Diverse Agenda for AFCA's September Meeting

The Arlington Forest Citizens Association begins its 78th year of neighborhood service and advocacy at the Monday, September 18 AFCA meeting at 7 PM in the Barrett Elementary School library (the meeting is being held on Monday instead of Wednesday due to a scheduling conflict).

The agenda includes an update on replacing the traffic circle holly tree, an overview of the "Ready for 100" renewable energy initiative, and a briefing on plans to renovate Culpepper Garden. We will also discuss AFCA resolutions procedures and vote on AFCA's annual budget.

Subsequent AFCA meetings will feature prominent speak-

ers (County Board member Katie Cristol in January and a School Board member in March) and important topics (Carlin Springs Road pedestrian safety in October, Lubber Run Community Center construction plans in November, and Edison Park refurbishment plans in February). As always, AFCA will sponsor the traditional annual events: Kids Scarecrow Making, Kids Halloween Parade, AFCA Holliday Party, Spring Cleanup, Neighborhood Yard Sale, and May Picnic.

These activities and other AFCA initiatives that enhance the quality of life in our neighborhood are supported by your dues.

Call for Dues

September marks the start of AFCA's annual dues drive. This year for the first time you can pay dues online! Just go to http://www.arlingtonforestva.org/AFCADues.html.

Alternatively, clip out the coupon on this page and return it with a \$10 check in the pre-addressed envelope included inside this newsletter. Last year, 365 out of the 851 households (43%) in Arlington Forest paid dues.

Your dues help to get this newsletter delivered to your doorstep eight times a year. Dues pay for tree grants to residents to help keep the "forest" in Arlington Forest and make possible modest donations to the PTAs of neighborhood schools. Dues support the AFCA website (www.arlingtonforestva.org) which features a variety of content including a detailed neighborhood map, a 150-page history of Arlington Forest, and back issues of this newsletter.

So please send in your tax deductible dues today. Add an optional donation if you missed paying dues in some past years. If you include your e-mail address, you will be added to the AFCA listserv which sends one or two messages per month with news of neighborhood interest.

Editor's Note



Arlington Forest Shopping Center Update

Sense of Place Café: This boutique-style coffee shop opened on August 7 in the space formerly occupied by the Subway sandwich shop. The Sense of Place Café is open 7 am to 3 pm on Monday to Friday, 8 am to 2 pm on Saturday, and closed on Sunday. They roast coffee beans every day in small batches. They serve over dozen different coffee drinks and have tea, hot chocolate, smoothies, croissants, muffins, parfait, granola, sandwiches, salad, and cookies. Fiesta Oriental: The Filipino grocery Fiesta Oriental Store closed in June after having been in business since 1991. Owner Fred Sunga began a well-deserved retirement. The now-vacant location originally held the shopping center's first business: Jack Cohen's Arlington Forest Delicatessen and Carry Out Shop (1940-1983).

Goodbye Holly Tree

Arlington Forest's historic American Holly tree in the traffic circle at the Shopping Center was cut down by a County crew on July 18. The tree had long been in poor health with a large area of decay at the base of the trunk. After a recent inspection, the County's Acting Urban Forest Manager judged it to pose a moderate risk of falling.

The tree was at least 80 years old, having been moved to its current location in 1941 by Monroe Warren, the builder of Arlington Forest. That December, residents held our neighborhood's first Tree Lighting Ceremony at the tree. Holiday celebrations (lights, carols) were held there each year for decades before being moved to the Lubber Run Community Center. The tree was designated as a Notable Tree by Arlington County. Several neighbors — most notably Joseph Cockrell — cared for it over the years (removing invasive vines, etc.).

The County and AFCA are working together to select a replacement tree. AFCA sent all dues-paying members an e-mail in late August inviting each household to complete a survey offering six types of trees from which to select. The survey at https://surveyhero.com/c/b6d97a3 closes on September 20.

County Projects Update

Lubber Run Community Center: In July, the County Board awarded a \$40 million contract to the James G. Davis Construction Company to build the new Lubber Run Community Center. The Board deferred action on endorsing the final design until their September 16 meeting to allow more time for community input. Later this fall, there will be a community meeting to present updates on the design.

Carlin Springs Road Bridge: In July, the County Board approved \$7 million to demolish the current bridge and build a new one. The County will hold a community forum in October to explain the plans and how they will maintain traffic safety and access during the project. Construction is expected to start late this year and be completed by early 2019.

Park Drive at Arlington Blvd: The County expects to start construction this fall on the final phase of improvements at the intersection of Arlington Blvd with Park Drive. The \$1.5 million project will create better access and crossings for pedestrians, transit users, bikers and those traveling on the shared-use paths parallel to Arlington Boulevard.



Where are housing prices heading?

