### Long-term Issues on AFCA's Agenda

Two long-term issues are on the agenda of the last regular meeting of the 2013-14 AFCA service year: 1) the health of our neighborhood tree canopy and 2) the future of the Lubber Run Community Center. The meeting is this Wednesday, April 9, at 7 PM in the Barrett School library (that is earlier in the month than usual due to the timing of this year's Spring Break).

Our neighborhood's Tree Steward Jim Graham will discuss how to care for trees in order to keep the "forest" in Arlington Forest (see page 5 for information on AFCA's Tree Grant Program). His wife Susan will give advice on growing native plants that are both attractive and well-adapted to our soil and climate.

Also on the agenda is continued discussion of the future of the Lubber Run Community Center. Come learn about and discuss recent developments and future prospects. See the article below for background information.

Finally, we will get an update on AFCA's 75th anniversary planning.

# Update on the Lubber Run Community Center By John Naland

At the March 19 AFCA meeting, the approximately 35 participants unanimously adopted a resolution (see text on page 9) opposing the construction of an 800 to 1,200 seat middle school on the site of the Lubber Run Community Center (LRCC). The resolution went on to support construction of a new community center in accordance with the County's 2012 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).

The meeting participants also voted to transform the existing AFCA ad hoc committee into a standing committee whose membership is open to any Arlington Forest resident. The ad hoc committee was formed at the January AFCA meeting to address both the middle school proposal and the potential inclusion of affordable housing units into the scheduled redesign of the LRCC site. The ad hoc committee crafted a Vision Statement for development of the site and arranged for all four County Board members and two County Board candidates to tour the LRCC and discuss issues of concern.

Following the March AFCA meeting, standing committee members met with School Board Member Dr. Emma Viola-Sanchez, who is the Board's liaison to Barrett School. The AFCA standing committee now includes members holding a range of views about the best option for replacing the

aging LRCC building. To join the committee or to receive updates, send an email to LRCC@gmail.com. To join online discussions, sign-up for the Future of LRCC Yahoo group at future-of-lrcc-subscribe@yahoogroups.com and specify your Arlington Forest address.

Arlington Forest residents who support building a combined middle school and community center on the LRCC site have been communicating their views to County and School Board officials. Other residents who favor building a combined affordable housing building and community center on the LRCC site have also been active. Those Foresters who support an updated community center that incorporates



### Spring Cleanup on April 26

The fourth annual Arlington Forest Spring Cleanup is Saturday, April 26, from 9 to 11 AM. Depending on the site, we will pick up trash, remove invasive plants, or otherwise beautify public spaces around our neighborhood. This year, organized groups will focus on three areas:

- Lubber Run Park: remove trash from the streambed
- Arlington Blvd southside buffer strip: remove trash and clean up the area
- N. Granada/N. Greenbrier trailhead area: remove trash and invasive plants

In addition, individual residents who live near the following areas are encouraged to grab a garbage bag from home and make a quick sweep picking up trash:

- Lubber Run just south of Arlington Blvd: remove trash from upper slopes
- Arlington Blvd nouthside buffer strip: remove trash along highway
- Four Mile Run near foot of S. Park Drive: remove trash from streambed

Many hands make for light work, so the more volunteers who participate, the more progress can be made to improve community spaces for our spring and summer enjoyment. Even if you can only help for an hour, please do so. Again this year, we welcome the participation of Arlington Forest's Cub Scout Pack 548.

We start at 9 AM, rain or shine. If you arrive late, look around for those who are already at work. Please wear old clothes and sturdy shoes and bring drinking water. If you have them, wear garden or work gloves.

Please join in this effort if you enjoy walking, jogging or biking in our neighborhood parks; if you have children who you want to learn to care about the environment; if you want to get out in the fresh spring air to benefit from some light exercise; and/or if you want to help protect the Chesapeake Bay watershed.

Whether or not you help out April 26, you can protect our environment any day by doing a quick sweep of the curb in front of your house to pick up plastics and other

trash that may have floated down the street or fallen from the trash truck. That will keep the next rain storm from carrying the debris into our streams and rivers.

#### A Look at Our Local Bedrock

Next time you have a chance, take a good look at our local bedrock along Lubber Run and Four Mile Run. It is roughly half a billion years old!

You can actually see evidence of ancient sediments in the gray-brown boulders. The rocks have visible layering, formed as one bed of sediment settled over another. Sediments ranged from silt, to sand, to cobble. Some boulders contain sizable rock fragments, often pieces of quartz.

Geologists call this kind of rock a sedimentary mélange (meaning mixture). The rock formation in our area, first recognized through geological studies along Indian Run in Annandale, is called the Indian Run sedimentary mélange. It formed in a unique way. Undersea rock slides carried sediments of various sizes into an ocean trench. As the trench filled, the sediments thickened and hardened into sedimentary rock, and the rock was eventually lifted by mountain-building forces onto dry land.

Over hundreds of millions of years, the Indian Run sedimentary mélange underwent four separate mountainbuilding events. The final one placed the mélange where it is today, shaping the Piedmont's underlying geology. In the process, tremendous heat and pressure changed the makeup of the rock in a process known as metamorphism. Although the sediments are still partially recognizable, there are new mineral components. Look carefully and you

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will see bits of mica sparkling in the sun.

