#### October AFCA Meeting Agenda

Two interesting topics are on the agenda of this month's Arlington Forest Citizens Association meeting on Wednesday, October 17, at 7 PM in the Barrett School library.

Dana G. Wilson, Code Enforcement Supervisor from the Arlington County Department of Community Planning, Housing, and Development will discuss his office's work in enforcing the County's rules for neighborhood living. For example: How high may someone allow their grass to grow? May piles of junk be stored in a driveway? How long may a storage POD sit in the street? Mr. Wilson will be available to answer those and related questions. (Spoiler alert: see "Neighborhood Do's and Don'ts" on page 5 of this newsletter for a summary of relevant provisions of the County Code.)

Our second speaker, Andrea Walker, will talk about the "Arlington Villages Project" which helps people over age 65 remain in their own homes as long as possible by coordinating social services such as daily check-in and rides to medical

appointments. An article about the project appeared in last month's newsletter (on page 5, online at www.arlingtonforestva.org under the "Newsletters" tab). The project's website is arlingtonvillages.org. The first meeting for anyone interested in helping to organize a pilot neighborhood village in the Arlington Forest-Boulevard Manor-Glencarlyn area will be on Thursday, November 1 at 7:30 PM at a location to be determined. #### **AFCA Tree Grant Program**

Long before moving to Arlington Forest, I appreciated the beautiful trees of our neighborhood: the protective shade in the summer, the stunning colors in the fall, and the dramatic transformation of winter into spring. AFCA, with the support of Arlington County, is committed to retaining the unique character (and namesake) of our neighborhood with the Arlington Forest Tree Grant Program. The program encourages you and your neighbors to plant trees that will contribute to the shade canopy of Arlington Forest by subsidizing a portion of the purchase price of certain types of trees.

Under the Arlington Forest Tree Grant Program, a matching grant is available to residents of Arlington Forest interested in planting a SHADE TREE on their property. The grant amount of up to \$125 covers up to one-half of the cost of

buying and planting a tree (including delivery). There is a limit of two tree grants (of up to \$125 per grant) per property. For example, a Forester who planted one tree costing \$300 and a second that cost \$200 would receive a grant of \$125 for the first tree and a grant of \$100 for the second.

The types of trees eligible for the program are White Oak, Northern Red Oak, Willow Oak, Chestnut Oak, Southern Red Oak, Scarlet Oak, Pin Oak, Red Maple, Sycamore, Tulip Tree/Yellow Poplar, Black Gum, Lacebark Elm, American Elm, Dutch Elm resistant cultivars (e.g., Princeton, Liberty cultivars), American Beech, Kentucky Coffee Tree, Hickory, and Linden/Basswood.

Grant funding is available for the first 10 applicants during the 2012-2013 season. Applicants must be dues-paying AFCA members. If you are interested in applying, please follow these instructions:

- 1. Complete the Tree Grant Application which is available on the AFCA website (at www.arlingtonforestva.org by clicking on the AFCA tab and then scrolling to the bottom of that page) or email greencolleen@gmail.com to request an application.
- 2. Return the application to Colleen Green, AFCA Tree Grant Coordinator. NOTE: To be eligible, the Tree Grant Application must be submitted and approved BEFORE you purchase the tree(s).
- 3. Once you have been notified that your application has been approved, you must purchase the tree within 90 days.
- 4. Submit your receipt to Colleen Green, including your name, address, phone number, and where the tree was planted (e.g. front yard, back yard, etc.) within 30 days of purchasing the tree. (Electronic submissions are preferred and your refund will be expedited!)
- 5. Colleen will inspect your property to ensure the tree is planted and then submit your receipt to the AFCA Treasurer for reimbursement.



As the AFCA Tree Grant Coordinator, I'm thrilled to have an opportunity to meet fellow Foresters and see a whole new generation of trees planted in our neighborhood. Please contact me at greencolleen@gmail. com with any questions.