Many real estate conversations center on housing prices and where they may be headed. Every quarter,

Pulsenomics.com surveys a nationwide panel of over one hundred economists, real estate experts, and investment & market strategists about where they believe prices are headed over the next five years. They then average the projections of all 100+ experts into a single number.

Here are the results of their latest survey:

Home values will appreciate by 5.0% over the course of 2017, 4.0% in 2018, 3.2% in 2019, 3.0% in 2020, and 3.0% in 2021. That means the average annual appreciation will be 3.64% over the next 5 years. Today, the U.S. housing inventory is at a 20-year low with new construction starts well below historic norms and financing a home can be anything but simple in the current mortgage environment.

The elements that precipitated the housing crash a decade ago do not exist in today's real estate market.

The current increase in home prices is the result of a standard economic equation: when demand is high and supply is low, prices rise.

Locally, the shortage of single family homes in the close in Metro DC area has resulted in increased home prices. In Arlington Forest, this year has seen a shortage of homes for sale in the neighborhood, resulting in much lower sales averages than historic trends. Year to date there have been only 10 properties closed from 1/1/17 through 8/31/17 at an average sales price of \$700,794, while this time last year there were 24 properties closed at an average sales price of \$728,450.

Around the Forest

Scarecrow Making: Bring your pre-teen child to the Arlington Forest Shopping Center on Saturday, October 14, between 1 and 3 PM to make a front-yard Halloween strawman. Bring a pair of blue jeans, a long-sleeve button-up shirt, and a pair of panty hose. AFCA will provide the straw to stuff inside and safety pins to connect the pants and shirt. Advance registration is required by e-mailing nalandfamily@yahoo.com. Cost \$5 per scarecrow.

Tree Grant Program: To help keep the "forest" in Arlington Forest, AFCA will pay you to plant a tree on your property. AFCA offers matching grants to neighbors who plant tree from an approved list of shade trees. Grants of up to \$125 will cover one-half of the cost of buying and planting a tree. The application must be approved before the purchase. For details and the application form, go to www.arlingtonforestva.org and click on the AFCA tab.

Trail Cleanup: If you walk, jog, or bike on the trail leading from the foot of N. Greenbrier St. to the WO&D trail, please join neighbors in cleaning up the adjacent parkland on Saturday, September 16, from 9 to 11 am. Residents primarily from the first block of N. Granada St. have been doing semiannual cleanups there since 2008 and invariably fill many bags with trash and invasive plants. They would welcome assistance for others who enjoy that trail.



Ball-Sellers House: The oldest surviving building in Arlington is just across Four Mile Run from Arlington Forest in the Glencarlyn neighborhood. Built around 1742, the Arlington Historical Society has preserved John Ball's cabin and offers free tours by knowledgeable docents on Saturdays 1-4 PM through October. Lubber Run Amphitheater: Another Summer of Quality Entertainment

High ticket prices, long drives and uncertain parking may keep many from venturing to Wolf Trap, Merriweather Post Pavilion, and other summer performance venues, but Arlington Foresters weren't deprived. The 2017 summer weekends of free entertainment at the Lubber Run Amphitheater (right in our own backyard) provided a range and quality of entertainment unequaled in Northern Virginia. And there's still more to come with 11 a.m. Sunday kids shows on Sept. 10 (Speed the Magician) and Sept. 17 (The Great Zucchini).

Those special programs for families and children, including a Father's Day performance on June 18 by Mr. Knick Knack and the August 27 appearance of Mystic Drumz, as well as the August 11 R&B favorite Rico Amero, were financed entirely by the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation using donations to the wishing well by those who attended amphitheater performances and special gifts from individuals. In addition, the foundation also co-funded -- with Arlington Cultural Affairs -- a special dramatic presentation by the WSC Avant Bard.

Arlington Arts pays for most amphitheater performances. This year's offerings, all free, ranged from the classic to folk and pop and reached heavily into world music representing other cultures and nations. Weather is always a factor at the open-air amphitheater, but mild nights

welcomed attendees and only five of the 30 performances were rained out. Over the course of the summer, more than 4,000 people attended amphitheater programs.

"We owe Arlington Cultural Affairs and Arlington County a big thanks for supporting programming at the amphitheater," said Foundation Co-President Esther Bowring, "and we thank those who contribute to our foundation fund so that we can augment the County's schedule to bring more performers to the amphitheater stage."

The Arlington Forest Amphitheater Foundation is chartered as a 501c3 organization eligible for tax-deductible donations. In addition to donating to the amphitheater wishing well, donations can also be made on the foundation's Facebook page at www.facebook.com/Lubberrunamphitheater by using the "donate" button.

The Lubber Run Amphitheater performance series is presented by Arlington Cultural Affairs, a Division of Arlington Economic Development, in cooperation with the non-profit Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation.


