inviting kids and parents to the stage to join for "Hamiltunes", a singalong of songs from the hit musical Hamilton.

There were no "off" nights (except for rain) and both County staff responsible for programming and Lubber Run Foundation Board members were pleased and promise more of the same next year. children and family programs in addition to the countyfunded summer programs. The last children's-oriented shows were held in September.

National & Local Housing Trends

Home-buying trends are shifting thanks to generational differences, a strong economy, student-loan encumbrances and a growing housing-affordability gap. Changing buyer characteristics and desires are altering the market. Only one half of American adults are married, versus more than 70% in the 1970s, and more unmarried couples are looking for homes. First-time home buyers have historically averaged at 32 years although the average age of buyers purchasing a home for the second time has risen steeply from 36 in 1981 to 54 in the 2017. Buyers, many of them young, also carry a median loan debt of \$41,200 and median income of \$38,800 nationwide. Those with loans on average delay their home purchases by seven years In the Metro DC there is more transition and higher income, which can equate to more relocation (Corporate, Govt, State Dept and Military) along with more frequent moving up locally.

Higher end homes are lingering on the market and price drops have started

It's the same case with upper end prices in other markets as well. Abundant supply and record prices are causing buyers to pause. Many markets are seeing a shift from seller's to buyer's market Lower priced homes are still in short supply, and buyers are snatching up what's available.

Arlington's fall real estate market in the low to mid-price points is still robust while the upper end market of is showing some shifting with more price reductions and longer days on market.

As of this writing (10/5/18), rates jumped to their highest levels in seven years with the predominant rate for 30-yr fixed at 4.875% and some major lenders are at 5%.



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

The Quartz in Our Creeks: Why So Much? By Hutch Brown

Quartz is that common white pebble or rounded white rock you see in the gravel along Lubber Run and Four Mile Run. You can probably find it in your own yard in potatosize lumps. It might be white or orange or even reddish.

While the gravel beds along our creeks is more quartz than anything else, the bedrock you see is not quartz at all. The bedrock is the massive gray or brown rock that underlies our creeks. It has parallel angles and planes, as though it were all bedded in the same way.

And it was. Half a billion years ago, the bedrock formed from layers of silt and sand in a deep-sea trench. The accumulating layers became miles thick, condensing into sedimentary rock. Then the continents collided, and the tremendous heat and pressure transformed the original sedimentary rock into the metamorphic rock we see today. If you look closely, you can still see the original grains of sand, now mixed with glistening bits of mica and other minerals.

When the continents collided, the tremendous friction melted the rock and sent plumes of magma rising upward. Superheated waters percolated up through the bedrock, filling cavities there. The waters were rich in dissolved silicon dioxide, which precipitated out, leaving solid quartz in veins, nodes, and lenses.

Some quartz veins and lenses are huge, but they still make up less than one percent of the overall bedrock. So why is most of the gravel in our creeks made up of lightcolored quartz rather than dark stones from the metamorphic bedrock?

The answer is weathering. The metamorphic bedrock in our area readily reacts with air and water, quickly breaking down into rusty red soil. You can easily find crumbling pieces of it along our creeks.

By contrast, quartz is a stable mineral. In our creek beds, quartz gradually wears down into sand, but the process

is slow because quartz is so hard, with a hardness of 7 on the scale of 1 to 10 that geologists use. So as the bedrock weathers away, quartz remains behind. That's why you find so much of it in our creeks.