#### Leaf Collection - Ready, Rake, Recycle

The Arlington County 2012 leaf collection and recycling begins Oct. 29 for bag collection and Nov. 12 for vacuum truck collection. The County collects about 50,000 cubic yards of leaves each year. During November and December, the County will not collect leaves left curbside in plastic bags or placed in trash bins. Instead, please utilize one of three easy ways to reduce landfill waste by recycling leaves into useful mulch:

- Place leaves in biodegradable paper bags. Bags are collected on the day after your regular trash day beginning the week of Oct. 29. Free leaf bags are available at Lubber Run Community Center, Long Branch Nature Center, and six other locations. They also may be purchased at most hardware stores. Do not include grass clippings.
- Rake leaves to the curb for vacuum truck collection that begins the week of Nov. 12. Crews will make two passes through Arlington Forest -- one in November and one in December. Look for signs posted in the neighborhood 3-7 days before each pass. Remove stones, branches, and litter from the leaf pile.
- Residents may also compost their leaves into a valuable organic soil supplement.

If you would like reasonably-priced assistance with leaf raking or other fall yard work, check out Kids for Hire on page 14. Listed there are 11 neighborhood youths who are eager to help out.

For more information on the County's program, search "leaf collection" on the County website. Leaf and wood mulch is available free for pickup at two locations and can be delivered to your house for a modest charge. For details, search "mulch" on the County website.



#### Neighborhood Do's and Don'ts

Below are excerpts of the Arlington County Code of rules for residential areas. Some violations can result in a summons to General District Court and fines up to \$2,500.

- -- Sidewalks and roadways should be kept free of low branches, shrubs and other foliage from the ground and upward 10 feet.
- -- Grass/weeds may be no taller than 12 inches in the front, sides and rear of the property.
- -- Residents must remove snow and ice from public sidewalks adjacent to their property within 24 hours after snow stops falling (within 36 hours when 6 or more inches accumulate).
- -- Inoperative vehicles may only be stored inside of a fully-enclosed building.
- -- Commercial vehicles may not park on residential streets except when making service calls. Motor homes and camping trailers may not park on residential streets for longer than five days.
- -- Placing a Portable Storage Device (POD) on a street requires a County permit which is limited to one month (non-renewable). Construction dumpsters may be placed on streets for any length of time with the proper permit.
- -- Refuse and carts should be placed out no sooner than 5 PM the day prior to collection. Return containers to their normal storage location within 24 hours after emptying. The normal storage location may not be in front of a

- dwelling or behind the front building line that faces any County street, unless fencing or landscaping shields the containers from view from the street.
- -- Old furniture, appliances, tires or building materials may only be stored inside an enclosed building.
- -- Dumping of trash, grass cuttings, tree trimmings or other debris on public land is prohibited. Refuse may not be burned.
- -- The running of dogs and other pets at large is forbidden, except in designated off-leash areas. Owners must clean-up after their pets.
- -- Construction activities are allowed any time; however, there are noise limits by time of day. The normal noise decibel limit may be exceeded from 7 AM to 9 PM Monday to Friday and 10 AM to 9 PM on weekends and holidays.
- -- Emergency power generators must comply with noise ordinances which restrict noise levels to 55 decibels at night and 65 decibels during the day.

#### Saving the Holly Tree By John Naland

Arlington Forest's iconic holly tree in the traffic circle just north of the intersection of Park Drive and Arlington Boulevard is in bad shape. Well over 70 years old, it was moved to its current location in 1941 by Monroe Warren, president of Meadowbrook, Inc. which built most of the homes in Arlington Forest. This past September 15, a small group of volunteers (see photos) led by Joe Cockrell worked for hours removing invasive vines which had climbed the trunk into the branches above. After clearing the vines and trimming lower branches, it was clear that the trunk was severely rotted on one side.

Chris Scheer subsequently contacted the County arborist who later inspected the tree which is on the County's list of "Notable" trees. His analysis: "The holly in the circle is definitely in poor shape. Also, the base of the tree is rotting, to some extent, and this may prove to be fatal. [Your] clearing away the ivy from the base will help the tree

recover, if this does happen. I still have faith in the chance the tree will compartmentalize the basal damage, and perhaps regrow the lost growth, but there is a chance it may not come back. I will keep an eye on this tree and will work with the County landscape team to see what we can do as far as overwintering and protecting the tree."