The Indian Run sedimentary mélange is prone to weathering. Along the creeks, you can find pieces of crumbling gray-brown rock that are in the process of becoming the red clay soils so distinctive of our area. You can also find boulders with nodules of quartz standing out from the rock surface. The rock matrix weathers faster than the erosion-resistant quartz, which eventually falls into the creek. That is partly why our creek beds are so disproportionately rich in light-colored quartz.

So next time you are in the park, take a good look at the bedrock. It formed in an ocean that no longer exists; it underlay mountain ranges long since gone. In the process, it has undergone tremendous changes, and it's the oldest rock type in northern Virginia.


Tree Grant Program: To help keep the "forest" in Arlington Forest, AFCA will pay you to plant a tree on your property. AFCA offers matching grants to neighbors who plant tree from an approved list of shade trees. Grants of up to \$125 will cover one-half of the cost of buying and planting a tree. There is a limit to two grants per property and the application must be approved before the purchase. **E-CARE:** Saturday, April 19. Arlington's semi-annual E-CARE event allows residents to safely get rid of hazardous household materials and electronics which cannot be discarded with your regular trash. E-CARE takes place at Thomas Jefferson Middle School in the West Parking Lot (one block east of Glebe Rd.) between 8:30 AM and 3 PM. Just load up your car with the unwanted items, bring your driver's license to prove Arlington residency, and then drive

through the various stations -- dropping off paint cans at one station, TVs (\$20 recycling fee) at another station, and so on. The non-profit group Bikes for the World will collect serviceable bikes to send to countries where they are needed for basic transportation. For more info, go to www.arlingtonva.us/recycle.

**Spring Plant Sale:** Saturday, April 26, 1-5 PM. Come to Long Branch Nature Center for its annual native plant sale. There will be a variety of spring and summer bloomers along with ferns, vines and shrubs. Cardboard boxes will be provided for transporting purchases. Payment can be made by cash or check (sorry, no credit cards). Plant advice is free.

Ball-Sellers House: On Saturday, April 19, the historic Ball-Sellers House in Glencarlyn will host a guided historic walking tour of Washington's Forest. George Washington purchased property adjacent to the Ball property; the walk will cover areas that Washington surveyed with the Ball family. The walk, designed by Arlington Historical Society tour guide Kevin Vincent, will start at the Ball-Sellers House at 1:30 pm and is free. Participants should wear good walking shoes and be able to walk up to four miles of easy terrain.

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# Community Yard Sale on May 18

Arlington Forest's long-running annual Community Yard Sale takes place the morning of Saturday, May 18 (rain date May 19). With over 50 Arlington Forest households participating each year, the event attracts many bargain hunters drawn to the convenience of cruising though one concentrated area to visit many sales in a short time.

AFCA publicizes the event by placing classified ads in local newspapers. Sellers who live near Arlington Blvd, Carlin Springs Rd., George Mason Dr. and Henderson Dr. are encouraged to post signs along those thoroughfares pointing

into the neighborhood and to their sales (please remove the signs at day's end).

Next month's newsletter will publish a map showing the sale sites. To get on the map, e-mail your address to nalandfamily@yahoo.com by May 2. Arlington Forest residents can use the map to locate nearby sales. Sellers are encouraged to make photocopies (or download copies from the online Arlington Forester at www.arlingtonforestva.org) to hand out so that, once shoppers find one site, they can pick up a map leading them to other sites.

There are no rules governing this community-wide event, but past experience suggests strategies for success: --Sort clothes by size and toys by user age. Group similar

items together. Find shopper-friendly ways to display your merchandise (tables, clothes rack). Have grocery sacks on hand. Save dollar bills and coins to make change. If selling electronics, set up an extension cord to show the item works.


--Price items reasonably. Savvy shoppers will buy elsewhere if prices are too high. Be prepared to negotiate down from the displayed price, but feel free to say "no" instead of feeling taken advantage of.

--If you want to snag professional buyers who make yard sales their business, start setting up at 7 AM. At the other end of the day, people looking for close-out prices and even freebies come out in late morning and early afternoon. If you are left with large items that you simply want to get rid of, leave them at the curb with a "free" sign and they will probably be gone by Sunday.

--Keep your cash in a pocket, purse or fanny pack. If you do use a cash box, have someone assist you so it is not left unattended while you are with a shopper. Decline personal checks. If you go indoors, have someone watch your merchandise.

For many people, yard sale success is not measured by profit, but by how much unwanted stuff is moved out instead of left cluttering the house. It is also a great community event. Families can check out neighbors' merchandise. Kids can set up a lemonade stand.

So, whether you are a seller, a buyer or both, please join us on May 18.



# Lubber Run Amphitheater Free Summer Show Season begins June 13

The 2014 Lubber Run Amphitheater summer season of free live entertainment opens Friday, June 13 with popular singer/song writer Mary Ann Redmond. Her music covers a wide range, from down-home country to urban soul. This is the third year she is opening the Amphitheater's summer season and the stage is already set for another full house in Lubber Run Park on June 13.

This year's schedule of Friday and Saturday evening shows (with a few Sunday and Wednesday specials thrown in) runs through August 17, two weeks longer than last year. It includes many of last year's favorites such as Margot MacDonald, The Grandsons, and Ted Garber, and features a variety of performers new to Arlington's only full production outdoor stage such as Synetic Theater.

The Amphitheater's June schedule is packed with special Monday, Tuesday and Sunday performances by Arlington-based groups including the Potomac Harmony Chorus, the Arlingtones, the Metropolitan Chorus and the Arlington Philharmonic.

"The county has kept its promise to support our amphitheater with fine local programs. This year's schedule is bigger and better than ever," said Marsha Lederman, co-chair of the Lubber Run Amphitheater Foundation. The Foundation was created by citizens a few years ago to work with the county to reopen the amphitheater which had been closed because of maintenance and safety concerns.

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
# Spring Programs Presented by Arlington Neighborhood Villages

outdoor recreation areas into the surrounding green space have established an online petition (available at http:// goo.gl/Ofhq42) that has been signed by over 200 people. In an effort to determine if any one of these options is supported by a majority of Arlington Foresters, the AFCA board launched an online survey in late March that was publicized on the AFCA listsery. The results will be announced at the April 9 AFCA meeting and on the AFCA listserv.

At a March 26 Arlington Public Schools (APS) community forum, APS released cost estimates for construction options at the middle school level, including at the LRCC site. Those estimates and related information can be viewed at www.apsva.us/moreseats.

The final APS community forum on options for the APS 2015 CIP is on Wednesday, April 23, 7-9 PM, in the Thomas Jefferson Middle School Theater. On May 13, the School Board will begin public discussion of those options. By June 5, the APS Superintendent will formally present the preferred CIP options to the School Board, which will vote to approve the final options on June 17.

It is not known whether sites for high-density affordable housing will be included in the County's CIP. In a March 25 e-mail to AFCA, County Board Chair Jay Fisette stated that

"the County Manager is expected to publicly release her proposed CIP in mid-May."

#### **AFCA Resolution adopted March 19**

The Arlington Forest Citizens Association (AFCA) fiercely objects to the Arlington Public Schools proposal for an 800 to 1,200-student middle school at Lubber Run Community Center (LRCC) site. The plan will negatively affect Barrett School, the Arlington Forest neighborhood, surrounding civic associations and all residents who use LRCC's outdoor and indoor spaces for recreation, a preschool, after school care, sports and classes.

The plan will degrade the quality of life in Arlington Forest by increasing traffic and parking problems while decreasing safety for pedestrians and school children and disrupting neighborhood access to Ballston and the Metro. Any school of this size on this site is unacceptable and AFCA opposes it in the strongest terms.

AFCA urges Arlington County to rebuild the community center according to the schedule outlined in the County's current Capital Improvement Plan budget. Rebuilding of the Center has been delayed and deferred for nearly 20 years - and that is enough.

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### **Nature News**

#### Strengthening our **Natural Connections**

It's in the spring -- with the emergence of both nature and people from winter's relative somnolence --

that the many connections in nature seem most vital and urgent: connections between different species, between ecosystems, between continents, and between natural processes and phenomena. Connections also happen through nature between people and between people and nature.

Earlier this year, I was in Panama where I saw many of the familiar warblers that pour through our area this month and next on their northward migration. Many can be seen in the woods around Long Branch as they make brief stops to rest and feed.

We are fortunate that Arlington still has places where we can connect with nature and that help nature stay connected with itself. Glencarlyn and other parks provide critical stepping stones for migrants, helping them connect with their nesting areas and to a new generation of birds. Those birds also provide a living connection between our home and places as far as northern Canada and South America.

These connections can be tenuous, however. Migrating songbirds face a growing list of threats such as habitat loss and light pollution. An even more imperiled migration could break another one of our living connections. Dramatically shrinking amounts of milkweed, the monarch butterfly caterpillar's sole food plant, due to new agricultural practices has helped result in a record drop in the numbers of monarch butterflies reaching Mexico.

But there is good news: these are problems we can help fix! And one of the best things we can do to help is to grow native plants in our backyards, front yards, school yards, common areas, places of worship...anywhere that can host native plants to create habitat for birds and butterflies.

Most birds will benefit from the seeds, fruits, or nuts these plants produce and, more importantly, from the insects that feed on the plants. Few native insects feed on non-native plants and nearly all native songbirds, migratory or year-round residents, eat insects at some point in their life-cycle. You can help monarchs by growing native milkweeds for the caterpillars and a variety of native flowering plants to provide nectar for the adults.

To help you get started in growing native plants, the Long Branch Nature Center native plant sale is on Saturday, April 26, 1-5 p.m. Try some natives this spring and help strengthen our natural connections!



Nature Friendly Lawn Care: Dear Neighbors, With spring's arrival, we all come out of our homes and into our yards. In an effort to keep everyone safe and healthy, please refrain from using chemicals on your lawn. Specifically: Don't apply pesticides to your yard, and if you use a lawn care service, don't allow them to use pesticides either. 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
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