With any luck, the tree's health will bounce back. If not, the County and AFCA will need to plan for its replacement -- perhaps in 2014 to coincide with the 75 anniversary of the establishment of Arlington Forest. Either way, kudos go Joe Cockrell who has often single-handedly worked to trim, water, and care for the holly tree for the past three decades.



## Trailhead Project Completed by John Naland

The trailhead beautification project at the foot of N. Greenbrier was completed last month with the installation of an information kiosk. The kiosk, which has "Arlington Forest" etched into its roof, displays notices of community interest along with a newly-commissioned map that details nearby trails. Next to the kiosk is a seating bolder and a new trash can (see photo).

Other project elements included spraying of invasive plants covering two acres on either side of the trail leading down to Four Mile Run. County contractors will return this winter and again in 2014 to re-treat any surviving invasives. The County also removed several rusting street signs and installed a new "No Dumping" sign. Earlier, a separate project replaced the stormwater tubing on either side of the trailhead.

The beautification work was funded by a \$15,000 Park Enhancement Grant that the County awarded this past January to a group of neighbors from N. Granada and N. Galveston who have been conducting semi-annual cleanups at the site since April 2008.

At their most recent cleanup on September 15 (see photo), the volunteers removed trash from along Four Mile Run and worked with County invasive plant control coordinator Sarah Archer to clear invasives that had survived the

contractor's initial spraying. The next volunteer clean-up day will be in April. Anyone who uses that trailhead to access the WO&D hike/bike/jog trail is welcome to help out. Look in this newsletter for details next spring.

#### Personal Emergency Preparedness by John Naland

Extended power outages in the wake of last summer's derecho (see photo) and after recent winters' storms were good reminders that, even in our urban environment, we still must be ready to essentially fend for ourselves for a few days. County, state, and federal websites all offer advice on how to take charge of our own personal emergency preparedness. Below are excerpts with suggestions for preparing for natural or other emergencies:

- -- Always maintain on hand at least a five day supply of non-perishable food, pet supplies, and medications.
- -- Prepare an emergency kit that includes essential items to last at least five days: water, can opener, first aid kit, battery-powered radio with extra batteries, flashlights with extra batteries, and cash.
- -- Select a family rendezvous location in the event that your home is inaccessible.
- -- Designate an out-of-town friend or relative as a telephone point of contact should your family members loose contact with each other.
- -- Fill your car gas tank if a storm is approaching.
- -- Teach all family members how to turn off the water, gas and electricity at the main switches.
- -- Change smoke detectors once a year (for example, on an easy to remember date such as July 4 or January 1).

- Before winter, locate your snow shovel and buy snow melt pellets or sand for sidewalks.

You can also talk with your neighbors about cooperating after a storm. For example, a neighbor with an emergency generator could offer to recharge cell phones. A neighbor with a chainsaw could lend it to clear downed branches. Younger residents could clear older neighbor's sidewalks of snow and ice.

Mortgage interest rates on home loans are at their lowest point since anyone has been keeping records. This has kept the housing market active, and refinance applications are also up.

30 year fixed rate conforming loan interest rates in early October are between 3.25% and 3.5%, and 3.875% for Jumbo loans over \$625,500.

Some lenders are now offering 80/10/10 and 80/15/5 mortgage programs for buyers who want to purchase homes with just 5% to 10% down payment and avoid PMI (private mortgage insurance).

Sales activity in Northern Virginia for the month of August was robust with a total of 1,818 homes sold in August 2012, an increase of 8% above August 2011 home sales of 1,685. Active listings decreased by almost 29% with 3,352 active listings in August, compared with 4,695 homes available in August 2011. The average days on market (DOM) for homes in

August 2012 decreased by about 21% to 44 days, compared with 56 days in August 2011.

Sales prices continued to rise compared with those realized last year. The average sales price in August increased by almost 5.5% from August 2011, to \$525,480, compared with last August's average of \$498,128.

The median price of homes sold in Northern Virginia also rose in August to \$453,500, which is an increase of almost 7% with August 2011's median price of \$425,000. The number of new pending home sales in Northern Virginia in August increased by about 8% to 1,739 compared with 1,609 new contracts pending in August 2011.
